

Do Your Part to Keep Town Taxes Low

esidents of the Town of Upper Marlboro enjoy the Nowest municipal tax rate in the county, and we need your help to keep it that way. We can keep unnecessary costs down, as long as citizen's actively participate in the County's Recycling Program and take a more proactive approach to individual waste reduction.

Every Thursday, the County picks up our recycling for a set fee. Whether the total haul is one-hundred pounds or one-hundred-thousand pounds, the Town pays the same rate each month. Not so, however, with your household trash. That goes to the landfill where the fee is based on weight. At present, more than half of the 320 housing units in town are sending recyclables to the landfill, increasing the Town's direct costs, since technically, it has to pay twice for the disposal of these misguided items.

There are other ways citizens can help the town spend your tax dollars wisely. On Mondays, yard waste is picked up by our Public Works Department and taken to a recycling center at a rate of \$25 per ton. If you don't separate out the yard waste from the residential and/or bulk trash, the Town will pay nearly double to take it to the landfill, where the rate is \$59 per ton.

So please, separate your refuse thoughtfully, so we are not forced to pass the extra costs on to you.

TRASH TIPS . . .

- O The County picks up recycling on Thursdays.
- Our Town Public Works crew picks up BULK trash and YARD WASTE on Mondays (except holidays).
- O Contractor picks up RESIDENTIAL trash on Mondays.
- O Place all items out at curb BY 7:00 A.M.
- Clearly separate your Residential Trash from your Bulk Trash and Yard Waste piles (2–3 feet apart)
- O DO NOT MIX bulk, regular and/or yard waste in the same container. IT WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.
- O Regular, Bulk or Yard Waste items placed in recycling bins WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.
- O If using non see-through bags, please identify the contents if it is not obvious what kind of refuse it is.

We thank those of you that are already implementing these practices, and, we strongly encourage everyone else to join the effort. Every residence in Town has now been issued a blue recycle bin (at no direct cost to the homeowner). If you do not have one, please call the County's Waste Management Group at: 301-952-7630.

Residential Trash collection occurs once a week on Monday

If New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day or Christmas Day fall on a Monday, residential trash will be picked up the next day (weather permitting).

Residential trash will be picked up on all other holidays that may fall on a Monday (for example: Presidents' Day, Columbus Day, Veterans' Day, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's Birthday, etc.).
