NEW BUSINESS:

1. <u>A Resolution Adopting The Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan For The Santee-Lynches Council On</u> <u>Governments Region</u>.

Chairman McCain stated that the Clerk to Council had presented a copy of this proposed resolution to members of Sumter County Council. He asked if there were no changes to the resolution, then he would entertain a motion for its adoption.

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Sumpter, seconded by Councilman Baker, and unanimously carried by Council to approve the resolution as presented and directed that the appropriate signatures be affixed to this document and delivered to the appropriate agencies/departments on behalf of the County.

Whereas, Sumter County Government recognizes the threat that natural hazards pose to people and property; and

Whereas, undertaking hazard mitigation actions before disasters occur will reduce the potential for harm to people and property and save taxpayer dollars; and

Whereas, an adopted hazard mitigation plan is required as a condition of future grant funding of mitigation projects; and

Whereas, Sumter County Government participated jointly in the planning process with the other units of government in the Santee-Lynches Region to prepare a hazard mitigation plan; and

Whereas, Sumter County Government is aware that revising and updating the plan is critical for active and effective hazard mitigation and that Sumter County Government will monitor and record hazard related data and events that can be used to update all hazards mitigation plan; and

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the Sumter County Government hereby accepts and approves the Sumter County Hazard Mitigation Plan Update 2020-2025 and its designated portion in its entirety as its official plan and will undertake annual recording of its hazard events, their impact duration and cost.

Be it further resolved, that the Sumter County Council, accepts the updated Hazard Mitigation Plan from Hazard Mitigation Steering Committee, and the submission on behalf of the participating counties and municipalities the adopted Hazard Plan to the State Emergency Management Division and to the Federal Emergency Management Agency officials for formal review and approval.

2. <u>20-926 – First Reading -- Little John Lane Ordinance No. 20-926 An Ordinance Authorizing The Transfer Of Little John Lane To The Adjoining Property Owners</u>.

Mr. Johnathan Bryan, the County Attorney, presented this ordinance to Council for first reading consideration. He stated that a portion of Little John Lane is a paper street but has not been maintained. Mr. Bryant Simmons hopes to acquire this portion of Little John Lane so that he can maintain this as part of his property and to ensure

that he has engress and regress in this area. Mr. Bryant stated that those that have property abutting to Little John Lane have stated that they are not interest in owning any of the property and Mr. Simmons is interested in. After all comments, the Chairman called for a motion concerning first reading of this ordinance. (See ordinance below.)

ACTION: MOTION was made by Councilman Baten, seconded by Councilman Sumpter, and unanimously carried by Council to grant first reading approval of this ordinance as presented.

WHEREAS, Little John Lane is a street in the Sherwood Forest subdivision that was originally designed to connect Hort Street to Nottingham Drive; and

WHEREAS, the western part of Little John Lane, which connects to Hort Street, was developed and has residences located on both sides but the street was not completed so there now is a separate and unimproved part of Little John Lane connected to Nottingham Drive and appears on Sumter County Tax Map Sheet 268-16; and

WHEREAS, Bryant Simmons owns the property on the southern end of the unimproved section of Little John Lane, identified as 143 Little John Lane and Sumter County Tax Parcel 268-16-02-004; and

WHEREAS, Dorothy Yates owns a house and lot on the southwest of the intersection of Nottingham Drive and the unimproved section of Little John Lane, which is identified as 1004 Nottingham Drive and Sumter County Tax Parcel 268-16-02-005; and

WHEREAS, Gerry R. Doll and Bertha A. Doll own a house and lot on the southeast of the intersection of Nottingham Drive and the unimproved section of Little John Lane which is identified as 1006 Nottingham Drive and Sumter County Tax Parcel 268-16-03-001; and

WHEREAS, Dorothy Yates does not want to take title to any part of Little John Lane, consents to Bryant Simmons receiving title to the unimproved street but still would like to use part of Little John Lane from time to time to access her property: and

WHEREAS, Gerry R. Doll and Bertha A. Doll do not want to take title to any part of Little John Lane, consent to Bryant Simmons receiving title to the unimproved street but still would like to use part of Little John Lane from time to time to access their property; and

WHEREAS, Sumter County has never accepted Little John Lane for maintenance; and

WHEREAS, Sumter County does not currently need the property for any public purpose,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF SUMTER COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, AT ITS REGULAR MEETING DULY ASSEMBLED AND BY THE AUTHORITY THEREOF:

1. That Sumter County hereby abandons its interest in Little John Lane.

2. That the Sumter County Administrator has complete authority to execute any deeds or other legal instruments necessary to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance.

3. That Sumter County confirms easements appurtenant to Dorothy Yates, Gerry R. Doll and Berth A. Doll, and convey to Bryant Simmons by quitclaim deed, its interest in the right-of-way of Little John Lane as shown on the attached proposed revision of the Sumter County Tax Map showing the unimproved section of Little John Lane attached hereto as Exhibit "A."

4. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its adoption.

The increase in revenue for this version is based on a 2.5 mill increase and 1.5% growth based upon valuation estimates from the Assessor.

Operating expenditures were adjusted to accommodate the planning and building departments requests and an increase in property and casualty insurance in the amount of \$307,810, as well as the salary study request in the amount of \$727,000 wage study.

OLD BUSINESS:

1. <u>20-923 – Third Reading --</u> An Ordinance To Rescind Ordinance 18-844 Which Established And Created A Special Tax District Within Sumter County, South Carolina, Known As The "Boyles Pond Special Tax District."

The County Attorney stated that originally, Mr. Henry Veatch, President of Boyles Pond HOA, wrote a letter requesting that Council rescind the ordinance, which established the Special Tax District for Boyles Pond Homeowners to help fund the cost for repairing the Dam. However, since that second reading, Mr. Bryan, the County Attorney, received a second letter from Mr. Veatch asking that Council deny the request to rescind Ordinance 18-844. After comments by Council members, Council took action on third reading of this ordinance. (See both letters from Mr. Veatch listed below.)

- *WHEREAS*, Sumter County does not currently need the property for any public purpose.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF SUMTER COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, AT ITS REGULAR MEETING DULY ASSEMBLED AND BY THE AUTHORITY THEREOF:

- 1. Sumter County shall enter into a Real Estate Purchase Contract in the form of Exhibit A which is attached hereto, the terms of which are incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. This Ordinance shall be effective upon Third Reading.
- 3. Proceeds of the sale shall be distributed to the Sumter County Infrastructure Fund.
- 4. The County Administrator is authorized to sign the Real Estate Purchase Contract, the deed and any other documents necessary to convey the property to the Buyer, Sarah Tiller-Ford.
- 5. Ordinance No. 17-872, which authorized the sale of the same property to Edward Tiller, is hereby rescinded and any purported obligation to sell to Edward Tiller is hereby declared void and of no effect.

The Seller agrees to sell, and the Purchaser agrees to buy the following described property: All that certain piece, parcel and lot of land, with the improvements thereon, if any, lying, being and situate in Sumter County, South Carolina, shown on plat recorded in PB 92 at page 822 recorded in the Office of the Register of Deeds for Sumter County. This is the same property known as 1710 South Guignard Parkway, Sumter County, SC Tax Parcel No. 225-00-03-020.

The terms and conditions of this contract of sale are as follows: Total purchase price (\$5,000.00), payable as follows: Earnest money Deposit in the amount of $\frac{N/A}{Dollars}$; Purchase price (\$5,000.00) to be paid in full at closing, in cash or certified funds.

- 1. Loan processing and application: This contract is NOT contingent upon Buyer obtaining any financing.
- 2. Consideration: The mutual promises of the parties and obligations contained herein.
- The Seller covenants and agrees to convey the said property to the purchaser in fee simple by quit claim deed, free and clear from any encumbrances, liens or defects to title.

Upon receipt of the full purchase price, Seller agrees to convey title by quit claim deed as set forth above, with title to be in the name(s) of <u>Sarah Tiller-Ford</u>; possession of said property will be given to the Buyer at the time of closing.

 Closing Costs: Buyer and Seller agree to pay customary closing costs. Seller's closing costs shall include cost of deed preparation, documentary stamps, and all other customary Seller's closing costs.

ORDINANCE NO. 20-____

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS, SERIES 2020, OR SUCH OTHER APPROPRIATE SERIES DESIGNATION, IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF NOT EXCEEDING \$3,500,000; FIXING THE FORM AND DETAILS OF THE BONDS; AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR TO PRESCRIBE CERTAIN DETAILS RELATING TO THE BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE BONDS AND THE DISPOSITION OF THE PROCEEDS THEREOF; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF SUMTER COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. <u>Findings and Determinations</u>. The County Council (the "County Council"), of Sumter County, South Carolina (the "County"), hereby finds and determines:

(a) Pursuant to Section 4-9-10, Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended (the "S.C. Code"), and the results of a referendum held in accordance therewith, the Council-Administrator form of government was adopted and the County Council constitutes the governing body of the County.

(b) Article X, Section 14 of the Constitution of the State of South Carolina, 1895, as amended (the "Constitution"), provides that each county shall have the power to incur bonded indebtedness in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as the General Assembly shall prescribe by general law. Such debt must be incurred for a public purpose and a corporate purpose in an amount not exceeding eight percent (8%) of the assessed value of all taxable property of such county.

(c) Pursuant to Title 4, Chapter 15 of the S.C. Code (the same being and hereinafter referred to as the "County Bond Act"), the governing bodies of the several counties of the State of South Carolina (the "State") may each issue general obligation bonds to defray the cost of any authorized purpose and for any amount not exceeding its applicable constitutional limit.

(d) The County Bond Act provides that as a condition precedent to the issuance of bonds an election be held and the result be favorable thereto. Title 11, Chapter 27 of the S.C. Code provides that if an election be prescribed by the provisions of the County Bond Act, but not be required by the provisions of Article X of the Constitution, then in every such instance, no election need be held (notwithstanding the requirement therefor) and the remaining provisions of the County Bond Act shall constitute a full and complete authorization to issue bonds in accordance with such remaining provisions.

(e) Pursuant to Ordinance No. 12-772 adopted by County Council on August 14, 2012, the County has adopted Written Procedures related to Tax-Exempt Debt.

(f) The assessed value of all the taxable property in the County as of June 30, 2019, is \$311,027,440. Eight percent (8%) of the assessed value is \$24,882,195. As of the date hereof, the outstanding general obligation debt of the County subject to the limitation imposed by Article X, Section 14(7) of the Constitution is \$7,049,000. Thus, the County may incur not exceeding \$17,883,195 of additional general obligation debt within its applicable debt limitation.

(g) It is necessary and in the best interest of the County for the County Council to provide for the issuance and sale of general obligation bonds in an amount of not exceeding \$3,500,000, the proceeds of which will be used for: (i) funding capital projects (the "Projects"); (ii) paying costs of issuance of the Bonds (hereinafter defined); and (iii) such other lawful purposes as the County Council shall determine.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. <u>Authorization and Details of Bonds</u>. Pursuant to the aforesaid provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State, there is hereby authorized to be issued not exceeding \$3,500,000 aggregate principal amount of general obligation bonds (the "Bonds") of the County, for the purposes set forth in Section 1(g) and other costs incidental thereto, including without limiting the generality of such other costs, engineering, financial and legal fees.

The Bonds shall be issued as fully registered bonds registrable as to principal and interest; shall be dated their date of delivery to the initial purchaser(s) thereof; shall be in denominations of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof not exceeding the principal amount of Bonds maturing each year; shall be subject to redemption if such provision is in the best interest of the County; shall be numbered from R-1 upward; shall bear interest from their date payable at such times as hereinafter designated by the County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee at such rate or rates as may be determined at the time of the sale thereof; and shall mature serially in successive annual installments as determined by the County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> Delegation of Authority to Determine Certain Matters Relating to the Bonds. Without further authorization, the County Council hereby delegates to the County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee the authority to determine: (a) the par amount of the Bonds; (b) the maturity dates of the Bonds and the respective principal amounts maturing on such dates; (c) the interest payment dates of the Bonds; (d) redemption provisions, if any, for the Bonds; (e) the date and time of sale of the Bonds; (f) whether the Bonds will be publicly traded or placed with a bank; and (g) the authority to receive bids on behalf of the County Council and to award the sale of the Bonds in accordance with the terms of the Notice of Sale or Request for Proposals for the Bonds.

After the sale of the Bonds, the County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee shall submit a written report to County Council setting forth the details of the Bonds as set forth in this paragraph.

<u>SECTION 4</u>. <u>Registration, Transfer and Exchange of Bonds</u>. The County shall cause books (herein referred to as the "registry books") to be kept at the offices of the Registrar/Paying Agent, for the registration and transfer of the Bonds. Upon presentation at its office for such purpose the Registrar/Paying Agent shall register or transfer, or cause to be registered or transferred, on such registry books, the Bonds under such reasonable regulations as the Registrar/Paying Agent may prescribe.

Each Bond shall be transferable only upon the registry books of the County, which shall be kept for such purpose at the principal office of the Registrar/Paying Agent, by the registered owner thereof in person or by his duly authorized attorney upon surrender thereof together with a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Registrar/Paying Agent duly executed by the registered owner or his duly authorized attorney. Upon the transfer of any such Bond the Registrar/Paying Agent on behalf of the County shall issue in the name of the transferee a new fully registered Bond or Bonds, of the same aggregate principal amount, interest rate, and maturity as the surrendered Bond. Any Bond surrendered in exchange for a new registered Bond pursuant to this Section shall be canceled by the Registrar/Paying Agent. The County and the Registrar/Paying Agent may deem or treat the person in whose name any fully registered Bond shall be registered upon the registry books as the absolute owner of such Bond, whether such Bond shall be overdue or not, for the purpose of receiving payment of the principal of and interest on such Bond and for all other purposes and all such payments so made to any such registered owner or upon his order shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Bond to the extent of the sum or sums so paid, and neither the County nor the Registrar/Paying Agent shall be affected by any notice to the contrary. In all cases in which the privilege of transferring Bonds is exercised, the County shall execute and the Registrar/Paying Agent shall authenticate and deliver Bonds in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance. Neither the County nor the Registrar/Paying Agent shall be obliged to make any such transfer of Bonds during the fifteen (15) days preceding an interest payment date on such Bonds.

<u>SECTION 5.</u> <u>Record Date</u>. The County hereby establishes a record date for the payment of interest or for the giving of notice of any proposed redemption of Bonds, and such record date shall be the fifteenth (15th) day (whether or not a business day) preceding an interest payment date on such Bond or in the case of any proposed redemption of Bonds, such record date shall be the fifteenth (15th) day (whether or not a business day) prior to the giving of notice of redemption of bonds.

SECTION 6. Mutilation, Loss, Theft or Destruction of Bonds. In case any Bond shall at any time become mutilated in whole or in part, or be lost, stolen or destroyed, or be so defaced as to impair the value thereof to the owner, the County shall execute and the Registrar shall authenticate and deliver at the principal office of the Registrar, or send by registered mail to the owner thereof at his request, risk and expense a new Bond of the same series, interest rate and maturity and of like tenor and effect in exchange or substitution for and upon the surrender for cancellation of such defaced, mutilated or partly destroyed Bond, or in lieu of or in substitution for such lost, stolen or destroyed Bond. In any such event the applicant for the issuance of a substitute Bond shall furnish the County and the Registrar evidence or proof satisfactory to the County and the Registrar of the loss, destruction, mutilation, defacement or theft of the original Bond, and of the ownership thereof, and also such security and indemnity in an amount as may be required by the laws of the State or such greater amount as may be required by the County and the Registrar. Any duplicate Bond issued under the provisions of this Section in exchange and substitution for any defaced, mutilated or partly destroyed Bond or in substitution for any allegedly lost, stolen or wholly destroyed Bond shall be entitled to the identical benefits under this Ordinance as was the original Bond in lieu of which such duplicate Bond is issued, and shall be entitled to equal and proportionate benefits with all the other Bonds of the same series issued hereunder.

All expenses necessary for the providing of any duplicate Bond shall be borne by the applicant therefor.

<u>SECTION 7</u>. Execution of Bonds. The Bonds shall be executed in the name of the County with the manual or facsimile signature of the Chair of the County Council attested by the manual or facsimile signature of the Clerk to the County Council under the seal of the County impressed, imprinted or reproduced thereon; provided, however, the facsimile signatures appearing on the Bonds may be those of the officers who are not in office on the date of enactment of this Ordinance. The execution of the Bonds in such fashion shall be valid and effectual, notwithstanding any subsequent change in such offices. The Bonds shall not be valid or become obligatory for any purpose unless there shall have been endorsed thereon a certificate of authentication. Each Bond shall bear a certificate of authentication manually executed by the Registrar in substantially the form set forth herein.

<u>SECTION 8</u>. Form of Bonds. The Bonds and the certificate of authentication shall be in substantially the form set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto.

SECTION 9. Security for Bonds. The full faith, credit, and taxing power of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds as they respectively mature, and for the creation of such sinking fund as may be necessary therefor. There shall be levied annually by the Sumter County Auditor (the "County Auditor") and collected by the Sumter County Treasurer (the "County Treasurer"), in the same manner as other county taxes are levied and collected, a tax, without limit, on all taxable property in the County sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds as they respectively mature and to create such sinking fund as may be necessary therefor.

The County Council shall give the County Auditor and County Treasurer written notice of the delivery of and payment for the Bonds and they are hereby directed to levy and collect annually, on all taxable property in the County, a tax, without limit, sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds as they respectively mature and to create such sinking fund as may be necessary therefor.

SECTION 10. Notice of Public Hearing. The County Council hereby ratifies and approves the publication of a notice of public hearing regarding the Bonds and this Ordinance, such notice in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit B, having been published in *The Item*, a newspaper of general circulation in the County, not less than 15 days prior to the date of such public hearing.

<u>SECTION 11</u>. <u>Initiative and Referendum</u>. The County Council hereby delegates to the County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee the authority to determine whether the Notice prescribed under the provisions of Section 5 of Title 11, Chapter 27 of the S.C. Code relating to the initiative and referendum provisions contained in Title 4, Chapter 9, Article 13 of the S.C. Code shall be given with respect to this Ordinance. If said Notice is given, the County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee are authorized to cause such Notice to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County, in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit C.

<u>SECTION 12</u>. Exemption from State Taxes. Both the principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be exempt, in accordance with the provisions of Section 12-2-50 of the S.C. Code from all State, county, municipal, school district and all other taxes or assessments, except estate or other transfer taxes, direct or indirect, general or special, whether imposed for the purpose of general revenue or otherwise.

SECTION 13. Reimbursement of Certain Expenditures. This Ordinance shall constitute the County's declaration of official intent pursuant to Regulation §1.150-2 of the Internal Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), to reimburse the County from a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds for expenditures it anticipates incurring (the "Expenditures") with respect to the Project prior to the issuance of the Bonds. The Expenditures which are reimbursed are limited to Expenditures which are: (1) properly chargeable to a capital account (or would be so chargeable with a proper election or with the application of the definition of placed in service under Regulation §1.150-2 of the Code) under general federal income tax principals; or (2) certain de minimis or preliminary Expenditures with respect to the Project will be the County's reserve funds or other legally available funds. To be eligible for reimbursement of the Expenditures, the reimbursement allocation must be made not later than 18 months after the later of (a) the date on which the Expenditures were paid; or (b) the date such projects were placed in service, but in no event more than three (3) years after the original Expenditures.

SECTION 14. Federal Tax Covenants. The County hereby covenants and agrees with the holders of the Bonds that it will not take any action which will, or fail to take any action which failure will, cause interest on the Bonds to become includable in the gross income of the holders of the Bonds for federal income tax purposes pursuant to the provisions of the Code and regulations promulgated thereunder in effect on the date of original issuance of the Bonds. The County further covenants and agrees with the holders of the Bonds that no use of the proceeds of the Bonds shall be made which, if such use had been reasonably expected on the date of issue of the Bonds would have caused the Bonds to be "arbitrage bonds," as defined in Section 148 of the Code, and to that end the County hereby shall:

(a) comply with the applicable provisions of Sections 103 and 141 through 150 of the Code and any regulations promulgated thereunder so long as the Bonds are outstanding;

(b) establish such funds, make such calculations and pay such amounts, in the manner and at the times required in order to comply with the requirements of the Code relating to required rebates of certain amounts to the United States; and

Code.

(c) make such reports of such information at the time and places required by the

<u>SECTION 15.</u> <u>Book-Entry System</u>. The Bonds initially issued (the "Initial Bonds") will be eligible securities for the purposes of the book-entry system of transfer maintained by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), and transfers of beneficial ownership of the Initial Bonds shall be made only through DTC and its participants in accordance with rules specified by DTC. Such beneficial ownership must be of \$5,000 principal amount of Bonds of the same maturity or any integral multiple of \$5,000.

The Initial Bonds shall be issued in fully-registered form, one Bond for each of the maturities of the Bonds, in the name of Cede & Co., as the nominee of DTC. When any principal of or interest on the Initial Bonds becomes due, the Paying Agent, on behalf of the County, shall transmit to DTC an amount equal to such installment of principal and interest. DTC shall remit such payments to the beneficial owners of the Bonds or their nominees in accordance with its rules and regulations.

Notices of redemption of the Initial Bonds or any portion thereof shall be sent to DTC in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinance.

If (a) DTC determines not to continue to act as securities depository for the Bonds, or (b) the County has advised DTC of its determination that DTC is incapable of discharging its duties, the County shall attempt to retain another qualified securities depository to replace DTC. Upon receipt by the County the Initial Bonds together with an assignment duly executed by DTC, the County shall execute and deliver to the successor securities depository Bonds of the same principal amount, interest rate, and maturity registered in the name of such successor.

If the County is unable to retain a qualified successor to DTC or the County has determined that it is in its best interest not to continue the book-entry system of transfer or that interests of the beneficial owners of the Bonds might be adversely affected if the book-entry system of transfer is continued (the County undertakes no obligation to make any investigation to determine the occurrence of any events that would permit it to make any such determination), and has made provision to so notify beneficial owners of the Bonds by mailing an appropriate notice to DTC, upon receipt by the County the Initial Bonds together with an assignment duly executed by DTC, the County shall execute, authenticate and deliver to the DTC participants Bonds in fully-registered form, in substantially the form set forth in Section 8 of this Ordinance in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, at the request of the purchaser, the Bonds will be issued as one single fully-registered bond and not issued through the book-entry system.

<u>SECTION 16</u>. Sale of Bonds, Form of Notice of Sale. The Bonds shall be offered for public sale on the date and at the time designated by the County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee. A Notice of Sale in substantially the form set forth as Exhibit D attached hereto shall be distributed to prospective bidders and a summary of such Notice of Sale shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the State and/or in a financial publication published in the City of New York not less than seven (7) days prior to the date set for such sale.

<u>SECTION 17</u>. <u>Preliminary and Final Official Statement</u>. The County Council hereby authorizes and directs the County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee to prepare, or cause to be prepared, a Preliminary Official Statement to be distributed to prospective purchasers of the Bonds together with the Notice of Sale. The County Council authorizes the County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee to designate the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" for purposes of Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (the "Rule"). The County Administrator and/or his lawfully-authorized designee are further authorized to see to the completion of the final form of the Official Statement upon the sale of the Bonds so that it may be provided to the purchaser of the Bonds.

<u>SECTION 18</u>. <u>Filings with Central Repository</u>. In compliance with Section 11-1-85 of the S.C. Code, the County covenants that it will file or cause to be filed with a central repository for availability in the secondary bond market when requested: (a) a copy of the annual financial report of the County within thirty (30) days from the County's receipt thereof; and (b) within thirty (30) days of the occurrence thereof, relevant information of an event which adversely affects more than five (5%) percent of the revenues of the County's tax base.

<u>SECTION 19.</u> <u>Continuing Disclosure</u>. In compliance with the Rule, the County covenants and agrees for the benefit of the holders from time to time of the Bonds to execute and deliver prior to closing, and to thereafter comply with the terms of a Continuing Disclosure Certificate in substantially the form appearing as Exhibit E attached to this Ordinance. In the event of a failure of the County to comply with any of the provisions of the Continuing Disclosure Certificate, an event of default under this Ordinance shall not be deemed to have occurred. In such event, the sole remedy of any bondholder or beneficial owner shall be an action to comple performance by this Ordinance.

SECTION 20. Bank Placement. In the event the Bonds are sold to a bank pursuant to Section 16 above, the requirements of Sections 15, 17 and 19 hereof shall not be applicable, and the County may serve as Registrar/Paying Agent as described in Section 4 hereof. Also, forms of the attachments to this Ordinance will be revised as necessary and appropriate.

<u>SECTION 21</u>. <u>Deposit and Use of Proceeds</u>. The proceeds derived from the sale of the Bonds shall be deposited with the County Treasurer in a special fund and shall be applied solely to the purposes for which the Bonds have been issued, including payment of costs of issuance of the Bonds.

SECTION 22. Defeasance. The obligations of the County under this Ordinance and the pledges, covenants and agreements of the County herein made or provided for, shall be fully discharged and satisfied as to any portion of the Bonds, and such Bond or Bonds shall no longer be deemed to be outstanding hereunder when:

(a) such Bond or Bonds shall have been purchased by the County and surrendered to the County for cancellation or otherwise surrendered to the County or the Paying Agent and is canceled or subject to cancellation by the County or the Paying Agent; or

(b) payment of the principal of and interest on such Bonds either (i) shall have been made or caused to be made in accordance with the terms thereof, or (ii) shall have been provided for by irrevocably depositing with a corporate trustee in trust and irrevocably set aside exclusively for such payment, (1) moneys sufficient to make such payment, or (2) Government Obligations (hereinafter defined) maturing as to principal and interest in such amounts and at such times as will ensure the availability of sufficient moneys to make such payment and all necessary and proper fees, compensation and expenses of the Paying Agent. At such time as the Bonds shall no longer be deemed to be outstanding hereunder, such Bonds shall cease to draw interest from the due date thereof and, except for the purposes of any such payment from such moneys or Government Obligations, shall no longer be secured by or entitled to the benefits of this Ordinance.

"Government Obligations" shall mean any of the following:

- direct obligations of the United States of America or agencies thereof or obligations, the payment of principal or interest on which, in the opinion of the Attorney General of the United States, is fully and unconditionally guaranteed by the United States of America; and
- (ii) non-callable, U. S. Treasury Securities State and Local Government Series ("SLGS").

<u>SECTION 23.</u> <u>Miscellaneous</u>. The County Council hereby authorizes the Chair of the County Council, the Clerk to the County Council, County Administrator, and County Attorney to execute such documents and instruments as necessary to effect the issuance of the Bonds. The County Council hereby retains Burr & Forman LLP, as Bond Counsel and Compass Municipal Advisors, LLC, as Financial Advisor in connection with the issuance of the Bonds. The County Administrator is authorized to execute such contracts, documents or engagement letters as may be necessary and appropriate to effectuate these engagements.

All rules, regulations, Ordinances, and parts thereof, procedural or otherwise, in conflict herewith or the proceedings authorizing the issuance of the Bonds are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed and this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its adoption.

This Continuing Disclosure Certificate (the "Disclosure Certificate") is executed and delivered by Sumter County, South Carolina (the "County") in connection with the issuance of <u>General</u> Obligation Bonds, Series 2020 (the "Bonds"). The Bonds are being issued pursuant to an Ordinance adopted by the County Council of the County (the "Council"). The County covenants and agrees as follows:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> <u>Purpose of the Disclosure Certificate</u>. This Disclosure Certificate is being executed and delivered by the County for the benefit of the holders of the Bonds and in order to assist the Participating Underwriter (defined below) in complying with the Rule (defined below).

SECTION 2. Definitions. The following capitalized terms shall have the following meanings:

"<u>Annual Report</u>" shall mean any Annual Report provided by the County pursuant to, and as described in, Sections 3 and 4 of this Disclosure Certificate.

"<u>Dissemination Agent</u>" shall mean the County or any successor Dissemination Agent designated in writing by the County and which has filed with the County a written acceptance of such designation.

"<u>Financial Obligation</u>" is defined by the Rule as and for purposes of this Disclosure Certificate shall mean (1) a debt obligation, (2) a derivative instrument entered into in connection with, or pledged as security or a source of payment for, an existing or planned debt obligation, or (3) a guarantee of either of the foregoing; provided, however, that a "Financial Obligation" shall not include municipal securities as to which a final official statement has been provided to the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board consistent with the Rule.

"Listed Events" shall mean any of the events listed in Section 5(a) of this Disclosure Certificate.

"<u>National Repository</u>" shall mean for purposes of the Rule the Electronic Municipal Market Access (EMMA) system created by the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board.

"<u>Participating Underwriter</u>" shall mean Robert W. Baird & Co Incorporated and any other original underwriter of the Bonds required to comply with the Rule in connection with offering of the Bonds.

"Repository" shall mean each National Repository and each State Depository, if any.

"<u>Rule</u>" shall mean Rule 15c2-12(b)(5) promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as the same may be amended from time to time.

"<u>State Depository</u>" shall mean any public or private repository or entity designated by the State of South Carolina as a state depository for the purpose of the Rule. As of the date of this Certificate, there is no State Depository.

SECTION 3. Provision of Annual Reports.

(a) The County shall, or shall cause the Dissemination Agent to provide, not later than February 1 of each year, commencing in 2021, to the Repository an Annual Report which is consistent with the requirements of Section 4 of this Disclosure Certificate. Not later than fifteen (15) business days prior to such date the County shall provide the Annual Report to the Dissemination Agent, if other than the County; provided, that if the audited financial statements required pursuant to Section 4 hereof to be included in the Annual Report are not available for inclusion in the Annual Report as of such date, unaudited financial statements of the County may be included in such Annual Report in lieu thereof, and the County shall replace such unaudited financial statements with audited financial statements within fifteen (15) days after such audited financial statements become available for distribution. The Annual Report may be submitted as a single document or as separate documents comprising a package, and may cross-reference other information as provided in Section 4 of this Disclosure Certificate; provided that the audited financial statements of the County may be submitted separately from the balance of the Annual Report.

(b) If the County is unable to provide to the Repository an Annual Report by the date required in subsection (a), the County shall send a notice to the Repository, in substantially the form attached hereto as *Exhibit A*.

- (c) The Dissemination Agent shall:
 - (1) determine each year prior to the date for providing the Annual Report the name and address of each Repository; and
 - (2) if the Dissemination Agent is other than the County, file a report with the County and (if the Dissemination Agent is not the Registrar) the Registrar certifying whether the Annual Report has been provided pursuant to this Disclosure Certificate, and, if provided, stating the date it was provided, and listing the Repository to which it was provided.

<u>SECTION 4.</u> <u>Content of Annual Reports</u>. The County's Annual Report shall contain or incorporate by reference the most recent audited financial statements, which shall be prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (or, if not in such conformity, to be accompanied by a qualitative discussion of the differences in the accounting principles and the impact of the change in the accounting principles on the presentation of the financial information) applicable to governmental entities such as the County, and shall, in addition, contain or incorporate by reference the following for the most recently completed fiscal year:

- (a) Population;
- (b) State appropriations subject to withholding under Article X, Sec. 14, South Carolina Constitution;
- (c) Outstanding general obligation indebtedness;
- (d) Assessed Value/Market Value of taxable property;
- (e) Tax rates;
- (f) Tax collections; and
- (g) Ten largest taxpayers (including fee-in-lieu-of-tax).

Any or all of the items listed above may be incorporated by reference from other documents, including official statements of debt issues with respect to which the County is an "obligated person" (as

defined by the Rule), which have been filed with the Repository. If the document incorporated by reference is a final official statement, it must be available from the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. The County shall clearly identify each such other document so incorporated by reference.

SECTION 5. Reporting of Significant Events.

(a) Pursuant to the provisions of this Section 5, the County shall give, or cause to be given, notice of the occurrence of any of the following events (the "Listed Events"), with respect to the Bonds:

- (1) Principal and interest payment delinquencies;
- (2) Non-payment related defaults;
- (3) Unscheduled draws on debt service reserves reflecting financial difficulties;
- (4) Unscheduled draws on credit enhancements reflecting financial difficulties;
- (5) Substitution of credit or liquidity providers, or their failure to perform;
- (6) Adverse tax opinions, the issuance by the Internal Revenue Service of proposed or final determinations of taxability, Notices of Proposed Issue (IRS Form 5701-TEB) or other material notices or determinations with respect to the tax status of the security, or other material events affecting the tax status of the security;
- (7) Modifications to rights of security holders;
- (8) Bond calls;
- (9) Tender offers;
- (10) Defeasances;
- (11) Release, substitution, or sale of property securing repayment of the securities;
- (12) Rating changes;
- (13) Bankruptcy, insolvency, receivership or similar event of the County;
- (14) The consummation of a merger, consolidation, or acquisition involving the County or the sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the County other than in the ordinary course of business, the entry into a definitive agreement to undertake such an action or the termination of a definitive agreement relating to any such actions, other than pursuant to its terms;
- (15) Appointment of a successor or additional trustee or the change of name of a trustee;
- (16) Incurrence of a Financial Obligation of the County; or agreement to covenants, events of default, remedies, priority rights, or other similar terms of a Financial Obligation of the County, any of which affect security holders; and
- (17) Default, event of acceleration, termination event, modification of terms, or other similar events under the terms of a Financial Obligation of the County, any of which reflect financial difficulties.

(b) Upon the occurrence of a Listed Event described in subsections (a)(2), (7), (8), (11), (14), (15) or (16) above, the County shall as soon as possible determine if such event would be material under applicable federal securities laws. If the County determines that the occurrence of such event would be material under applicable federal securities laws, the County shall promptly, and no later than ten business days after the occurrence of the event, file a notice of such occurrence with the Repository.

(c) Upon the occurrence of a Listed Event described in subsections (a)(1), (3), (4), (5), (6), (9), (10), (12), (13) or (17) above, the County shall promptly, and no later than ten business days after the occurrence of the event, file a notice of such occurrence with the Repository.

(d) Notwithstanding the foregoing, notice of Listed Events described in subsections (a)(8), (9), and (10) above need not be given under this subsection any earlier than the notice (if any) of the underlying event is given to owners of affected Bonds. For the purposes of the event identified in (a)(13) above, the event is considered to occur when any of the following occur: the appointment of a receiver, fiscal agent or similar officer for the County in a proceeding under the U.S. Bankruptcy Code or in any other proceeding under state or federal law in which a court or governmental authority has assumed jurisdiction over substantially all of the assets or business of the County, or if such jurisdiction has been assumed by leaving the existing governing body and officials or officers in possession but subject to the supervision and orders of a court or governmental authority, or the entry of an order confirming a plan of reorganization, arrangement or liquidation by a court or governmental authority having supervision or jurisdiction over substantially all of the assets or business of the County.

<u>SECTION 6.</u> <u>Termination of Reporting Obligation</u>. The County's obligations under this Disclosure Certificate shall terminate upon the defeasance, prior redemption or payment in full of all of the Bonds.

<u>SECTION 7.</u> <u>Dissemination Agent</u>. The County may, from time to time, appoint or engage a Dissemination Agent to assist it in carrying out its obligations under this Disclosure Certificate, and may discharge any such Agent, with or without appointing a successor Dissemination Agent. The initial Dissemination Agent shall be the County.

<u>SECTION 8.</u> <u>Amendment; Waiver</u>. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Disclosure Certificate, the County may amend this Disclosure Certificate and any provision of this Disclosure Certificate may be waived, if such amendment or waiver is supported by an opinion of counsel expert in federal securities laws acceptable to the County, to the effect that such amendment or waiver would not, in and of itself, cause the undertakings herein to violate the Rule if such amendment or waiver had been effective on the date hereof but taking into account any subsequent change in or official interpretation of the Rule.

SECTION 9. Additional Information. Nothing in this Disclosure Certificate shall be deemed to prevent the County from disseminating any other information, using the means of dissemination set forth in this Disclosure Certificate or any other means of communication, or including any other information in any Annual Report or notice of occurrence of a Listed Event, in addition to that which is required by this Disclosure Certificate. If the County chooses to include any information in any Annual Report or notice of occurrence of a Listed Event, is specifically required by this Disclosure Certificate, the County shall have no obligation under this Certificate to update such information or include it in any future Annual Report or notice of occurrence of a Listed Event.

SECTION 10. Default. In the event of a failure of the County, or the Dissemination Agent to comply with any provision of this Disclosure Certificate, any beneficial owner may take such actions as may be necessary and appropriate, including seeking injunctive relief or specific performance by court order, to cause the County, or the Dissemination Agent, as the case may be, to comply with its obligations under this Disclosure Certificate. A default under this Disclosure Certificate shall not be deemed an event of default under the Ordinance, and the sole remedy under this Disclosure Certificate in the event of any failure of the County, or the Dissemination Agent to comply with this Disclosure Certificate shall be an action to compel performance.

<u>SECTION 11.</u> <u>Duties, Immunities and Liabilities of the Dissemination Agent</u>. The provisions of this Section 11 shall apply if the Issuer is not the Dissemination Agent. The Dissemination Agent shall have only such duties as are specifically set forth in this Disclosure Certificate, and the County agrees to

indemnify and save the Dissemination Agent, its officers, directors, employees and agents, harmless against any loss, expense and liabilities which they may incur arising out of or in the exercise or performance of their powers and duties hereunder, including the costs and expenses (including attorneys' fees) of defending against any claim of liability, but excluding liabilities due to the Dissemination Agent's negligence or willful misconduct. The obligations of the County under this Section shall survive resignation or removal of the Dissemination Agent and payment of the Bonds.

<u>SECTION 12.</u> <u>Beneficiaries</u>. This Disclosure Certificate shall inure solely to the benefit of the County, the Dissemination Agent, the Participating Underwriter, and holders from time to time of the Bonds, and shall create no rights in any other person or entity.

<u>SECTION 13.</u> <u>Counterparts</u>. This Disclosure Certificate may be executed in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument.

ORDINANCE <u>NO. 19-908</u>

An Ordinance To Provide For A Levy Of Taxes For County Purposes Of Sumter County, S. C., (Known As The Budget Ordinance) For The Fiscal Year Of Said County Beginning July 1, 2020, To Direct The Expenditures Of Said Taxes And Other Funds Of Said County, And To Provide For Other Matters Related Thereto.

BE IT ORDAINED by the County Council of Sumter County (the County), South Carolina, in council duly assembled:

WHEREAS, the County Council (Council) for Sumter County, South Carolina (the County) has estimated that for the County's fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, that the aggregate amount of all anticipated funds, moneys and revenues (funds) available to the County from all sources except <u>ad valorem</u> taxes for the County's General Fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, as set forth on the annexed **Exhibit A**, Fiscal Year 2019-2020 Projected Revenue Summary, (which is attached hereto and made a part hereof by reference) will be approximately <u>\$______.</u>

WHEREAS, Council finds that it is necessary that the additional funds needed to provide for the expenditures appropriated herein should and must be raised from the imposition of ad valorem taxes; and

WHEREAS, Council further finds, based on the estimated value of the millage imposed herein, that, in order to provide for the expenditures hereinafter appropriated, the millages hereinafter established should be and hereinafter are established and applied for the purposes hereinafter set forth; and

WHEREAS; Council further finds that the expenditures for the appropriations hereinafter made are all necessary, are all in the best interest of the citizens of the County, and are all for proper public and corporate purposes of the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, the following ordinance is hereby adopted:

<u>Section I.</u> For purposes of this ordinance and for purposes of the records of the County related to the levying of taxes and the expenditure of funds by the County for the County's fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2020, the following definitions shall apply:

Tax District #1 - that portion of Sumter County in Fire District 1.

Tax District #2 - that portion of Sumter County in Fire District 2.

Tax District #17 - that portion of Sumter County within the corporate limits of the City of Sumter.

Tax District #18 – that portion of Sumter County in Fire District 2 within the corporate limits of the Town of Mayesville.

Tax District #27 – that portion of Sumter County in Fire District 2 within the corporate limits of the Town of Pinewood.

Tax District #717 - The Tax Increment Financing District within the corporate limits of the City of

Sumter.

Section II. The following amounts are hereby appropriated for operating expenditures of the County's General

Fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2020, for the purposes indicated:

Section III. Provided, however, notwithstanding anything set forth in Section II or any other provisions of this ordinance to the contrary, the County Administrator of Sumter County should have the authority to add to or reduce from any appropriations made in this ordinance for <u>County Operations</u> amounts not in excess of \$10,000 or 10% of any appropriations made in this ordinance, whichever is the lesser, provided any such additions to any appropriations shall be taken out of one or more appropriations that have been reduced by the County Administrator within the guidelines of this proviso prior to expenditure thereof.

Section IV. The above appropriations shall be kept separate and expended for the purposes for which each was appropriated. Except as otherwise specifically provided herein, there shall not be expended or contracted to expend any sum greater than the amount appropriated except with the approval of a majority of the County Council for the County (County Council) and no account against the County shall be approved or paid except an expenditure authorized by this ordinance or further action of County Council.

<u>Section V.</u> The exact amounts the County is required to expend for the following items are set by state law, to-wit: jury pay and court expenses - Clerk of Court; Coroner's juries, inquests, etc.; per diem - Tax Assessor's and appeals board; advertising tax sales, bids, notices, etc.; officials and employees' bond premiums; workers'

compensation benefits and/or premiums; state retirement - county's share; social security - county's share; unemployment compensation; legal expenses for the defense of indigent; and other legal expenses. The amounts herein appropriated for the items enumerated in this section are based on estimated requirements, but may, in fact, vary in accordance with the requirements of state law. Accordingly, notwithstanding anything contained in this ordinance to the contrary, payment of the items enumerated in this section as from time to time required by state law is authorized even if the amount thereof should exceed the estimated amount hereof appropriated in this ordinance for any such item.

Section VI. The amounts of the salaries of the following officials by this ordinance for the fiscal year for said County beginning July 1, 2020, shall be as follows, which amount shall be paid out of and deducted from the appropriations made for their respective offices to wit:

Beginning with the first pay period in January after a general Election, the salaries of the County Council members shall be increased by the same total percentages that the salaries of the county employees were increased effective July 1 of each of the prior two calendar years.

Member, Sumter County Council	

That, in addition to state salaries, the salaries of the following County officials are supplemented by the County as follows:

Auditor	
Treasurer/Tax Collector	

The amounts herein provided for the salaries or supplements to the salaries of the officials mentioned in this section shall be in lieu of all fees collected by these officials and the amounts herein provided shall be the salaries or supplements to the salaries of such officials for all their services for the fiscal year of the County commencing July 1, 2020. However, said salaries as set out in this section are exclusive of any supplements

thereto paid to any of said officials by the State of South Carolina and said officials are hereby authorized to accept any such supplements to their salaries. Any such supplements received by the County on behalf of a respective official shall be paid over by the County to the applicable official.

<u>Section VII.</u> Salaries provided herein for the Sheriff, the Clerk of Court, the Judge of Probate, the Coroner, the Auditor, and the Treasurer/Tax Collector are appropriated for the present holders of the aforesaid offices and in the event vacancies occur in any of these offices, the starting salaries and appropriations therefore shall be determined by the County Council.

Section VIII. That the positions of the various County employees set forth on the annexed Exhibit B, Position Control, (which is attached hereto and made a part hereof by reference) are hereby ratified, approved, and authorized in order to carry out the functions of the County. The County Administrator is authorized to fill these positions with such employees as the County Administrator deems in the best interest of the County consistent with applicable laws, ordinances, regulations, and policies. The County Administrator is not required to fill any position that is or becomes vacant where the County Administrator deems it in the best interest of the County that said position be vacant. Except as otherwise provided in this section and except also as County Council might from time to time by resolution otherwise direct, the County Administrator is authorized, from time to time, to assign, amend, and vary the duties and responsibilities of County employees, to increase or decrease salaries applicable to a respective position, move County employees from one position with the County to another position with the County (either within a department or to another department), and to combine one or more positions or portions thereof into a single position. The County Administrator is authorized to change the title of the position of a County employee unless the change will require an increase in expenditures in excess of those available and budgeted. Provided, nothing in this section shall authorize the expenditure of any county funds except for the purposes authorized in this ordinance. Provided further, the County Administrator shall not, without authorization granted by resolution of County Council, create any new position nor increase the total number of County employees from the total number of regular, full time positions herein approved. Notwithstanding anything in this section to the contrary, the County Administrator is authorized to employ

additional persons for temporary contract labor for a period not to exceed six (6) months per person in any one fiscal year.

Section IX. The Sumter County Employee Handbook has the following change effective July 1, 2020: Appendix A, the Sumter County Substance Abuse Policy, shall be updated.

<u>Section X.</u> No magistrate in the County shall receive a salary unless and until such magistrate shall have first filed a monthly statement with the County Treasurer to be submitted to the County Council showing all cases handled during the past month and the disposition thereof and certifying that all fines due to the County shall have been paid to the County Treasurer.

Section XI. The Auditor is authorized and directed to levy such millage upon all taxable property within the County as necessary to provide funds required to meet the appropriation made in this ordinance for County purposes and to retire, according to the respective schedules for repayment, the general obligation bonds of the County.

Section XII. In addition to funds normally received and to <u>ad valorem</u> taxes imposed for other purposes, the Auditor of Sumter County (the Auditor) is hereby authorized and directed to make the following levies on all taxable property within the areas specified:

- Within the entire County, _____ mills for general countywide purposes and ____mills for general obligation bond purposes;
- 2. Within Fire District 1, ____ mills for fire protection;
- 3. Within Fire District 2, ____ mills for fire protection;
- 4. Capital Improvement Fund, ____ mill;
- 5. Central Carolina Technical College, ____mills;
- 6. USC Sumter, 2.0 mills;
- 7. General Fund Legislative Mandates <u>1.6</u> mills;
- 8. Solid Waste Disposal <u>4.0</u> mills;
- 9. Solid Waste Disposal Unfunded Legislative Mandates, <u>0.7</u> mills

Expenditures by the County for the purposes specified above out of the funds so raised and those other funds remitted to the County by State agencies, raised by other ordinances of the County, and obtained by the County from all other sources are hereby authorized.

Section XIII. The County Tax Assessor shall furnish to the County Auditor the assessed values on all property within the County on or before June 30, 2020.

Section XIV. The Auditor shall deliver the tax books to the County Treasurer not later than September 15, 2019. The Auditor is authorized to use the same millage as was used for the County's prior fiscal year unless notified in writing on or before July 15, 2020, of a change in estimated millage values.

<u>Section XV.</u> Administrative Fees -- Sumter County shall collect for the administration and collection of municipal taxes for the City of Sumter, Pinewood, and Mayesville. The Administrative Fees shall be \$1.92 per transaction for the City of Sumter, the Town of Pinewood, and for the Town of Mayesville respectively.

<u>Section XVI.</u> No additional levy for school purposes shall be made in any district unless approved by a majority of the County Council.

Section XVII. All boards and commissions receiving funds from the County shall send to County Council a copy of the minutes of each meeting within thirty (30) days thereof and shall annually submit financial reports to the County Council.

Section XVIII. No funds appropriated herein shall be used for payment of expenditures or obligations of the County or any agency or office thereof incurred prior to the effective date of this ordinance except for retirement of general obligation bonds and payment on lease purchase agreements that come due after the effective date of this ordinance. Notwithstanding the foregoing, any line items previously appropriated and/or properly encumbered as of June 30, 2020 shall be carried forward as an appropriation of fiscal year 2020-2021.

Section XIX. Through the adoption of this ordinance County Council hereby approves the budgets of all other special revenue, debt service, and capital project funds, submitted herewith as "other funds" as **Exhibit D**.

<u>Section XX.</u> Twenty (20%) percent of the revenue from all property in any multi-county park in Sumter County will be allocated to the Infrastructure Fund for Fiscal Year 20120-2021. The remaining eighty percent of the revenue from all property in any multi-county park in Sumter County shall be allocated among the applicable

taxing districts on a pro-rata basis using the mills for each taxing district for fiscal year 2020-2021 to determine the ratio for distribution.

Section XXI. The Following Fees will be charged during the 2020-2021 Fiscal Year:

- (1) **Solid Waste Disposal Fee:** The Solid Waste Disposal Fee for 2020-2021 charged to each residential unit shall be **\$50.67**.
- (2) <u>**Tipping Fee:**</u> The tipping fee for 2020-2021 charged to commercial waste haulers who use the Sumter County transfer station shall be **\$46.62** per ton.
- (3) **Road User Fee:** The annual Road User Fee for each registered vehicle shall be **\$30.00** effective July 1, 2020.
- (4) <u>Autopsy Report</u>: The fee for an autopsy report shall be **\$150.00** with the exception for one report to immediate family.
- (5) **Toxicology Reports:** The fee for a Toxicology report shall be \$125.00 with the exception

for one report to the immediate family.

Section XXII. County Council hereby approves appropriating \$525,000 of fund balance, \$275,000 for operating expenditures and \$250,000 for capital expenditures for the compactor.

Section XXIII. This ordinance shall take effect on the 1st day of July 2020.

IDENTIFYING A PROJECT TO SATISFY THE REQUIREMENTS OF TITLE 12, CHAPTER 44 OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CODE, SO AS TO ALLOW INVESTMENT EXPENDITURES INCURRED BY A COMPANY KNOWN TO THE COUNTY AS PROJECT BLACK RIVER, ITS AFFILIATES AND RELATED ENTITIES, TO QUALIFY AS EXPENDITURES ELIGIBLE FOR A FEE-IN-LIEU OF TAXES ARRANGEMENT WITH SUMTER COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA; PROVIDING FOR OTHER RELATED ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT INCENTIVES, INCLUDING SPECIAL SOURCE REVENUE CREDITS; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

WHEREAS, Sumter County (the "County") is a political subdivision of the State of South Carolina and as such has all powers granted to counties by the Constitution and the general law of this State; and

WHEREAS, the County, acting by and through its County Council, is authorized and empowered (i) under and pursuant to the provisions of Title 12, Chapter 44 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended (the "Act") to enter into agreements with qualifying companies to encourage investment in projects constituting economic development property through which the economic development of the State of South Carolina (the "State") will be promoted by inducing new and existing manufacturing and commercial enterprises to locate and remain in the State and thus utilize and employ manpower and other resources of the State and to covenant with such industry to accept certain fee payments in lieu of *ad valorem* taxes ("FILOT") with respect to such investment; and (ii) to make and execute contracts pursuant to Section 4-9-30 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Title 4, Section 1, Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended ("MCIP Act"), the County is authorized (i) to develop multi-county industrial or business parks in partnership with counties having contiguous borders with the County, (ii) to include within the boundaries of such parks the property of eligible companies; and (iii) to grant credits against FILOT payments to qualifying companies to offset qualifying infrastructure related expenditures ("Special Source Revenue Credits"); and

WHEREAS, a company known to the County as Project Black River, as Sponsor, along with one or more existing, or to-be-formed or acquired subsidiaries, or affiliated or related entities and any Sponsor Affiliates that the Sponsor may designate and the County may approve in accordance with the Act (collectively, "Company"), contingent upon satisfaction of certain commitments made by and on behalf of the County, as set forth herein and to be further set forth in future agreements, and to the extent allowed by law, plans to establish a solar energy generation facility in the County through the acquisition, lease, construction and purchase of certain land, buildings, furnishings, fixtures, apparatuses, and equipment (collectively, the "Project"), which will result in approximately \$70,500,000 in new investment in real and personal property in the County ("Investment"); and

WHEREAS, as an inducement for the Project, the Company requests and the County desires to provide certain incentives, including but not limited to, the following: (1) the incentive of a FILOT for a term of 30 years, and having a fixed assessment ratio of 6% with a fixed millage rate equal to the lowest millage rate permitted pursuant to Section 12-44-50(A)(1)(D) of the Act, the terms of which shall be further set forth in a fee-in-lieu of *ad valorem* taxes agreement between the County and the Company ("Fee Agreement"); (2) the placement of the Project in a multi-county industrial park of which the County is a member county; (3)

the provision of an annual Special Source Revenue Credit against those FILOT payments made by the Company to the County for the Project equal to the difference between a net FILOT payment liability of a multiplier of \$2,750 per megawatt of alternating current generation output at the Project and such FILOT payments due (for example, the anticipated megawatt generation output being 74.9 would result in an annual net FILOT payment of \$205,975); and (4) any other incentives that may be set forth in the Fee Agreement or other agreements by and between the County and the Company (collectively, the "Incentives"); and

WHEREAS, the parties recognize and acknowledge that the Company would not otherwise locate the Project in the County but for the delivery of the Incentives; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 12-44-40 of the Act, and based on information provided by the Company, the County has determined that (i) the Project will benefit the general public welfare of the County by providing services, employment, recreation or other public benefits, not otherwise adequately provided locally; (ii) the Project will not give rise to any pecuniary liability of the County or incorporated municipality or a charge against the general credit or taxing power of the County or any incorporated municipality; (iii) the purposes to be accomplished by the Project are proper governmental and public purposes; and (iv) the benefits of the Project to the public are greater than the costs to the public.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the County Council as follows:

Section 1. **Project Identification for Purposes of the Act.** The County hereby identifies the Project as a "project" as contemplated by Section 12-44-40 of the Act.

Section 2. **Project Findings.** Based on information provided by the Company, the County hereby finds and affirms its determination that: (i) the Project will benefit the general public welfare of the County by providing services, employment, recreation or other public benefits not otherwise provided locally; (ii) the Project will not give rise to any pecuniary liability of the County or incorporated municipality and or a charge against its general credit or taxing power; (iii) the purposes to be accomplished by the Project are proper governmental and public purposes; and (iv) the benefits of the Project to the public are greater than the costs to the public.

Section 3. Authorization to Negotiate Incentives. The County shall negotiate in good faith the Incentives and the agreements relating thereto, including but not limited to the Fee Agreement.

Section 4. **Placement of Project in a Multi County Industrial Park.** The County shall use its best efforts to cause the Project, if not already so placed, to be located within the boundaries of a multi county industrial park as provided in Article VIII, Section XIII of the South Carolina Constitution and the MCIP Act.

Section 5. **Past and Future Acts.** The County Council hereby authorizes the Chair of the County Council and other County staff, along with any designees or agents designated thereby, including the County's attorney for this Project, in the name of and on behalf of the County (each an "Authorized Individual"), to take whatever further actions, and enter into whatever further agreements, as are allowed by law and as any Authorized Individual deems to be reasonably necessary and prudent to effect the intent of this Resolution and induce the Company to locate the Project in the County, and authorizes and ratifies all actions previously undertaken by Authorized Individuals with respect to the Project and the actions contemplated by this Resolution.

Section 6. Severability. Should any part, provision, or term of this Resolution be deemed unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such finding or

determination shall not affect the rest and remainder of the Resolution or any part, provision or term thereof, all of which is hereby deemed separable.

Section 7. **Repealer Clause.** All orders, resolutions, or any parts of either, in conflict with this Resolution are, to the extent of that conflict, repealed. This Resolution is effective and remains in effect as of its adoption by the County Council.

EMERGENCY ORDINANCE 20-929

SUMTER COUNTY COUNCIL DECLARATION OF CONTINUING PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY IN RESPONSE TO THE PUBLIC SAFETY THREAT OF THE NOVEL CORONAVIRUS ("COVID-19"), AND EMERGENCY ORDINANCE EFFECTIVE JUNE 9, 2020 SUSPENDING DOOR-TO-DOOR SALES

WHEREAS, the Governor of South Carolina, by Executive Order 2020-08, extended by Executive Order 2020-38 on May 27, 2020, has declared that a State of Emergency exists by virtue of the threat posed by the 2019 Novel Coronavirus ("COVID-19"); and

WHEREAS, Sumter County has taken, and must continue to take, all necessary and appropriate actions in proactively preparing for and promptly responding to the COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, as cases of COVID-19 continue to increase, causing an imminent threat to the citizens and visitors of Sumter County, it is necessary for Sumter County to implement emergency planning for anticipated problems and prepare for emergency actions needed to confront the challenges of this public health emergency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, in accordance with *South Carolina Code of Laws* Title 4, Article 9, Section 130, Sumter County declares that a State of Emergency exists, and that the threat thereof is imminent, and extraordinary emergency measures are deemed necessary to cope with the existing and anticipated situation. Sumter County has implemented the following COVID-19 operations plan, which is effective immediately until further notice.

- 1. The activity of unsolicited visits for door-to-door sales and solicitation for goods and services by any person as described Section 26-2 of the Code of Ordinances for Sumter County is hereby prohibited and unlawful.
- 2. The issuance by the Sumter City-County Business License Office of identification cards pursuant to Code Section 26-2 (a) of the Code of Ordinances for Sumter County is hereby suspended.
- 3. This Ordinance shall remain in force until emergency conditions associated with COVID-19 have subsided and the emergency activities described herein are no longer necessary to protect the life and property of our citizens, or upon the sixty-first (61st) day after the effective date of this emergency declaration.
- 4. This Ordinance is subject to repeal, extension or amendment by a subsequent ordinance.

Effective the 9th day of June 2020, in the County of Sumter, South Carolina by the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the members of Sumter County Council present at the regularly scheduled meeting this date.

An Ordinance To Provide For A Levy Of Taxes For County Purposes Of Sumter County, S. C., (Known As The Budget Ordinance) For The Fiscal Year Of Said County Beginning July 1, 2020, To Direct The Expenditures Of Said Taxes And Other Funds Of Said County, And To Provide For Other Matters Related Thereto.

BE IT ORDAINED by the County Council of Sumter County (the County), South Carolina, in council duly assembled:

WHEREAS, the County Council (Council) for Sumter County, South Carolina (the County) has estimated that for the County's fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, that the aggregate amount of all anticipated funds, moneys and revenues (funds) available to the County from all sources except <u>ad valorem</u> taxes for the County's General Fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, as set forth on the annexed **Exhibit A**, Fiscal Year 2019-2020 Projected Revenue Summary, (which is attached hereto and made a part hereof by reference) will be approximately <u>\$______.</u>

WHEREAS, Council finds that it is necessary that the additional funds needed to provide for the expenditures appropriated herein should and must be raised from the imposition of ad valorem taxes; and

WHEREAS, Council further finds, based on the estimated value of the millage imposed herein, that, in order to provide for the expenditures hereinafter appropriated, the millages hereinafter established should be and hereinafter are established and applied for the purposes hereinafter set forth; and

WHEREAS; Council further finds that the expenditures for the appropriations hereinafter made are all necessary, are all in the best interest of the citizens of the County, and are all for proper public and corporate purposes of the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, the following ordinance is hereby adopted:

<u>Section I.</u> For purposes of this ordinance and for purposes of the records of the County related to the levying of taxes and the expenditure of funds by the County for the County's fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2020, the following definitions shall apply:

Tax District #1 - that portion of Sumter County in Fire District 1.

Tax District #2 - that portion of Sumter County in Fire District 2.

Tax District #17 - that portion of Sumter County within the corporate limits of the City of Sumter.

Tax District #18 – that portion of Sumter County in Fire District 2 within the corporate limits of the Town of Mayesville.

Tax District #27 – that portion of Sumter County in Fire District 2 within the corporate limits of the Town of Pinewood.

Tax District #717 - The Tax Increment Financing District within the corporate limits of the City of

Sumter.

Section II. The following amounts are hereby appropriated for operating expenditures of the County's General

Fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2020, for the purposes indicated:

Section III. Provided, however, notwithstanding anything set forth in Section II or any other provisions of this ordinance to the contrary, the County Administrator of Sumter County should have the authority to add to or reduce from any appropriations made in this ordinance for <u>County Operations</u> amounts not in excess of \$10,000 or 10% of any appropriations made in this ordinance, whichever is the lesser, provided any such additions to any appropriations shall be taken out of one or more appropriations that have been reduced by the County Administrator within the guidelines of this proviso prior to expenditure thereof.

Section IV. The above appropriations shall be kept separate and expended for the purposes for which each was appropriated. Except as otherwise specifically provided herein, there shall not be expended or contracted to expend any sum greater than the amount appropriated except with the approval of a majority of the County Council for the County (County Council) and no account against the County shall be approved or paid except an expenditure authorized by this ordinance or further action of County Council.

<u>Section V.</u> The exact amounts the County is required to expend for the following items are set by state law, to-wit: jury pay and court expenses - Clerk of Court; Coroner's juries, inquests, etc.; per diem - Tax Assessor's and appeals board; advertising tax sales, bids, notices, etc.; officials and employees' bond premiums; workers'

compensation benefits and/or premiums; state retirement - county's share; social security - county's share; unemployment compensation; legal expenses for the defense of indigent; and other legal expenses. The amounts herein appropriated for the items enumerated in this section are based on estimated requirements, but may, in fact, vary in accordance with the requirements of state law. Accordingly, notwithstanding anything contained in this ordinance to the contrary, payment of the items enumerated in this section as from time to time required by state law is authorized even if the amount thereof should exceed the estimated amount hereof appropriated in this ordinance for any such item.

Beginning with the first pay period in January after a general Election, the salaries of the County Council members shall be increased by the same total percentages that the salaries of the county employees were increased effective July 1 of each of the prior two calendar years.

That, in addition to state salaries, the salaries of the following County officials are supplemented by the County as follows:

The amounts herein provided for the salaries or supplements to the salaries of the officials mentioned in this section shall be in lieu of all fees collected by these officials and the amounts herein provided shall be the salaries or supplements to the salaries of such officials for all their services for the fiscal year of the County commencing July 1, 2020. However, said salaries as set out in this section are exclusive of any supplements

thereto paid to any of said officials by the State of South Carolina and said officials are hereby authorized to accept any such supplements to their salaries. Any such supplements received by the County on behalf of a respective official shall be paid over by the County to the applicable official.

<u>Section VII.</u> Salaries provided herein for the Sheriff, the Clerk of Court, the Judge of Probate, the Coroner, the Auditor, and the Treasurer/Tax Collector are appropriated for the present holders of the aforesaid offices and in the event vacancies occur in any of these offices, the starting salaries and appropriations therefore shall be determined by the County Council.

Section VIII. That the positions of the various County employees set forth on the annexed Exhibit B, Position Control, (which is attached hereto and made a part hereof by reference) are hereby ratified, approved, and authorized in order to carry out the functions of the County. The County Administrator is authorized to fill these positions with such employees as the County Administrator deems in the best interest of the County consistent with applicable laws, ordinances, regulations, and policies. The County Administrator is not required to fill any position that is or becomes vacant where the County Administrator deems it in the best interest of the County that said position be vacant. Except as otherwise provided in this section and except also as County Council might from time to time by resolution otherwise direct, the County Administrator is authorized, from time to time, to assign, amend, and vary the duties and responsibilities of County employees, to increase or decrease salaries applicable to a respective position, move County employees from one position with the County to another position with the County (either within a department or to another department), and to combine one or more positions or portions thereof into a single position. The County Administrator is authorized to change the title of the position of a County employee unless the change will require an increase in expenditures in excess of those available and budgeted. Provided, nothing in this section shall authorize the expenditure of any county funds except for the purposes authorized in this ordinance. Provided further, the County Administrator shall not, without authorization granted by resolution of County Council, create any new position nor increase the total number of County employees from the total number of regular, full time positions herein approved. Notwithstanding anything in this section to the contrary, the County Administrator is authorized to employ

additional persons for temporary contract labor for a period not to exceed six (6) months per person in any one fiscal year.

Section IX. The Sumter County Employee Handbook has the following change effective July 1, 2020: Appendix A, the Sumter County Substance Abuse Policy, shall be updated.

<u>Section X.</u> No magistrate in the County shall receive a salary unless and until such magistrate shall have first filed a monthly statement with the County Treasurer to be submitted to the County Council showing all cases handled during the past month and the disposition thereof and certifying that all fines due to the County shall have been paid to the County Treasurer.

Section XI. The Auditor is authorized and directed to levy such millage upon all taxable property within the County as necessary to provide funds required to meet the appropriation made in this ordinance for County purposes and to retire, according to the respective schedules for repayment, the general obligation bonds of the County.

Section XII. In addition to funds normally received and to <u>ad valorem</u> taxes imposed for other purposes, the Auditor of Sumter County (the Auditor) is hereby authorized and directed to make the following levies on all taxable property within the areas specified:

- Within the entire County, _____ mills for general countywide purposes and ____mills for general obligation bond purposes;
- 2. Within Fire District 1, ____ mills for fire protection;
- 3. Within Fire District 2, ____ mills for fire protection;
- 4. Capital Improvement Fund, ____ mill;
- 5. Central Carolina Technical College, ____mills;
- 6. USC Sumter, 2.0 mills;
- 7. General Fund Legislative Mandates <u>1.6</u> mills;
- 8. Solid Waste Disposal <u>4.0</u> mills;
- 9. Solid Waste Disposal Unfunded Legislative Mandates, <u>0.7</u> mills

Expenditures by the County for the purposes specified above out of the funds so raised and those other funds remitted to the County by State agencies, raised by other ordinances of the County, and obtained by the County from all other sources are hereby authorized.

Section XIII. The County Tax Assessor shall furnish to the County Auditor the assessed values on all property within the County on or before June 30, 2020.

Section XIV. The Auditor shall deliver the tax books to the County Treasurer not later than September 15, 2019. The Auditor is authorized to use the same millage as was used for the County's prior fiscal year unless notified in writing on or before July 15, 2020, of a change in estimated millage values.

<u>Section XV.</u> Administrative Fees -- Sumter County shall collect for the administration and collection of municipal taxes for the City of Sumter, Pinewood, and Mayesville. The Administrative Fees shall be \$1.92 per transaction for the City of Sumter, the Town of Pinewood, and for the Town of Mayesville respectively.

<u>Section XVI.</u> No additional levy for school purposes shall be made in any district unless approved by a majority of the County Council.

Section XVII. All boards and commissions receiving funds from the County shall send to County Council a copy of the minutes of each meeting within thirty (30) days thereof and shall annually submit financial reports to the County Council.

Section XVIII. No funds appropriated herein shall be used for payment of expenditures or obligations of the County or any agency or office thereof incurred prior to the effective date of this ordinance except for retirement of general obligation bonds and payment on lease purchase agreements that come due after the effective date of this ordinance. Notwithstanding the foregoing, any line items previously appropriated and/or properly encumbered as of June 30, 2020 shall be carried forward as an appropriation of fiscal year 2020-2021.

Section XIX. Through the adoption of this ordinance County Council hereby approves the budgets of all other special revenue, debt service, and capital project funds, submitted herewith as "other funds" as **Exhibit D**.

<u>Section XX.</u> Twenty (20%) percent of the revenue from all property in any multi-county park in Sumter County will be allocated to the Infrastructure Fund for Fiscal Year 20120-2021. The remaining eighty percent of the revenue from all property in any multi-county park in Sumter County shall be allocated among the applicable

taxing districts on a pro-rata basis using the mills for each taxing district for fiscal year 2020-2021 to determine the ratio for distribution.

Section XXI. The Following Fees will be charged during the 2020-2021 Fiscal Year:

- (1) **Solid Waste Disposal Fee:** The Solid Waste Disposal Fee for 2020-2021 charged to each residential unit shall be **\$50.67**.
- (2) <u>**Tipping Fee:**</u> The tipping fee for 2020-2021 charged to commercial waste haulers who use the Sumter County transfer station shall be **\$46.62** per ton.
- (3) **Road User Fee:** The annual Road User Fee for each registered vehicle shall be **\$30.00** effective July 1, 2020.
- (4) <u>Autopsy Report</u>: The fee for an autopsy report shall be **\$150.00** with the exception for one report to immediate family.
- (5) **Toxicology Reports:** The fee for a Toxicology report shall be \$125.00 with the exception

for one report to the immediate family.

Section XXII. County Council hereby approves appropriating \$525,000 of fund balance, \$275,000 for operating expenditures and \$250,000 for capital expenditures for the compactor.

Section XXIII. This ordinance shall take effect on the 1st day of July 2020.


