Draft of National Register of Historic Places Registration Form received From Park and Planning

Park and Planning has given us a consultant's draft of the National Register Historic District Registration Form for the western residential area of the Town of Upper Marlboro. They have requested we review the draft for accuracy and return it for final production. We have a few copies at Town Hall for review and will be posting a copy on our Website soon. After we receive the Registration Form in final we can decide how, or if we want to proceed.

The area inventoried includes the residential western end of Town excluding the Spring Branch subdivision and the Marlborough Towne complex. The Town's residential area is evaluated under two of the four possible National Register criteria: "(A) Property is associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history and (C) Property embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type or period ... "The consultants found 75 contributing properties and 15 non-contributing.

The next step is to verify the information contained in the registration form so that the survey can be finalized. Thereafter, the town needs to decide if it supports the effort to list the residential area on the National Register.

Questions that the Town's citizens need to consider are: What does it mean to be on the National Register? Will it help or hinder the Town? Are there other ways we can protect out residential communities and maintain its unique character?

The Fiscal Year 2011 Budget

F or the past two budget years, at this stage of preparation, the outlines of the upcoming proposed budget have pretty much already taken shape. However, for Fiscal Year 2011 (FY11) the Town is faced with continuing substantial reductions in State grants and aid, plus a substantial reduction in the amount of interest generated from investments. These reductions, coupled with the increases in unemployment insurance, pension funding and health insurance will require a use of the reserve fund of between \$20,000 to \$30,000. The Town has a substantial reserve fund and has added about \$220,000 in the last two budget years. While still dealing with some unknowns, we should still have a small surplus in the current FY10 budget.

The Commissioners have recently been discussing two cost reduction measures. The first is to outsource our residential trash pickup. The Town would still provide bulk and yard waste services. Research indicates that small towns tend to outsource residential trash pickup. Potential savings appear to be in the \$20,000 range. The second, is a change in our health insurance plans. While we will not know the amount of increase in health insurance until mid-May, current estimates range from 10% for some plans to 25% for others. The recent passage of the health reform act by Congress adds a great deal of uncertainty to the future cost of health insurance to the Town.

The President will propose his "President's Budget" at the April 13th Town Meeting. However, there will most likely be changes by the first reading of the budget in May and at its final passage in June.
