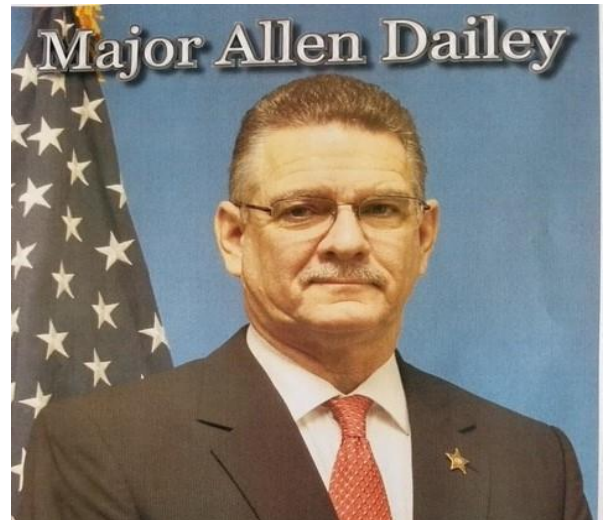
MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC PRESENT: Approximately 35 members of the public attended the meeting.

CALL TO ORDER: Chairman James T. McCain, Jr., called the meeting to order.

INVOCATION: The invocation was given by Councilman Vivian Fleming McGhaney.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: The Pledge of Allegiance was led by James Allen Dailey, Council District #3 (Chairman McCain stood in for Vice Chairman Byrd because Councilman Byrd was out due to a medical reason.) Mr. Allen Dailey entered the United States Air Force in July 1977 as an Aircraft maintenance technician and obtained the rank of Staff Sergeant. He served for approximately 9 years while being stationed at Shaw AFB, South Carolina and Eielson AFB, Alaska. He was Honorably Discharged in May of 1986. At this time he was hired as a Deputy with the Sumter County Sheriff's Office where he served for the last 35 years and retiring as the rank of Major in 2021. He Graduated with a Bachelor's Degree from Saint Leo University in 1983 and obtained a Master Degree form Troy University in 2008. He also serves as an Adjunct Professor at The University of South Carolina, Sumter. He is married to his wife of 21 years Jenny, and has 3 sons, 2 of them being Veterans. He currently resides in County Council District 3.



APPROVAL OF AGENDA: Chairman McCain asked the Administrator if there were any changes to the agenda. Administrator Mixon stated that he would ask Council to remove Ordinance 21-970 from the agenda under Other Public Hearings and Under Old Business due to new regulations that will allow the County to use upcoming ARPA appropriation for this purchase.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Baten, seconded by Councilman Edens, and unanimously carried by Council to grant approval of the agenda as requested by the Administrator to remove Ordinance 21-970 from the agenda under Public Hearing and Old Business.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Regular Meeting Tuesday, December 14, 2021, and Special Meeting for County Council On December 14, 2021.

Chairman McCain called for a motion to act on approval of the minutes for December 14, 2021, and the Special meeting of Sumter County Council on December 14, 2021.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Baker, seconded by Councilman Baten, and unanimously carried by Council to grant approval of the minutes of the December 14, 2021 Special Meeting and Regular Meeting of Sumter County Council.

Planned Development/Rezoning Requests:

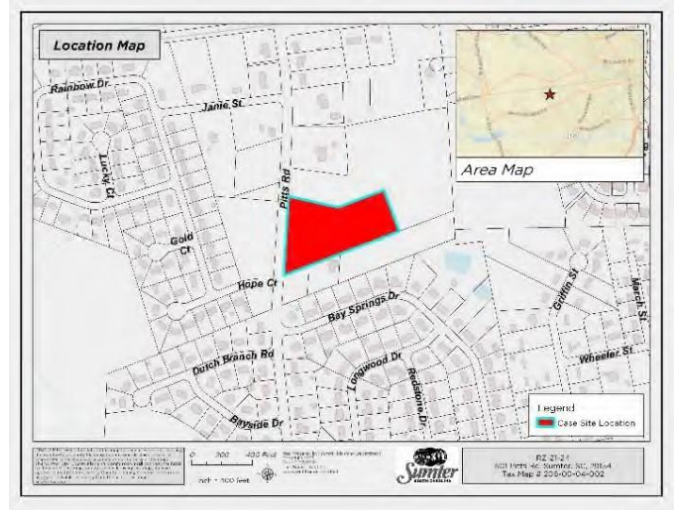

1. **RZ-21-24 - 601 Pitts Road -- (County) – First Reading -- A Request To Rezone +/- +/- 5.8-Acre Tract From Residential-15 (R-15) To Agricultural Conservation (AC). The Property Is Located At 601 Pitts Rd. And Is Represented By Tax Map # 206-00-04-002.**

Mr. Jeff Dewort, Planning Staff, presented this proposed rezoning request to Council for first reading consideration. He stated that this request is to rezone +/- 5.8 acres of land located at 601 Pitts Road (herein referred to as the property) from Residential-15 (R-15) to Agricultural Conservation (AC). As shown by the location map to the right, the property is located on Pitts Road in between Janie Street and Hope Court. The property once operated as a church facility (Victory Full Gospel Non-Denominational). As of this report the building is unoccupied. The property is currently zoned R-15 and is adjacent to R-15 zoning to the north, south, east, and west.



The applicant has indicated that the purpose of this request is to rezone the property to the AC District in order to facilitate the establishment of a Special Events Facility use on the property. This use requires Conditional-300 approval in the AC Zoning District. However, if the rezoning request is approved, the applicant could establish all uses permitted “by right”, via conditional use approval, or via special exception approval in the AC Zoning District, as outlined in *Article 3, Exhibit 5* of the Sumter County Zoning & Development Standards Ordinance and attached to this report as Exhibit 1.

Mr. Dewort also stated that any new development on the property must meet applicable Zoning and Development Standard requirements, which will be reviewed at the time of formal site plan submission.

It was stated by Mr. Dewort that the Planning staff and Planning Commission recommended approval of this rezoning request. After all comments, Chairman McCain called for a motion on first reading of this proposed rezoning request.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Edens, seconded by Councilman Baker, and unanimously carried by Council to grant first reading approval of this proposed rezoning request as presented by the Planning Commission.

2. **RZ-21-22 - 4185/4189 Thomas Sumter Highway -- (County) -- Second Reading/Public Hearing -- A Request To Rezone +/- 1.35-Acres From General Commercial/Agricultural Conservation (GC/AC) To General Commercial (GC). The Property Is Located At 4185/4189 Thomas Sumter Highway And Is Represented By Tax Map #'S 152-03-02-034 And 152-03-02-044. (Council Will Take Action On Second Reading Immediately After The Public Hearing.)**

Mr. Dewort stated that this request is from the applicant, Mr. Christopher Patten. This is a request to rezone two parcels totaling +/- 1.35 acres located on Thomas Sumter Hwy (US-521) (herein referred to as the property) from General Commercial/Agricultural Conservation (GC/AC) zoning to General Commercial (GC) zoning.

The applicant is planning to utilize the subject property, as well as an additional property located at 4179 Thomas Sumter Hwy., for an automotive dealer business (SIC 55). These lots were created prior to the 1999 zoning ordinance and prior to the establishment of the Highway Corridor Protection District (HCPD) overlay. The lot at 4185 Thomas Sumter Highway has been developed and contains two commercial warehouse buildings, one of which houses a plumbing services company. The lot at 4189 Thomas Sumter Highway has not been developed and is currently vacant. The photographs below show the properties as they are today.

The Sumter 2040 Comprehensive Plan shows that the property is influenced by the Military Protection Planning Area (MPA). The MPA is intended to protect Shaw AFB and the Poinsett Electronic Combat Range from encroachment of incompatible land uses and to reduce the accident and noise potential to citizens in areas adjacent to these two critical military installations. Protection of the Shaw AFB mission is the community's primary goal in this area. The MPA recommends commercial, agricultural, and industrial development in this area that limits the concentration of people. New residential development is not supported. This rezoning furthers that objective by converting land to enable a proposed non-residential use.

The Planning Commission and Planning staff recommend approval of this rezoning request. After Mr. Dewort's comments, the Chairman convened a public hearing. He asked if anyone wished to speak in support of or opposition to the rezoning request.

- **Jamie Doyle** stated that she is not against the rezoning request; however, there has been a traffic fatality along the Thomas Sumter Highway; therefore, she was interested in knowing if there will be sidewalks, new lighting, and better ingress and egress along this highway once the new business is open. She was also concerned about the traffic along this highway.
- **Christopher Patten** stated that he is the property owner and he has been in Sumter for approximately three years. Mr. Patten is in the Air Force and is about to retire. His goal is to open a used car dealership as his new venture as a retiree. He said that this is a passion of his have his to own

business. NOTE: Chairman McCain asked Mr. Patten to respond to Ms. Doyle’s concerns. In response to the question from Ms. Doyle, Mr. Patten stated that the location where his property will be is facing Thomas Sumter Highway and at this time, he does not plan to install lighting on Thomas Sumter Highway or place lighting at the location where Ms. Doyle is concerned.

After all comments, the Chairman closed the public hearing and Chairman McCain asked if any Council members had comments or concerns. Councilman Baker stated this proposed rezoning is in his Council District and he is in support of this proposed rezoning request.

Councilman Baten asked if there are any concerns from the public about the buffering from this proposed new car dealership. Councilman Baker stated that the lots in this area are long and there is a natural buffer in this area. It was also noted that the concerns with the lighting would be something that the County will have to look into through the Intersection Street Light Program to see if it rates having a streetlight at this location. Also, the ingress and egress as well as the sidewalks on a state road are things that South Carolina DOT will need to address.

Council members thanked Mr. Patten for wanting to retire in Sumter and for his desire to open a business in the County. Council also thanked Mr. Patten for his service to this Country. Then the Chairman called for a motion on second reading.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Baker, seconded by Councilman Edens, and unanimously carried by Council to grant second reading approval to this rezoning request as presented by the Planning Staff.

OTHER PUBLIC HEARINGS:

- (1) **Ordinance 21-969 -- An Ordinance Amending Ordinance No. 02-461 Concerning The Sumter County Infrastructure Fund. (Council Will Take Action On Second Reading Immediately After The Public Hearing Or During Old Business.)**

County Attorney, Johnathan Bryan, presented this proposed ordinance to Council for public hearing and second reading. Mr. Bryan stated that this proposed ordinance will provide for a mechanism to allow private developers to develop a speculative industrial building for Sumter County. The maximum amount of any such loan will be the lesser of Two Million (\$2,000,000.00) Dollars or Twenty-Five (25%) Percent of the project budget. The interest rate on any such loan will be no less than the same interest rate paid to Sumter County for moneys on deposit in the Sumter County General Fund as administered by the Sumter County Treasurer. Such a loan will be secured by a mortgage on the real property site of the Spec Building and will be payable in full, with interest, upon the earlier of: a) the sale of the real property; or b) occupation of the property by a tenant. Approval of such a loan application shall require a single supermajority vote of five members of Sumter County Council attending and voting in favor of the loan.

After Mr. Bryan’s comments, the Chairman convened a public hearing on this ordinance. He asked if anyone wished to speak in support of or opposition to the ordinance. No one spoke to this issue; therefore, the Chairman closed the public hearing and Council acted on second reading as listed under Old Business.

- (2) **Ordinance 21-970 -- An Ordinance Amending Ordinance 21-950 Of Sumter County, South Carolina (The 2021-2122 Sumter County Budget Ordinance) By Changing The Amount Of Anticipated Funds, Moneys**

And Revenues Estimated To Be Received By Sumter County From All Resources And Changing The Amount To Be Allocated Toward The 2021-2022 Budget Of Sumter County. (Council Will Take Action On Second Reading Immediately After The Public Hearing Or During Old Business.)

This item was removed from the agenda.

The County Attorney gave a presentation on this ordinance as listed under Other Public Hearings. After Mr. Bryan's presentation, the public hearing was held, and then Council acted on second reading.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Edens, seconded by Councilman Baten, and unanimously carried by Council to grant second reading approval to this proposed ordinance.

- (2) **Ordinance 21-970 -- Second Reading** -- An Ordinance Amending Ordinance 21-950 Of Sumter County, South Carolina (The 2021-2122 Sumter County Budget Ordinance) By Changing The Amount Of Anticipated Funds, Moneys And Revenues Estimated To Be Received By Sumter County From All Resources And Changing The Amount To Be Allocated Toward The 2021-2022 Budget Of Sumter County.

This item was removed from the Agenda.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

- (1) Public Safety Committee Meeting Scheduled For Tuesday, January 11, 2022, At 5:00 p.m. In The County Administrator's Conference Room, 13 E. Canal Street, Sumter SC. (Washington, Baten, and Byrd)

The Chairman of the Public Safety Committee, Councilman Washington, gave the following report to Council.

1. The Committee held an executive session and received a briefing from the Sheriff and his staff. No action was taking.
2. The Committee received a report from the Honorable Anthony Dennis, Sheriff for Sumter County, and his staff concerning the awarding of a Grant which will fund five additional resource officers throughout Sumter School District. The grant is in the amount of \$400,000 and will cover the expenses for salaries, benefits, etc. Also, it was stated that this is not a one-time fee; it is a reoccurring grant for Sumter County from the School District.

- (2) Special Meeting Of Sumter County Council Scheduled For Tuesday, January 11, 2022, at 5:30 p.m. In County Administration Conference Room, 13 E. Canal Street, Sumter, SC. (This Meeting Will Begin Immediately After The Public Safety Committee Meeting Concludes Or At 5:30 p.m.) (All Council Members)

Chairman McCain reported that Sumter County Council did receive a report concerning the initial preparation for the Sumter County Council Redistricting Lines as based on the 2020 census. This is not the final product, it is only the beginning stage. The Clerk to Council will coordinate meetings between Council members and staff to allow Sumter County's Mapping Department to prepare for scheduled meetings concerning this matter.

- (3) Report From Council Members On Other Meetings, Trainings, And/Or Conferences.

- Councilman McGhaney thanked the Administrator, Mrs. Dennis, and Mrs. Blanding for setting up the community meetings for the possibility of a 2023 Penny for Progress. The community meetings have been very positive and she stated that she looks forward to the Thursday, January 13, 2022, meeting at Ebenezer Community Center. Councilman McGhaney also stated that she and Councilman Baker share the voters in this community area.
- Councilman Washington stated that the community members of District 1 met after the community meeting that was held in the District concerning the proposed 2023 Penny for Progress which would be voted on in November of 2022. He stated that the number one request for his district is County Roads (paving, resurfacing, rocking, maintenance schedule, etc.). He stated that the community also would like to place another item on their wish list and Councilman Washington said that he will be back before Council to discuss this matter.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Mr. Gary Mixon, the County Administrator, thanked Councilman McGhaney for her comments and also thanked each Council member that attended the 2022 Penny Project Community Meetings throughout the Sumter area and Council's Districts. There have seven community meetings that were scheduled. Approximately 150 attended the meetings.

The next step in these meetings would include the stakeholders and the first group would be the Incorporated Areas of Sumter County which would be the City of Sumter, the Town of Mayesville, and the Town of

Pinewood. Other meetings that will be held will include: Economic Development Board, the Chamber of Commerce, and Central Carolina Technical College.

Once all the information is compiled, then review the projects and provide estimated cost for the projects, this information will be passed along to a newly formed Capital Projects Sales Tax Commission. The Commission will have a month and a half to review the information and receive additional information from staff and other entities to allow the Commission to decide as to what projects should be included in the Ordinance which will be voted on by Sumter County Council. If County Council vote favorably on the Ordinance, the proposed referendum would be placed on the November 2022 ballot to vote in favor of or opposing to the ballot question.

Report From Council Members

Councilman Baten asked to be heard concerning the COVID-19 report. He stated that he is very concerned about people not being vaccinated. These people are taking up approximately 80% to 90% of the hospital bed space and most of the ICU space at hospitals. He stated that this COVID problem will never be solved if people do not get vaccinated.

Additionally, Councilman Baten gave the following report about Veterans:

As of January 11, 2022, 208 veterans that have died since December 8, 2021; every 14 days, a veteran dies. 75 years of age is the average age; the range of age is from 27-100 years of age; the demographics for the races that have died are: 143 Caucasians; 65 African Americans. The military breakdown is as follows: 95 Air Force; 73, Army; 17, Navy; 6 Marine, 10 National Guard. He reiterated that people must wear their masks and asked the Clerk to place in the minutes that *“Councilman Baten is encouraging all the citizens of Sumter County that are 5 years old and above to get vaccinated.”*

PUBLIC COMMENT -- *Citizens Desiring To Speak Are Limited To No More Than Three (3) Minutes; Comments Are To Be Made Through The Chairman Of Sumter County Council.*

George Bates: He asked Council members four things to assist the citizens of Sumter County.

1. The Sheriff Department has 14 slots that need to be filled. If these slots are funded and people hired, they the County would not have so many issues with crime.
2. County Roads are patched, but nothing is done for the drainage.
3. Drainage must be a focus.
4. Codes Enforcement needs to help the citizens.

He also stated that he agrees with Councilman Baten; however, he added that vaccination is not the only thing that needs to be done. Wearing a mask and social distancing is a must so that we do not keep passing this virus to people that are unvaccinated and those that are vaccinated.

Mike Grier: Mr. Grier stated that he lives out in the Wedgefield community. He also said that he is trying to build a house. He then stated that his daughter got vaccinated and she still got the virus. He told Council that he is trying to stay social distancing, but he has to work and build his house on the weekends.

He told Council that he appreciates Council’s work; but someone cut down a tree in Wedgefield and put the tree limbs in the ditch. He then spoke to Council about the work he is trying to do as he builds a new house for him and his family and the material is beginning to cost more and some of the material is coming in later. Yet, the Building Department’s permit and requirements are not meeting the demands of the time he has had with his child being sick and the family being quarantined. He said that he does not have the hours he needs

to build the house to meet the demands of the Building Code Department. He added that he is worried about his children and his family.

Councilman Baten stopped Mr. Grier and said that he was talking six minutes and he is concerned about his problems. However, Council members always allow 3 minutes for each person to talk and Councilman Baten stated that he did not want to start a precedent to allow citizens to talk for six minutes.

Councilman McGhaney asked the Chairman if he could refer Mr. Grier to someone about the building code problems. It was asked that the County Administrator speak to Mr. Grier.

Comments From Council Members

- Councilman Washington stated that both gentlemen that spoke this evening talked about the need for help with roads in Sumter County. He stated that he considers road improvements as a basic service and We as members of Sumter County are failing horribly with roads. There are many things that had been done in Sumter which includes a five-million-dollar tennis center, fifteen million dollars on the Opera House, and folks are suffering because of roads, particularly in the rural areas. They roads are worse in the rural areas than they are in the City of Sumter. Councilman Washington stated that we are going to have to address roads. The Capital Penny Tax, as good as it has been, the margins have been directed towards the City of Sumter more than the rural areas. The rural citizens pay taxes just like the City folks pay taxes and most of us on Council represent County folks, except maybe one or two. Council has not taken any action to give these folks some relief. Councilman Washington then said that he wants Council members to be thinking about their plans to provide these folks basic services to meet their needs so that the roads are passable, so that the roads do not cause problems for their tires, alignments issues, and the list goes on and on. Councilman Washington said he will be coming back and ask Council members to address these issues in a significant way; these folk need help. He further stated that it is Council's job to help these folks, that is what Government is for. Yet County Council has been failing in that regard.
- Councilman Baker stated that a lot of the roads that were discussed this evening are State Roads. There are roads that the County will not work on. Councilman Baker said that when he first came on Council there were 300 plus miles of dirt roads. Currently, there is 127-miles of dirt roads and fifty-five miles of crusher run roads. He further stated that he is concerned about the dirt roads and it is his hope that a good portion of the Capital Penny Sales Tax will go towards County Road issues. It was noted by Councilman Baker that he would like to see at least \$17,000,000 for roads. Councilman Baker said that he believes the County has made some progress, maybe not as fast as Councilman Washington would like it, but things have been done.
- Councilman Washington said he appreciated the Councilman from Dalzell in his regard about the roads. However, Councilman Washington said that he is looking at the disbursement of the Capital Penny and it shows that the majority of the money went to downtown projects; there were 60 projects. More than half of those projects went to City Projects when there are folks out in the rural area that cannot drive down the highway because they are dodging pot holes. He added that that is not what government should be doing. If State officials can spend \$15,000,000 for an Opera Center, \$5,000,000 for a Tennis Center; we ought to be able to provide basic services for the County's citizens for the roads. That is Council's job, and Council members ought to be doing their job; not doing the job of Council is not what constituents want. He also said that he hears things in the street, citizens call him, and the needs of the City is not what they email him about and call him about whether it is in his district or other Council districts. The number one thing Council should be working on is the road issue. The City, however, is interested in Swan Lake, the Tennis Center, the Opera House, and other projects within the City. Sumter

County Council has to protect rural projects just like the City protects residents in the City. Otherwise, Council members will see a backlash from rural residents that may not ever vote for the Penny Tax because they feel that they are being left out. That is what is brewing in the rural areas.

- Councilman Baten stated that he supports Councilman Washington 100% because he has the district that has the most rural roads. However, what Council members and the public must understand is that it goes on the referendum and it is not just people that live in the County who will vote on the referendum. It will be people that live in the City as well as the County. If the City people do not see that there is anything on the referendum for them and all the money is going to the County, why would they vote for the tax. We, the City and County, have to be balanced. Councilman Baten stated that the County can dedicate more of its projects to roads while the City uses its projects for other needs of the City. Councilman Baten further stated that he remembers when Council tried to pass a penny tax for the first time, for only a three-year term, and Council asked for a Water Park. This project was defeated. Council did not give up and put other things on the ballot. It was only passed by 51%. Councilman Baten stated that the County did not have community centers in Council District #7; therefore, two community centers were placed on the referendum for the Penny Tax. Once the election was completed, the Election Commission informed Councilman Baten that District #7 citizens helped the referendum to pass because the majority of those citizens voted in favor of the tax. Councilman Baten further stated that we must be careful because the City has needs and the County depends on the residents of the City to help the County pass this referendum. He restated his comment that let the County vote the majority of its projects to roads. Lastly, he stated that we should not disregard the City because the City has needs too.
- Councilman Washington stated that he understands what Councilman Baten is saying, but he has to represent the citizens of District #1 and those Citizens are telling him that when the City projects were placed on the ballot; the County folks help the City to get what they wanted. Now the County folks are wanting the same thing from the City. Councilman Washington stated that the County has left rural citizens by the wayside without giving them basic services. He said that this is not how you run a government and that is not what the people deserve and the County needs to do better. If Council agrees as a start to dedicate half of the funds to rural roads, may be that is something that can be talked about. However, the people of District 1 and some people in District 7 are wanting a separate penny just for roads. Councilman Washington stated that it seems that the County is concerned about what the City citizens will do or won't do. He then stated that the County needs to be concerned about what the County citizens will or will not do. The County citizens are fed up, and they do not have much faith in the process. Councilman Washington stated that he raised this concern before about the Litter Program. He asked why County Council would pass off Council's responsibility to a committee to pave roads. Council members know what the needs are for the roads in each district. Councilman Washington said that Council members should be intimately involved with what roads are paved, resurfaced, etc. He also said that Council appoints these citizen committees because Council does not want to make the hard decisions. Councilman Washington then stated that is not why he came on Council. He came on Council to make the hard decisions and he came on Council to stand behind any vote that he makes. Lastly, he said that Council is lacking on basic services; road issues are basic services. It needs to be #1 on Council's priority list. Councilman Washington then stated that he read an article about the City stating that they are having problems in addressing the road issues within the City limits. He stated that he will send the article to Council members.
- Councilman Baten said that he understands the needs of Councilman Washington's District. He also said that he believes that Councilman Washington is misunderstanding what he is trying to say. Council members can make rural roads the number one project for the County and then get the support from all

citizens to support the road needs. He further stated, let us not turn the City off because we will need them to pass the referendum.

- Councilman Washington said that he is willing to talk to each Council member about the best way to address this issue; but he also said that he is not willing to allow this issue to be pushed under the rug yet again.

ADJOURNMENT; After MOTION by Councilman Baker, seconded by Councilman Edens, and unanimously carried by Council, the meeting adjourned at 7:08 p.m.
