Election News

Three candidates will be printed on the ballot, two are incumbents, Joe Hourcle and Stephen Sonnett and third is James "Jim" Storey, a longtime Town resident and retired Air Force pilot. There are also three spaces for write–in votes. The three people with the most votes will be elected for a two year term as Town Commissioner. Profiles and platforms of the candidates will be published in the December 16th edition of the *Gazette*. One week after the election, the elected will select a President and take office on Monday, January 11 at 8:00pm at Town hall. Voting will take place Monday January 4th from 1:00 pm to 8:00 pm at Town Hall, 14211 School Lane, Upper Marlboro. If you are registered voter in Prince George's County with an address in the corporate limits of the Town you are qualified to vote in the Town elections. Alternatively, you may vote if you are qualified and have registered with the Town.

Pursuant to the Town's Charter, the newly elected Commissioners will hold their organizational meeting on January 11th at 8:00 p.m.

Why Vote in An Uncontested Election?

There are two good reasons to vote. First, County and State officials take note of the support given the Town's elected officials. With a strong showing of support for the Town's Commissioners, those officials are more likely to take seriously positions taken by the Town. Second, the job of Commissioner is essentially a volunteer effort, no one runs for the pay which is \$600 per year (President receives an extra \$3,600). If you think your government is doing a good job, please show your support by voting!

Neighbors Honor Local WWII Ranger

O n Wednesday, November 18, 2009, a prominent resident of our community, Carl H. Lehmann, celebrated his 90th Birthday with family, friends and neighbors. Carl's son, Steve, and his wife Carolyn, hosted a fabulous party at Beechtree's beautiful Lake Presidential Golf Club, and a great time was had by all. It is obvious that Carl has many friends in the neighborhood and we all were very proud to share in this most festive celebration.

For those who have not yet had the great fortune to meet Carl, he is revered for his heroic service in the U.S. Army during WW II, as one of Darby's original Rangers. He was captured in Cisterna, Italy, and spent over a

year and a half as a Prisoner of War, until his escape after 2 previous attempts. For those interested in learning more about Carl's Ranger history there is much written in books and also on the internet.

As Carl likes to tell it, the Rangers Infantry prepared him for his next job as a Letter Carrier. He then continued to work as a Clerk at the Post Office in Baltimore, while attending law school at the University of Baltimore. Upon passing the bar, Carl went on to practice law in Baltimore and then Upper Marlboro until retiring just a few years ago.

Nowadays, among other things, Carl enjoys working out at the gym, taking walks with his beloved dog, Chiba, and cooking for his friends and neighbors. Of course, we look forward to these meals together not only for the great food . . .but, also because we have an opportunity to hear Carl recount his experiences as a Ranger during WW II and learn about history first-hand from a local hero. Priceless!
