

#### LAB hears updates as litter fight surges

Members of the Sumter Litter Advisory Board met on May 15, 2023, to hear updates from the City, County and Department of Transportation.

Although a quorum was not present, the board was able to receive information and updates as Vice Chairman Scott Burkett presided over the meeting.

City of Sumter Litter Officer Glenn Button spoke first about two community cleanups – one on Feb. 18 and another on April 22. The first one yielded 13,775 pounds of litter cleaned up by 231 volunteers and the

second cleanup saw 9,025 pounds of trash picked up by 236 volunteers.


The next Community Cleanup Day is June 17, 2023.

Year to date, he's seen 26 total cleanups with over 91 hours put in by vol-

unteers who picked up 406 bags of trash, 25 tires and 7 TVs. Button said there's about 50 groups actively involved in picking up litter.

The March 19 tire buy-back program at the Sumter County Civic Center saw 995 old tires collected with over \$1,990 given out, along with 46 tarps to promote the need to cover trailered loads of trash, he said.

The next tire buy-back program is slated for Sept. 17, he said. The City also took part in the second Stash the Trash event at the Civic Center, which allowed the City to give out a lot of brochures and information to educate the public about fighting litter. The City also helped Oakland Primary School celebrate Earth Day with interactive games designed to teach the difference between trash and what can be recycled. They gave out books on littering and coloring sheets as well.



Sumter County Public Works Director Karen Hyatt said the second Stash the Trash event on March 25 drew nearly 500 attendees and several LAB Board members such as Chairman Rev. Ernest Frierson, Sandra Riley and Erika Williams, who served as the

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emcee. There were games for children, the poster contest winners were on display, there was a social media contest and a cheerleading/step contest and all 12 public schools in Quadrant 2 participated. Since then, several schools have had litter pickups, she said, noting that students from Sumter High School have been holding pickups on the first Saturday of every month.

"They really like to get their hands dirty," she said.

There was a Sumter County employee litter pickup on April 21, she said, that saw about 40 employees picking up trash on Pinewood Road. Also helping out were Rep. Fawn Pedalino, D-64, County Council Chairman Jim McCain, Rev. Frierson and Miss Williams. Sumter County Administrator Gary Mixon noted the S.C. DOT cut the grass in that area after the pickup "and it looks great."

"What an impact," he added.

Contract laborers are currently cleaning up major corridors and around the Recycling Centers, Hyatt said, and Litter Control Officer Mike McCoy is talking to businesses, industries and churches to get them involved in the Stash the Trash campaign.

For Quadrant 2, Hyatt said there have been 28 litter pickups with 601 volunteers that were responsible for 135,183 pounds of trash headed to the landfill. That figures encompasses schools, contract laborers, the litter rake and all the furniture and tires picked up as well.

"That's an example of what a quadrant effort can do," Mixon said, which is like having "...all hands on deck for one month." Trash, and so is Dixie Products.

"I'm excited, encouraged with what's going on," he said.

As for the enforcement aspect, 52 tickets have been written, he said. There's been 33 summons issued and six trials in absentia for a total of 136 community service hours and \$7,418 in fines.

City Councilman Steve Corley lauded recent coverage of the litter situation in The Sumter Item and thanked McCoy for his diligence.

"Your experience in (law) enforcement already ... and knowing the legal system. Those are just bonus, bonus, bonus," Corley said.

He recalled a meeting from six or seven years ago when he and County Councilman Charles Edens discussed coordination efforts with the S.C. DOT before they conducted the mowing of medians and such.

"We've come such a long way," Corley said, adding that reports from the City and County "energize us."

"It makes the city a cleaner, safer, better, more prosperous place," he said.

Mixon commented that results are visible all over the county.

Sandra Riley of the state Department of Transportation said litter contractors have been busy and recently completed 83.74 miles of picking up trash.

The affected areas include U.S. 76 and 378, S.C. 403, S.C. 53, S.C. 341 and S.C. 527. Pocalla and Pinewood roads were also part of the pickup efforts, she said.

All told, 5.95 tons of trash were removed, she said.

"It's making a big difference in the county," she added.

Sumter County Government on May 24, 2023, gave a presentation in Columbia before a panel of judges at ETV as part of a competition for a prestigious award

Each year, the South Carolina Association of Counties bestows the J. Mitchell Graham Memorial Award to recognize a county that has addressed a community challenge, implemented operational improvements and enhanced their citizens' quality of life in a unique way.
