# **April Showers Brings May-squitos**

The Town of Upper Marlboro is famous for many things, one of which (unfortunately) is the terrific amount of mosquitoes in Town. As in years past, the Town has contracted with the State for mosquito control. Testing begins on June 1st, but we don't know when the spraying will begin. We will keep you posted.

#### Why Are Mosquitoes a Problem?

Apart from their being an annoyance, the
Asian Tiger mosquitoes are known carriers of the
West Nile Virus, and a principal carrier of dog
heartworm. Asian Tiger mosquitoes were accidentally introduced 20 years ago in shipments of used tires from
Asia, and have spread rapidly throughout our state. They are well known for their aggressive daytime activity and their ability to breed in even the smallest puddles of water.

#### **How Can I Help Control Mosquitos?**

The most effective way to drastically reduce the mosquito population is to eliminate those places where they breed. Inspect the outside of your home and yard for places where rain water can collect, such as: gutters, bottles, cans, planters, toys, tarps, old tires and so on. Pet bowls and bird baths should be changed often.

#### What If I Don't Want Mosquito Spraying?

If you decide that you do not want this service, you must sign a form and there will be no spraying within 300 feet of your residence. The forms are available at Town Hall, or you can download it from the State's website at: http://www.mda.state.md.us/plants-pests/mosquito\_control.

#### Water Street Awash With Activity

In 1706, before the establishment of Upper Marlboro (Marlborough Town) as a port town, the Western Branch of the Patuxent River was navigable by small boats and there was a landing (where Water Street is now) called Colonel Belt's Landing. Tobacco was taken on small boats down the Western Branch to the Patuxent River at Jug Bay, where it was loaded on the ships that sailed to England. These same small boats also delivered goods received from England, while on their trip upriver.

It didn't take long for the Western Branch to silt up with soil erosion that came from surrounding tobacco plantations. By the end of the 1700s, it required dredging—these days, a canoe or kayak can barely make the trip from Jug Bay. But, as if to demonstrate some remnant of its former nature, blue crabs have been spotted near the Water Street bridge, trying to make their way up the river.
