I. THE REQUEST

Applicant: Dr. James Goodson (Millwood Plantation)

Status of the Applicant: Property Owner

Request: A request to rezone a +/- 5.8 acre portion of the subject property

from Residential-15 (R-15) to Agricultural Conservation (AC).

Location: 2020 Loring Mill Rd.

Size of Property: +/- 10.9 acres

II. BACKGROUND


This request is to rezone +/- 5.8 acres, from an overall 10.9 acre parcel of land, from Residential-15 (R-15) to Agricultural Conservation (AC).

As shown in the graphic to the right, the subject property fronts on the west side of Loring Mill Rd. The property is directly adjacent to an electrical utility station to the north and vacant land in all other directions.


The overall property is a remnant parcel from the parent tract used to create the Lees Preserve Subdivision (SD 12-02).



The property was not a part of the actual lots created out of this subdivision because of the constraints that exist on this particular parcel, primarily a 100' wide Central Electric Co-Op power easement that bisects the center of the property. See below graphic.



The property currently lies within three separate zoning districts as follows: \pm 4.54 acres AC, \pm 5.66 acres GC, and \pm 7.580 acres R-15. The applicant is requesting to rezone the R-15 zoned portion of the property only. See below graphic.



If successfully rezoned, the applicant has referenced plans to construct a personal storage building on the property in the near future and perhaps a principal residential structure in the more long term future. The County Zoning & Development Standards Ordinance allows AC zoned properties that are greater than 5 acres in size to have a residential accessory structure on them prior to the construction of a principal dwelling unit. In this case, the amount of property that is zoned AC, and would thus allow for a residential accessory structure prior to a principle dwelling unit, is under 5 acres in size. Additional AC zoned property is needed for the applicant to carry out his plans of building personal storage building on the property.

III. COMPATIBILITY WITH THE 2030 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

The property is located in the Military Protection Planning Area within the 2030 Comprehensive Plan. This planning area is intended to protect Shaw Air Force Base and Poinsett Electronic Combat Range from encroachment of incompatible land uses and reduce the accident and noise potential to citizens in areas adjacent to these two critical military installations.

The purpose of the AC Zoning District is to protect and preserve areas of the county which are presently rural agricultural in character or use, and are uniquely suited to agricultural use. This permits an array of uses that are compatible with a rural environment. It should be noted that some commercial uses are allowed in the AC District as conditional uses provided that two thirds of the property owners within a specified distance sign off on approval of the use.



The proposed rezoning meets the stated policies of the Military Protection Planning Area, particularly the support for very low-density residential types of one acre or more. The AC District minimum lot size is one (1) acre.

IV. TRAFFIC REVIEW

The 2016 AADT for this section of Loring Mill Rd. is 4,000 vehicles per day. The road is functionally classified by SCDOT as a collector.

Loring Mill Rd. is state owned, and access to the property would require approval of a SCDOT encroachment permit.

V. STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of this request to rezone +/- 5.8 acres of the subject property from R-15 to AC. The property is directly adjacent to surrounding properties that are also zoned AC. Additionally, the rezoning will reduce the amount of residential density permitted on the +/- 5.8 acre area, which is in line with Military Protection Planning Area policies that are applicable to the location of the property.

Hillcrest named state finalist with mobile app project



Hillcrest Middle School is one of five state finalists in the Samsung Solve for Tomorrow Contest. The contest challenges students in grades six-12 to show how STEAM can be applied to help improve their local communities. Richard Phillips' class was chosen as a finalist based on their proposal to use STEAM skills to address

school-based emergency management.

The students are developing an app to serve as an early warning system for schools. Phillips won a Samsung Chromebook and is working on an activity plan outlining how the students will execute the project. If he is chosen as the state winner, Hillcrest will receive a \$25,000 Samsung technology package.

The Sumter Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution recently donated \$300 to support STEM efforts in Sumter School District. Science coordinator Lori Smith offered it to science teachers as a contest, with the ideas for the best use of the money in STEM-related efforts. Phillips also won the DAR money and will use some of it in the development of the emergency management app.

Schools recognized for fundraising

The American Cancer Society's Relay for Life representatives recognized the top five schools in Sumter School District for their fundraising efforts. Crestwood High School led the pack with \$11,204.87. Alice Drive Elementary School raised \$3,372.16, followed by Ebenezer Middle School with \$3,022.01. Oakland Primary School turned in and Willow Drive \$2,211.23, Elementary School contributed \$2,093.

The entire county-wide event raised more than \$98,000, and Sumter School District raised \$40,080.18 of the total. Relay for Life is held annually in May at Crolley Stadium, behind Hillcrest Middle School. Crestwood was the top fundraiser for the entire event.

Superintendent Debbie Hamm, City Councilman Steve Corley, and Chip Chase from FTC visited the winners at their schools to present their awards. The winners received a framed copy of the holiday card and an iPad courtesy of FTC, and the runners-up received gift cards.
