Member's present were: Mayor Pro-Tem Derek Foy; Council Members: Jimmy Landreth, Tim Jones, and Jim Rigsbee; Town Attorney Charles Winfree; Finance and Budget Officer Kim Thacker, Town Clerk Dale Martin and Deputy Town Clerk Robbie Wagoner. Mayor Mike Crawford was absent.

1. Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance, and Invocation by Pastor Ed McKinney, Stokesdale United Methodist Church.

Mayor Pro Tem Derek Foy called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Pastor Ed McKinney of Stokesdale United Methodist Church delivered the invocation.

2. Review and Adopt the Agenda.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy referenced a news story from WXII that talked about improvements to Hwy. 158 and asked Staff to follow up with NCDOT to get more information. Deputy Clerk Robbie Wagoner presented information he received from Connie James and Brian Ketner, Engineers with NCDOT. The news story indicated that the entire Hwy. 158 project would be funded but according to NCDOT representatives only a portion of the project has been funded. Further review and prioritization are required by both NCDOT and the MPO before work continues on the other portions of Hwy. 158. Mr. Wagoner also updated Council on the Hwy. 68 and Hwy. 65 projects under consideration. NCDOT indicated that they are planning a public meeting for local officials and public comment in late summer or early fall.

Fire Chief Todd Gauldin presented the Stokesdale Fire Department's report.

Town Clerk Dale Martin presented the Staff's administrative report.

Mr. Tee Stepheson updated Council by highlighting work done by Yates Construction. He noted that Fleming Engineering completed the survey work for the land addition to the park and a combination deed was prepared and recorded. This greatly benefited the Committee in their plans for the basketball and pickleball courts. He added that the committee will be looking at other projects to make best use of town's grant funds.

- 6. Financial Reports:
 - a) Finance/Budget Officer Report: Kimberly Thacker

Finance/Budget Officer Kim Thacker presented a report of the Town's General Fund Accounts and the Water Fund account.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy asked about payment to A & D Enterprises for work on the town's blow off valves. He referenced this was to be paid for through House Bill 1163 and reimbursement has been requested. He asked if the Town could pay that from the water enterprise fund and then reimburse that fund when the money is received. Mrs. Thacker reminded Council that at a Special Called meeting on March 31st, Council approved using this grant to pay A & D

Enterprises for this work. She noted that the money is in the budget, however she is not authorized to pay these invoices from that account without approval by Council.

Mayor Pro Foy made a <u>Motion</u> that the invoices from A & D Enterprises be paid from the Water Enterprise account, contracted services line item and be reimbursed by House Bill 1163. Councilman Jones seconded the motion.

PUBLIC HEARINGS:

8. Public Hearing on Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2023-2024.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy declared the public hearing open.

Jordan Balmforth, 7708 Hap Court, Kernersville, NC — spoke on behalf of the Stokesdale Parks and Recreation, and requested \$50,000 for baseball field lights which he explained in detail last month. He stated that he has never come before Council asking for funds and that the organization intends to be self-sufficient, that this would not be a recurring event. He noted fundraising efforts undertaken by the organization.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy stated that at the last meeting, Council requested a resolution by the entire board of Directors. Mr. Balmforth produced a Resolution adopted by the Board of Directors.

Council and Mr. Balmforth discussed life of the light poles and maintenance. Discussed numerous upgrades to the fields, concession building and equipment that's been funded by donations and fundraising efforts. Sponsorships were discussed. He presented the number of games held at night and the number of kids that are participating.

Council members complimented Mr. Balmforth on the improvements taken place. It's new territory for this Council to donate to an organization but are willing to take it under consideration and discussed various funds that could be used for this purpose. Council discussed a matching grant of up to \$50,000 with the remaining funds raised by Stokesdale Parks and Recreation. Council asked for legal advice if the Town considers funding these light poles. Mr. Winfree advised that an agreement could have strings attached such that the money would be returned to the town if the property were ever sold, it could be a loan or a gift.

Mr. Balmforth assured Council that there is a high level of excitement within the organization and that they are open to all possibilities. He stated that having the town's backing for generations would steer things in the right direction. They pledged to be good stewards on any funds given and open to a succession plan with protections for the town.

<u>Eileen Thiery, 8101 Meadow Springs Place, Stokesdale, North Carolina 27357</u> – stated that this is essential to our future, the kids will benefit from this and would hate to see someone get hurt because of poor lighting.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy declared the public hearing closed.

NEW BUSINESS:

9. Consideration and Approval of Operating Budget Ordinance for Fiscal Year 2023-2024.

Mrs. Thacker explained the changes made from the budget workshops and noted changes to the budget message. She noted some technical issues found that have been corrected.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy then stated that he has spoken with Mrs. Martin and she would like to reduce her hours and is ready to step down as clerk and focus on the codification of town ordinance and re-codification of the development ordinance. He stated that with her reduction in hours and with the elimination of the part-time position, we could then fund a needed full time deputy clerk that he believes is needed.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy then stated that he supports Stokesdale Parks and Recreation and in favor of using \$50,000 of ARPA funds to assist them with the lights. He highlighted the Town's effort is obtaining various grants for the Town that will be used for park improvements and water system improvements. He added that no town funds would be used. He spoke of the positive impact they make on Stokesdale and that the money would be used for a good public purpose.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy made a <u>Motion</u> to continue the budget discussion and public hearing to a Special Called Meeting to be held on June 15, 2023 at 7:00 PM here at Town Hall for the purpose of continuing the budget workshop. Councilman Jones seconded the motion.

Town Clerk Martin reminded Council that a budget ordinance is the document that is actually adopted and would need to reflect the final figures for line items, etc. at the special called meeting. Council discussed ironing out all the detail and possibly holding 2 meetings, June 15th for a budget workshop and on June 21st to continue the public hearing and to adopt the budget.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy withdrew his first motion.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy made a <u>Motion</u> to continue this item to June 15, 2023 at 7:00 for the purpose of a budget workshop, and a Special Called meeting on June 21, 2023 at 7:00 PM for the continued public hearing and the potential adoption of the budget. Councilman Jones seconded the motion.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy asked Mr. Winfree if a motion should be considered now to include funds to Stokesdale Parks and Recreation. Mr. Winfree stated that there was discussion about protecting the Town and advised that there be further discussion and direction at the budget work session as to what protection should be put in place. He added that Council could make a motion to include the funding in the budget now and work out the details at the work session.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy made a <u>Motion</u> to include in the budget a \$50,000 grant to Stokesdale Parks and Recreation to be used only for lighting and light poles at 8401 Capri Drive at the community park. Councilman Jones seconded the motion.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy called a recess at 8:31 PM. He reconvened the meeting at 8:41 pm.

10. Consideration of Town Administrator / Town Clerk Job Description and Job Position.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy clarified that this is only 1 person, not 2 jobs. He worked with staff to draft a job description with responsibilities denoted. He referenced the town's form of government and compared it to a business. He felt that the Town's staff needs a leader and felt that it should be the town clerk/administrator with a job description that reflects what they are really doing. He complimented the staff and hoped to make it better. He then shared a draft job description.

Council discussed the Town Administrator position and what responsibilities are laid out in the NCGS. Mayor Pro Tem Foy explained that the Administrator would only have authority designated by the Council.

Council discussed statutory requirements from the NCGS and the current role and responsibilities of the clerk. Council desired a clear chain of command and performance expectations of town staff and resources.

11. Consideration of proposal for Water System Consultation and General Engineering Services.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy, stated that four or five months ago, the Town sent out a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) proposal specific to our water system. He stated that this RFQ is for general services and consultation and engineering services, such as an agitator or other needs for our water system.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy made a <u>Motion</u> to accept a request for proposal by Hazen and Sawyer for Water System Consultation and Engineering Services and enter negotiations for general engineering services needed. Councilman Rigsbee seconded the motion.

Council discussed the negotiation process and what happens if an agreement isn't made with Hazen and Sawyer. It was noted that should negotiations fail, the Town could do business with another engineering firm for this work.

Mr. Aaron Babson, with Hazen and Sawyer, stated that this proposal is specifically to satisfy a requirement for the \$400,000 grants and explained the work that would be done under the grant. He explained that they applied for two grants for the Town, \$100,000 to be used to improve the existing system and could be used for the agitator as an example. The \$300,000 grant could be for rate studies and planning for the future.

14. Closed Session in accordance with § 143-318.11. Closed sessions.

- (a) Permitted Purposes. It is the policy of this State that closed sessions shall be held only when required to permit a public body to act in the public interest as permitted in this section. A public body may hold a closed session and exclude the public only when a closed session is required.
- (3) To consult with an attorney employed or retained by the public body in order to preserve the attorney-client privilege between the attorney and the public body, which privilege is hereby acknowledged. General policy matters may not be discussed in a closed session and nothing herein shall be construed to permit a public body to close a meeting that otherwise would be open merely because an attorney employed or retained by the public body is a participant. The public body may consider and give instructions to an attorney concerning the handling or settlement of a claim, judicial action, mediation, arbitration, or administrative procedure. If the public body has approved or considered a settlement, other than a malpractice settlement by or on behalf of a hospital, in closed session, the terms of that settlement shall be reported to the public body and entered into its minutes as soon as possible within a reasonable time after the settlement is concluded.
- 6) To consider the qualifications, competence, performance, character, fitness, conditions of appointment, or conditions of initial employment of an individual public officer or employee or prospective public officer or employee; or to hear or investigate a complaint, charge, or grievance by or against an individual public officer or employee. General personnel policy issues may not be considered in a closed session. A public body may not consider the qualifications, competence, performance, character, fitness, appointment, or removal of a member of the public body or another body and may not consider or fill a vacancy among its own membership except in an open meeting. Final action making an appointment or discharge or removal by a public body having final authority for the appointment or discharge, or removal shall be taken in an open meeting.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy made a <u>Motion</u> to enter into closed session at 9:13 PM for the purpose of discussing personnel matters in accordance with NCGS 143-318-.11(6). Councilman Landreth seconded the motion.

MINUTES TOWN OF STOKESDALE SPECIAL CALLED TOWN COUNCIL MEETING BUDGET WORKSHOP 8325 ANGEL-PARDUE ROAD STOKESDALE, NC 27357 JUNE 14, 2023 AT 7:00 PM

Member's present were: Mayor Pro-Tem Derek Foy; Council Members: Jimmy Landreth, Tim Jones, and Jim Rigsbee; Finance and Budget Officer Kim Thacker, and Town Clerk Dale Martin. Absent were Mayor Mike Crawford and Town Attorney Chuck Winfree.

1. Call To Order, Pledge of Allegiance, and Invocation.

Mayor Pro Tem Derek Foy called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Councilman Jim Rigsbee delivered the invocation.

2. Review and Adopt the Agenda.

Councilman Jimmy Landreth made a **Motion** to adopt the agenda. Mayor Pro Tem Foy seconded the motion.

3. Citizen Comments from the Floor (3-Minute Limit per Speaker).

None presented.

4. Discussion of Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Annual Budget.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy began discussions with the General Fund. Council discussed fire inspection and investigations and who is responsible for those for our local businesses and who pays for the inspections.

Council discussed the \$40,000 projected for the code of ordinance book and recodification of the development ordinance. Mrs. Martin explained that the proposal was from Municipal Code, the company that prepared the Stokesdale Development Ordinance. She stated that the development ordinance will be updated and the cost is based on the number of text amendments that has been generated since 2018. Her best estimate was that it would not be \$20,000, that she could only recall 2

or 3 amendments in her research. She added that the Code of Ordinance book would be created from scratch by pulling all the town's operating ordinances together. It was asked if the code would be accessed through the internet as opposed to hard copies. Mrs. Martin stated that the Town will have both a hard copy as well as it being accessible through the internet.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy asked if Mrs. Martin thought the Code book projects could be done with a budget of \$30,700. Councilman Jones recalled when the development ordinance was done back in 2016 and believes the Town got a proposal for both. He asked if staff could locate that proposal and share it with Council. Mrs. Martin noted other companies out there such as American Legal, but having the development ordinance prepared by Municipal Code she speculated that they would be cheaper. Mrs. Martin stated that she would give it her best shot to work within that budget.

Council then discussed the \$1,000 for traffic control at Stokesdale Elementary School and their objections due to it not being the Town's responsibility. There was concern that it would be a recurring expense and a short route for the school's administration to get money. Councilman Landreth asked if staff could contact the school and ask them to submit their request for funding in writing. By consensus, the \$1,000 remained in the budget.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy then brought up special revenue funds and highlighted those.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy referenced conversations with Mr. Balmforth with Stokesdale Parks and Recreation.

Mr. Jordan Balmforth, 7708 Hap Court, Kernersville, NC – provided the organizations Articles of Incorporation and was able to determine that no bylaws were created. He stated that they have paid to have bylaws drafted and read 2 sections included in these bylaws. The sections read dealt with protection to the Town should the organization disband or transfer property ownership.

Councilmember Rigsbee explained that these bylaws and any agreement would need to be voted on by Stokesdale Parks and Recreation and then presented to Town Council for a vote as well.

Mr. Balmforth explained the transparency set out in the bylaws and noted the section whereby the bylaws can be amended or repealed except for Article III, the section that provides for the transfer of property and the protection to the Town. He added that the Stokesdale Parks and Recreation Board has adopted these bylaws. Council commended Mr. Balmforth for his diligence in getting this done so quickly. He was asked if this document will be recorded, and Mr. Balmforth stated that it would be recorded. Mr. Balmforth stated that this provides protection for the Town but also for the organization forever.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy asked that the document be emailed to staff so that it can be shared with Council.

Mayor Pro Tem Foy made a <u>Motion</u> that in the General Fund, reduce Account # 40350 \$40,000 to \$30,700 and to remove \$9,300 from undesignated funds and strike \$7,100 for survey that was duplicated. Councilman Jones seconded motion.

He acknowledged inflation that is affecting everyone. Councilman Rigsbee agreed with the other comments and added that the Town has been fortunate to have these additional funds and that the Council has made good use of that money for the citizens. He noted that without this grant money, the Town has been consistent with the budget, staff improvements has run the budget up but benefits the Town.

Councilman Landreth also complimented work on the budget. This has been without a property tax for over 30 years. He noted that we have done what we said. He is happy with the park improvements built with grant money. Everything has been done in open meetings and we've done a good job.

Councilman Jones commented on the Town's reserves and asked about the Town's investment earnings. Mrs. Thacker noted that current return rates are between 2.71 and 3.69% and that any CDRS up for renewal are being renewed for 12 months. She added that she was very conservative on the estimate used in the budget.

21a. Discuss possible revisions to town ordinances regarding unauthorized use of town fire hydrants.

At a previous meeting, Councilman Landreth introduced the issue concerning people stealing water from fire hydrants and asked Town Attorney Winfree to look into ordinances pertaining to the situation.

Attorney Winfree made a point that the ordinance should be updated because in 2021 there were legislative changes where the legislature decided that people were over criminalizing the violation of the town ordinances, so they have limited the criminal law to enforce such ordinances. Attorney Winfree suggested that the Council revisit those ordinances. Attorney Winfree also explained that there is a statute in the criminal law, stating that if someone has an unauthorized connection to a municipal water system, then that municipality could collect three times the damages or \$5,000.00, whichever is greater. Attorney Winfree recommended that the Council adopt a new ordinance that incorporates the aforementioned statute, in order to have the authority to enforce it. Attorney Winfree proposed the idea of drafting a new ordinance, based on the Town's current ordinance, that would incorporate as much recovery as possible against any person who is caught stealing water from the municipal water system.


For the month of December, the Sheriff's Office responded to a total of **181** calls for service in Stokesdale town limits, resulting in **15** formal case reports.


Of note:

Health Insurance Coverage Renewal for Full-Time Town Employees

Dear Stokesdale Town Council,

The current health insurance policy for the Town's full-time employees became effective on February 01, 2023, meaning that it will need to be renewed by February 01, 2024.

On January 02, 2024, I contacted the Town's current health insurance administrator, Salem Benefits, to obtain the new health insurance premium rates for the 2024 year.

According to Monica Jones, Vice President of Salem Benefits, if the Town were to renew the same Blue Cross and Blue Shield health insurance policy that it currently has for its two full-time employees, the total health insurance premium that would be billed to the Town would be \$732.51 per month.

This new health insurance premium has decreased from the former amount of \$1,392.23 per month.

Monica Jones also confirmed that the administrative fee charged by Salem Benefits will remain \$200.00 per month.

Based on the minutes from the January 23, 2023, special called Town Council meeting, the approved motion regarding the payment of the health insurance premiums for 2023 was very specific to the proposed cost of the health insurance premiums for that year only. Therefore, the Town Council may want to decide on how they would like to proceed with the payment of these health insurance premiums moving forward.

One possible solution would be for the Town Council to agree upon a set percentage of the health insurance premium that would be paid by the Town, and a set percentage of the health insurance premium that would be paid by the full-time employees. On January 03, 2023, I briefly discussed this matter with the Town's Finance/Budget Officer, Kimberly Thacker, and the Town's Mayor Pro Tem, Derek Foy, via email. For each of your conveniences, I have included Kimberly's response to the matter below:

At this time, the Town is paying roughly 80% of the health insurance premium. I would recommend to Council to keep it at this rate but set a specific rate vs an amount per employee. It would keep things simplified. Please see below the numbers for the amount it will cost the town at 80% and 90% for both employee/employer.

Premium per month -\$732.51 is \$8,790.12 annually.

(These calculations are on a percentage of the total monthly premium) NOT per employee - BUT the employee percentage is split between number of employees.

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TOS - @90\% = $7,911.11 (Annual) divided by 26 = $304.27 TOS - @80\% = $7,032.10 (Annual) divided by 26 = $270.47
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Employee(s) 2

Robbie - @ 10% = \$439.51 (Annual) divided by 26 = \$16.91 Robbie - @ 20% = \$879.01 (Annual) divided by 26 = \$33.81

Mason - @ 10% = \$439.51 (Annual) divided by 26 = \$16.91 Mason - @ 20% = \$879.01 (Annual) divided by 26 = \$33.81

This is my recommendation.

Installation of Light Poles near the Basketball and Pickleball Courts

Dear Stokesdale Town Council,

On December 28, 2023, I met with Ethan Haynes, Contract Designer 3/Lighting Designer for Duke Energy, to discuss the installation of light poles near the newly constructed basketball and pickleball courts.

During this meeting, Ethan recommended the installation of two (2) light poles on the south side of the courts. More specifically, one (1) light pole on the west corner and one (1) light pole on the east corner.

Ethan also recommended that both light poles be installed in the grassy area between the paved roadway and the paved walking trail. This location would only require boring under one (1) paved surface (the paved roadway) rather than two (2) paved surfaces (the paved roadway and the paved walking trail).

Ethan explained that the most practical option for supplying power to these light poles would be to run an underground electrical line from the pad-mounted transformer (located near the concession stand at the Town Park) directly to the poles.

Ethan explained that the total cost for boring under paved roadway would be one thousand three hundred sixty dollars and ninety-two cents (\$1,360.92). Ethan confirmed that this would be a one (1) time cost.

Based on Ethan's measurements, the total distance of underground electrical line from the pad-mounted transformer (located near the concession stand at the Town Park) directly to the two (2) light poles would be two hundred and fifty (250) feet. According to Ethan, Duke Energy will provide free underground electrical lines up to one hundred and fifty (150) feet. The cost for the additional one hundred (100) feet of underground



electrical lines will cost seven cents (\$0.07) for every ten (10) feet. Therefore, the Town would be required to pay seventy cents (\$0.70) per month for the additional one hundred (100) feet of underground electrical lines.

Ethan also recommended the installation of one (1) LED light on top of each pole. Each light would be angled towards the basketball and pickleball courts for optimal coverage.

Ethan explained that the Town has two (2) options for lighting. The first option is 130-Watt LED lights. The cost for this option would be \$34.84 per light, per month. The second option is 260-Watt LED lights. The cost for this option would be \$62.48 per light, per month.

For each of your conveniences, I have prepared the following table and attached a sketch that displays the general locations of the underground electrical line and the two (2) light poles.



Upgrading Lights on Preexisting Light Poles at Town Park

Dear Stokesdale Town Council,

On December 28, 2023, I met with Ethan Haynes, Contract Designer 3/Lighting Designer for Duke Energy, to discuss upgrading the lights on the preexisting light poles at the Town Park from the older sodium vapor lights to the more energy-efficient LED lights.

There are currently three (3) light poles at the Town Park with a total of nine (9) lights. There is one (1) light pole with four (4) lights located in the center of the parking lot. There is one (1) light pole with three (3) lights located near the concession stand. And there is one (1) light pole with two (2) lights located near the sand volleyball court.

Ethan explained that the Town has two (2) options for lighting. The first option is 130-Watt LED lights. The cost for this option would be \$34.84 per light, per month. The second option is 260-Watt LED lights. The cost for this option would be \$62.48 per light, per month. According to Ethan, the current sodium vapor lights are comparable to the 130-Watt LED lights.

Ethan also informed me that there is a one (1) time cost of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per light for the installation of the upgraded lights. Meaning that, if the Town Council decides to upgrade all nine (9) lights, the one (1) time installation fee would be nine hundred dollars (\$900.00) plus sales tax, totaling nine hundred seventy-two dollars and sixty-three cents (\$972.63).
