



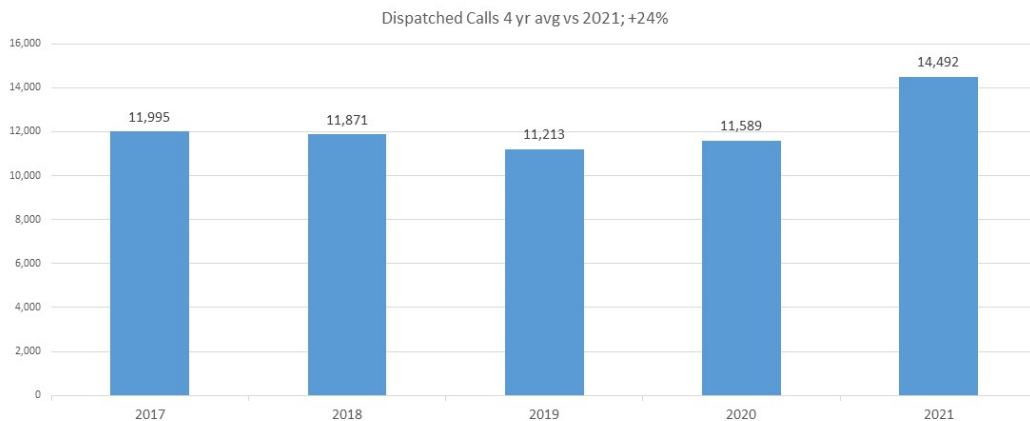
Our People

- Actions taken by South Ogden's elected officials has reduced turnover considerably
- Retention improved substantially in 2021 as a result; loss of officers to other departments- 2018 = 2, 2019 = 4, 2020 = 3, 2021 = 0
- Retirement is now the primary cause of a vacancy – 2021, 1 retirement
- 22 Sworn Police Positions; Down 1 to 2 officers all year, Currently 1 vacancy
- 4 Office Support Staff; 3 full-time, 1 part-time (vacancy just filled*)
- 3 Animal Services Employees; 2 full-time, 1 part-time shelter worker
- 4 School Crossing Guards; vacancy filled, potential vacancy, no substitutes

Calls For Service

- Dispatched or Officer Initiated
- Time per call can be 30 to 40 minutes on the short side
- Depending on the situation, a call - DUI, Domestic Violence, Traffic Accident, SWAT, or large amount of evidence, can take considerably longer

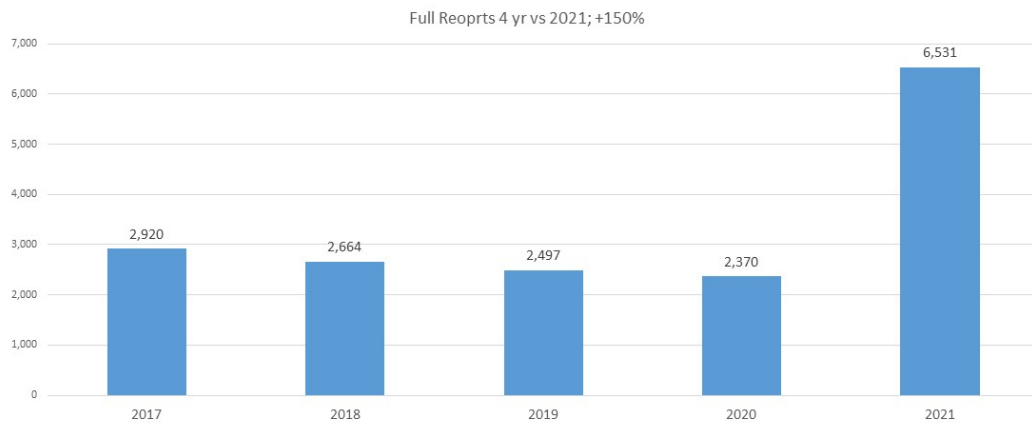
Dispatched Calls For Service; +24% or 8 a day



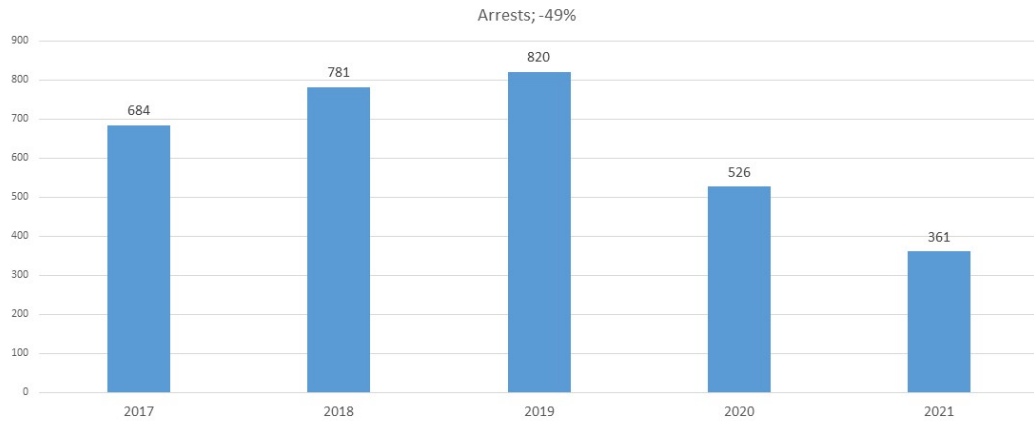
Officer Initiated Calls; +22%



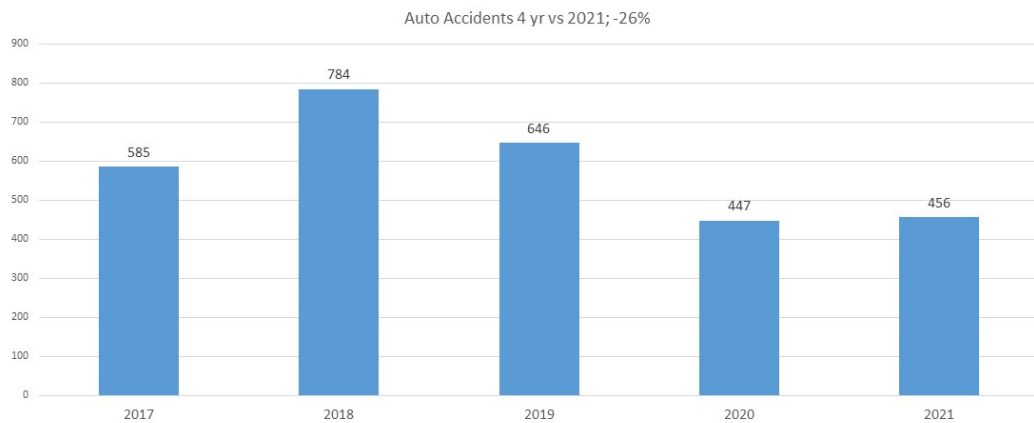
Detailed Reports; +150%



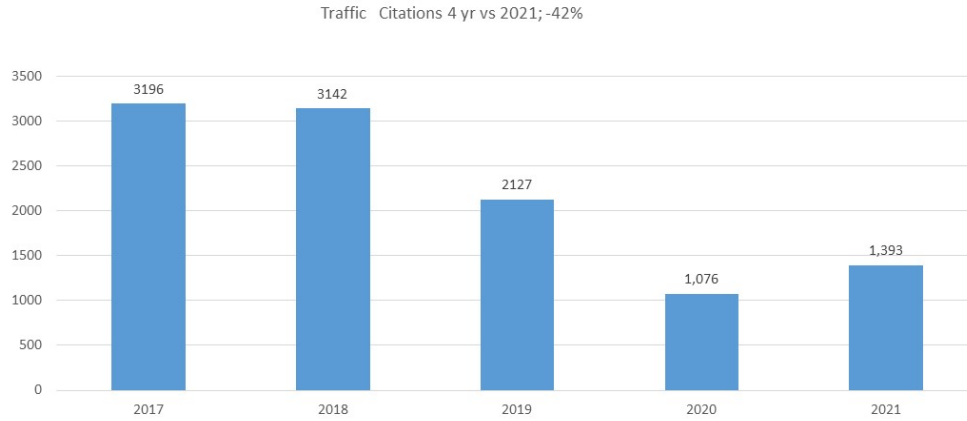
Arrests; -49%



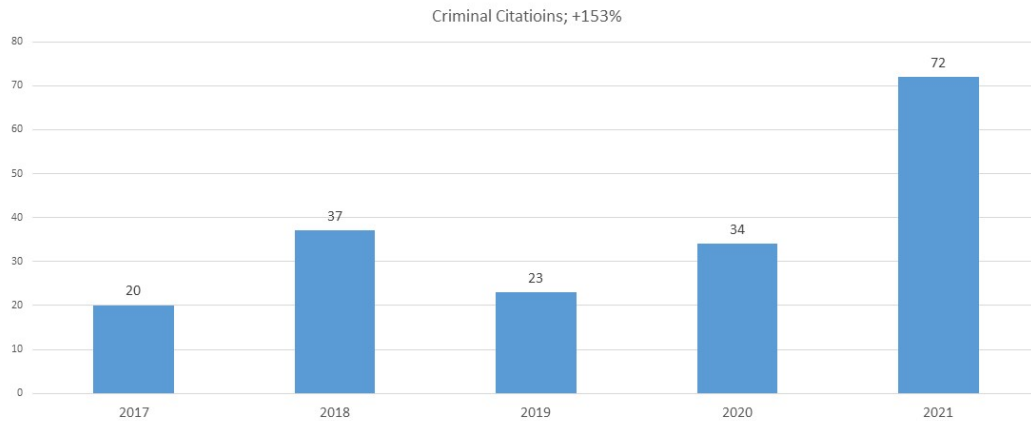
Auto Accidents; -26%



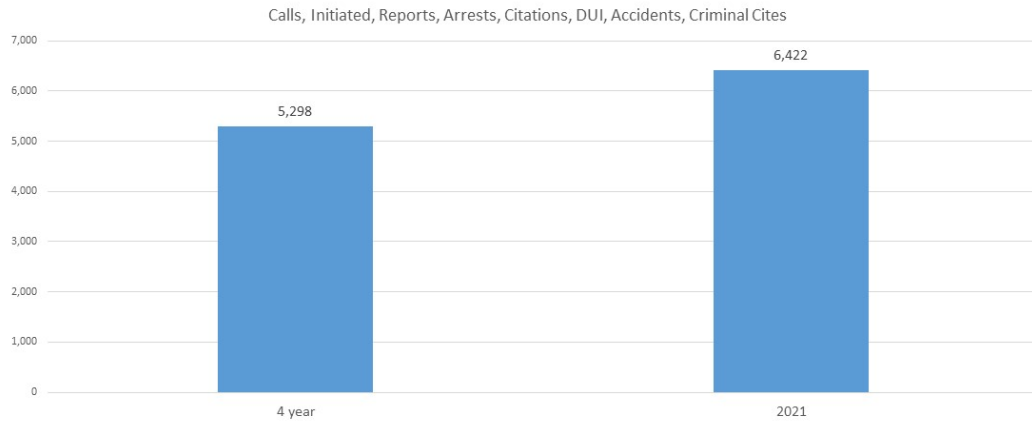
Traffic Citations; -42%



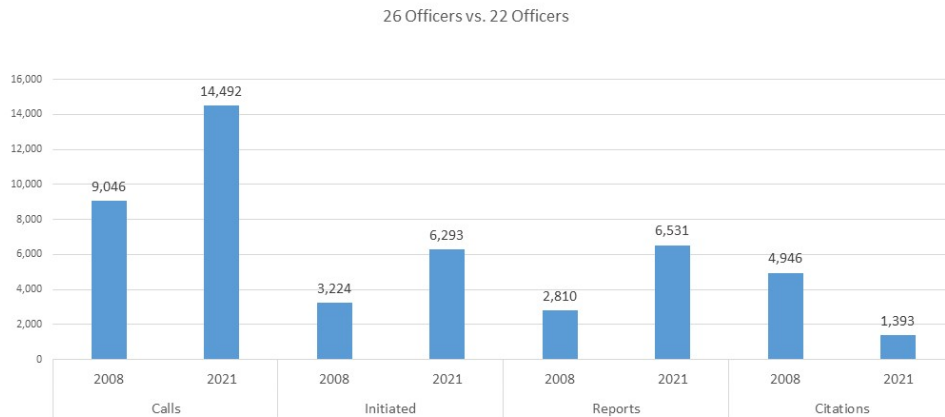
Criminal Citations; +153%

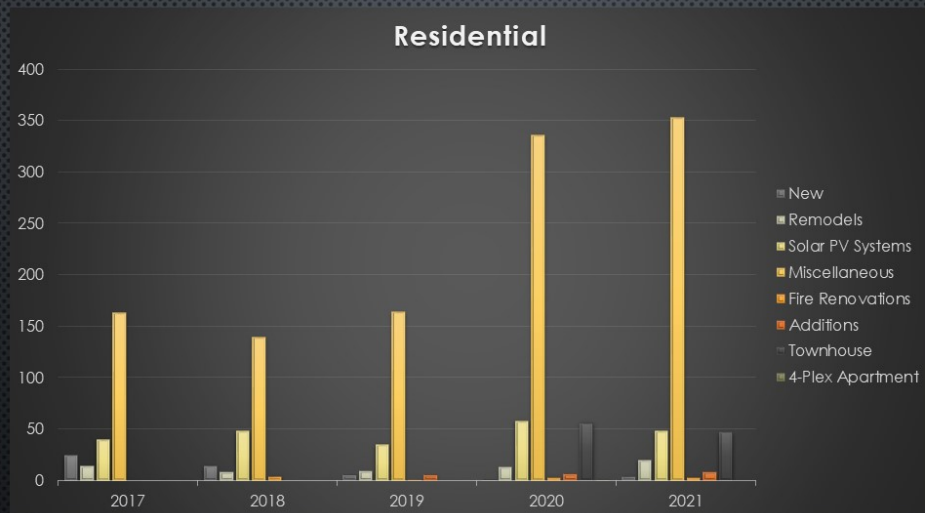

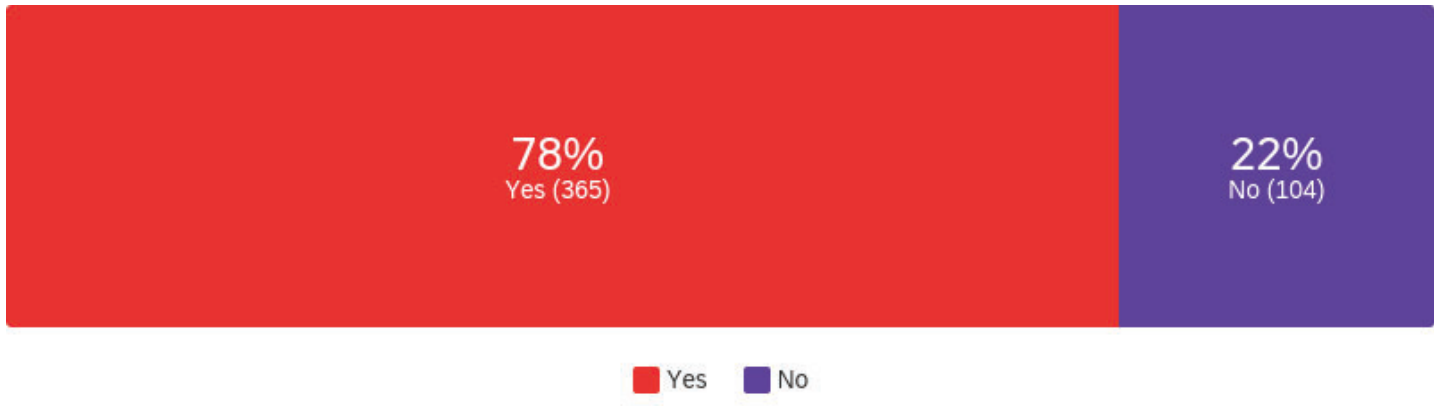

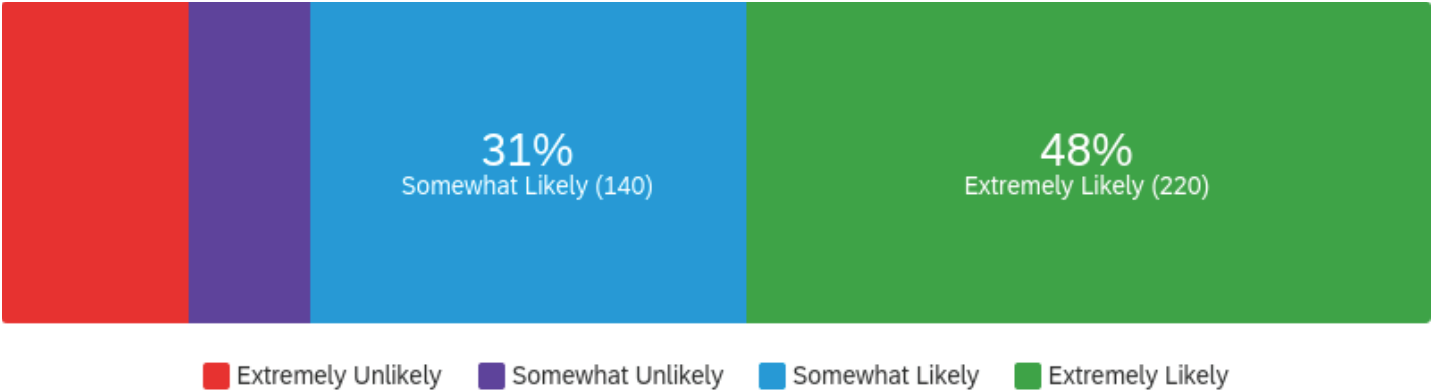
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Do you believe your city government should help facilitate fiber internet service?



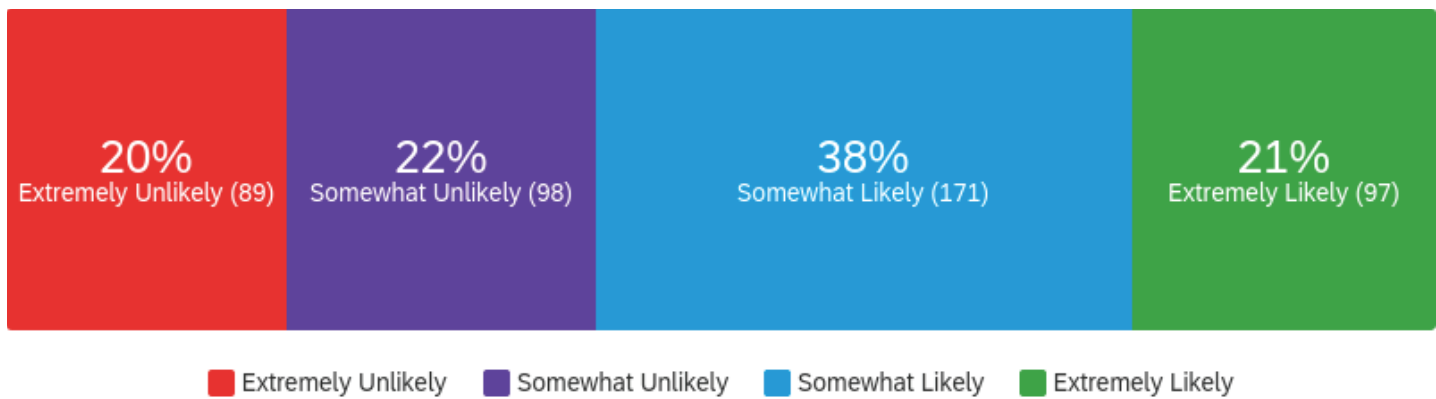
