### The Town of Upper Marlboro is Growing!



In 2019, the Town of Upper Marlboro completed its first phase of annexation in its over 300-year history by bringing the Show Place Arena and Upper Marlboro Community Center into the Town limits, thus doubling the size of the Town. Since then, many residents, property owners, and business owners who live just outside the Town limits have requested to be annexed into the Town to benefit from the Town's more focused services. Because of these requests, the Town has sent mailings out to the adjacent properties to see if there are any other residents or property owners who are interested in being annexed into the Town of Upper Marlboro. There are many benefits to living in an incorporated municipality vs. unincorporated area serviced solely by the County.

### **Special Election & New Commissioners** Sworn-In

Over the summer, the Town held two special elections to fill two vacancies on its three-person Board of Town Commissioners.

- The first Special Election was held on Monday July 27th, when the Town saw a total of 94 ballots cast (68 in-person and 26 absentee/mail-in) in which Sarah Franklin won with 45 votes.
- The second Special Election was held on August 10th, when a total of 86 ballots were cast (68 in-person and 18 absentee/mail-in) in which Town resident Janice Duckett won with 70 votes.

Thank you to all the Town residents who cast their ballots in the local municipal election! Also, a special thanks to the Town's Board of Supervisors of Elections and Town Staff for planning a socialdistanced election and for helping expand the Town's absentee/mail-in voter program.

### Public Works Corner Preparing Yard Waste for Pickup

It's that time of year again! The Town provides routine yard waste collection for removal of leaves, branches, and other yard waste that you are unable to compost. Residents must use a paper lawn bag or another type of reusable container to place yard waste out for collection, yard

waste in plastic bags will not be accepted. Below are some additional guidelines for disposing of yard waste:

- Do not mix yard debris with other bulk trash items
- Cut branches and twigs into lengths of 4' or less
- Branches and brush must be tied into bundles (tie with twine, or metal tie wires) or placed inside a container that can easily be emptied (containers must not weigh more than 80 pounds each). Bundles of branches cannot exceed 2' in diameter.
- Branches must be less than 3" in diameter (larger branches and tree trunks must be collected as bulky trash)

Yard Waste is collected on Mondays and Thursdays within the Town.

### **Weekly Bulk Trash Collection:**

The Town of Upper Marlboro offers its residents weekly curbside Bulk Trash collection, with NO APPOINTMENT necessary. Just place your bulk trash items out by Monday morning and they will be collected! Our Public Work crews begins collection of bulk trash from your curb starting at 8:00 a.m. on Mondays.

Acceptable Items Bulk Trash items: furniture, mattresses, bicycles, garden tools, appliances, carpeting and padding, and other large materials/furniture items generated in the household that are not picked up by regular refuse collection.

Unacceptable Items: electronics, wet paints, Styrofoam, hazardous materials, tires, animal carcasses, chemicals, rocks, soil, and construction and demolition debris from a contractor.

Have you noticed the new bins downtown? The Town of Upper Marlboro is pleased to announce the start of its Downtown Upper Marlboro recycling program, with the installation of a pilot trash/recycling bin next to Main Street Coffee and Treats and CRAVE It. collection units that will replace the current trash-only bins throughout downtown Upper Marlboro.

### The Town of Upper Marlboro is Growing-Continued



Services provided by the Town: There are many benefits to living within a municipality vs. weekly curbside Bulk Trash & Yard Waste collection (no need to schedule an appointment!), snow removal within two hours of snowfall ending, routine focused police patrols and speed enforcement from a community-oriented police department, and the ability to vote in municipal elections and run for elected positions.

Do I currently live in the Town? One of the biggest sources of confusion our Town Hall staff is asked about is whether nor not someone lives in the incorporated Town of Upper Marlboro, or unincorporated greater Upper Marlboro whose services are provided solely by the county. Residents who live on School Lane, Wilson Lane, Rectory Lane, Pratt Street, Old Mill Road, Elm Street, Church Street, Spring Branch Drive, Marlborough Town, 14100-14900Blk of MD 725 (Old Marlboro Pike/Main Street), 5400Blk-5600Blk of Old Crain Highway live within the Town limits and currently benefit from the Town's services.

How does Annexation Work? Municipal annexation is the process of legally including within the corporate limits of a city or town an unincorporated area that is outside the municipality. For many cities and towns in Maryland, annexation of surrounding areas plays an important role in influencing the economic growth, environmental protection, quality of life, and municipal fiscal well-being of their communities. To bring unincorporated areas into the municipal limits, a city/town must receive annexation petitions signed by at least 25% of the qualified voters along with the owners of 25% of total assessed property in the area to be annexed may be filed with the municipal legislative body (i.e., the Board of Town Commissioners).

Perhaps what I like most about Annapolis is the way city planners have smartly managed growth while preserving its vibrant, historic downtown district. The courthouse is within a few feet of Government House (known by most as the Governor's Mansion), the Senate and House office buildings, and county administrative headquarters. All sit inside the city limits.

Balancing growth on the outskirts of the city, while maintaining an historic downtown presence, is a model that perfectly fits what we intend to do

It's time to change that. When fully implemented, annexation will increase our town's population to more than 1,000 residents. Being annexed into the Town limits will allow businesses and residences that currently sit inside the county borders access to municipal services, including our dedicated police and public works departments.

More importantly, annexation is a path to inclusivity and opportunity. In a town accessible primarily by crossing bridges, annexation is a way for us to, literally and figuratively, build bridges between our history and our future. For us to realize our full potential, and to be treated with the respect we have long deserved. For us to stand up and be counted.

I hope you will support me and my two fellow Commissioners, Sarah Franklin and Janice Duckett, in this annexation effort. I look forward to working closely with both Sarah and Janice in the months ahead to keep our town moving forward.

I would be remiss if I did not mention COVID-19. I applaud the residents of Upper Marlboro for everything you have done over the past eight months to stay healthy and, more importantly, to keep our neighbors, families, and friends safe.

We will miss her smile and energy more than words could ever say. This was tremendous loss to the Town of Upper Marlboro.

Some of Wanda's community outreach accomplishments include being a Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) for abused and neglected children in the District of Columbia; a board member for Family Advocacy and a Donate Life Ambassador with Washington Regional Transplant Community (WRTC); an alum of the Prince George's County Police Citizens Academy; a Prince George County Police Volunteer in Police Services (VIPS); president of the Greater Upper Marlboro Maryland Community Emergency Response Team (CERT); and a member of the longstanding Clinton, MD CERT team. She is also a former U.S. Army Reserve member.

Wanda also has served on the Maryland Municipal League's Hometown Emergency Preparedness Ad hoc Committee (HEPAC).

In addition to her public service duties, Wanda was also a seasoned leader in the health care industry. Wanda held a Bachelor of Art in Business Administration, with an emphasis on management and a minor in finance, from the University of the District of Columbia. # A Message from the Chief of the Upper Marlboro Police Department

### **Speed Limit**

The speed limit is 25 mph within the Town limits. Town Police officers will be out enforcing the speed limit along Town roadways.

### **Fall Driving Tips:**

With the end of daylight saving time, it will become darker sooner, around the time rush hour traffic is at its peak, and when many people are making their way home from work. Drivers must be very cautious, because pedestrians walking around at dusk are nearly three times more likely to be struck and killed by cars in the days following the end of daylight saving time.

Watch out for deer. Autumn marks the beginning of deer breeding season. Deer will be more active in areas near the road, particularly during sunset and sunrise, so be extra watchful when driving near the woods and near deer crossing signs. Deer can't read those signs, but you can!

Wet leaves can be as slippery as ice. Drive slowly through them and avoid hard braking. Leaves may block your view of the lane lines and other road markers, so pay attention to the edge of the road and take care to stay in your lane.

### **Code Enforcement**



#### **Rental Property Guidelines:**

All rental properties must be registered. Currently, the Town of Upper Marlboro does not have its own rental property permitting and inspection program, so all rental properties must be registered with the Prince George's County Department or Permitting, Inspections, and Enforcement (DPIE).

Property owners can register their rental properties at: <a href="https://momentum.princegeorgescountymd.gov/">https://momentum.princegeorgescountymd.gov/</a>. Any questions related to single-family, multifamily, and short-term rental licenses residents may have can be emailed the County at: <a href="mailto:dpierentallicenses@co.pg.md.us">dpierentallicenses@co.pg.md.us</a>.

License Fee: A single family rental property must have a valid rental license. The license fee is \$115 for a two-year license.



**Exemptions:** There are a few exemptions in which a rental license is NOT required:

- If the tenant is the landlord's parent, son, daughter, sibling, grandchild, grandparent, or in-law;
- If the landlord is an active member of any branch of the United States Armed Forces, Diplomatic Corps or Foreign Service, who maintains the subject property for his/her domicile and permanent residence;
- If the landlord has been relocated for employment or education, maintains the subject property as his/her domicile and permanent residence, and the subject property has not been leased for more than two consecutive years.

# Upper Marlboro Police & Public Works Respond to Flash

**Flooding** 

On August 4th at approximately 9:15 a.m., while conducting flooding checks, Upper



Marlboro Police officers discovered a vehicle stranded in the rising water of the Spring Branch which had overrun MD 725 Old Marlboro Pike at John Rodgers Blvd. Officers requested Fire/EMS to respond and were able to make contact with the driver, who was assisted out of the water to safety without injury or incident. Town Public Works and Code Enforcement worked to finish closing the roadway and setting up detours while UMPD and Fire/EMS operated. This area's flash flooding resulted in three separate water rescues, each during a different rain event, over the summer of 2020. The Town is coordinating with Maryland State Highway Administration to address, but in the meantime the area is checked regularly by Town staff during heavy rain.
