
In Memoriam

ON THE AGENDA

Business is just beginning to pick up speed again after the holiday slow down. We have five items on the tentative agenda for this meeting. Up for discussion and approval is a Town position letter to be sent to the Prince George's County Liquor Board. The liquor store now located in the Osborne Shopping Center on Route 301 south of Town, is seeking to transfer its license to the Villages of Marlborough Shopping Center west of Town.

The Town of Upper Marlboro Historical Committee will present its proposed By-Laws for approval by the Board. I'm sure they will also give us a report on their activities.

As you know, the Star Spangled Banner National Historic Trail weaves its way through our Town. William Beanes gravesite, Darnell's Chance and Trinity Church are now official sites on the trail. The National Park service is placing interpretative signage at each site. The Park Service has proposed entering into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Town, in which we would agree to clean and keep on eye on the interpretative sign at William Beanes grave for the Park Service, and generally promote, with them and others, the site and the Trail. There is no fiscal obligation on the Town's part and the MOU can be terminated at anytime on 30 days notice.

Since November of last year, the Town has been negotiating a renewal contract with the County for residential recycling services. We determined the County's original offer for renewal was not acceptable. We have reached an oral agreement on a new County contract but have not gotten the written contract as yet. The new contract will be short term, until October 31,2013, and will not include a price increase. Certain other contract terms we found objectionable will also be modified. This short term contract with the County will give us some time to address this issue. Unlike many other jurisdictions, the Town does not have a separate charge for recycling service. The Town pays a "per household" price, no matter how much is recycled. Some people are good about recycling, and others appear not to recycle at all. Not recycling hurts the environment, and puts pressure on the price the town pays for household trash collection where the amount of trash picked-up does count.

After our failed attempt to put out a bid request for paving in Marlborough Towne last spring, it became clear that we need some professional help. I will propose at the Town meeting that up to \$2,500 be authorized for the hiring of a professional to put the bid package together, help us evaluate the bids, and insure the job is done correctly.
