

# Follow the Footsteps of the British Army to Upper Marlboro

## The 2014 Maryland House and Garden Pilgrimage

or the first time since its inception 76 years ago, the Maryland House and Garden Pilgrimage will feature the Town of Upper Marlboro. On 26 April, Prince George's County will kick off the 2014 Pilgrimage, allowing ticketholders to trace the footsteps of the British Army's march on Washington during the summer of 1814.

The tour will begin in Nottingham, which was a thriving port town in the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries, and during the War of 1812, served as a base of operations for the U.S. Chesapeake Flotilla. Reportedly, upon being alerted of the British advance on the town, the citizens of Nottingham fled their town in such haste that they left bread baking in their ovens. After leaving Nottingham, the tour will progress through Jug Bay and on to The Town of Upper Marlboro.

On August 22, 1814, British forces camped on the outskirts of Upper Marlborough Town, while British officers repurposed the home of distinguished resident Dr. William Beanes for use as their headquarters. Dr. Beanes was later taken prisoner by the British, which lead to the recruitment of Francis Scott Key to negotiate his release. Following the negotiations, Key observed the bombs bursting over Fort McHenry and penned what is now our National Anthem *The Star-Spangled Banner*.



While in our Town, the group will be invited to tour *Kingston* (built in 1735), Darnall's Chance (established in 1742), and Content (constructed in 1787). Several other homes in Town that were constructed in the 1800s will also be open for the tour, including the *Bunnell-Anderson*, *Turner*, and *Jarboe-Bowie* houses, all built or added on to by local carpenter, Reuben Bunnell.

Those on the tour will also enjoy a unique opportunity to visit some of the County's rarely seen historic gems, such as *Pleasant Hills*, which is only two miles outside of the Town. Constructed in the 1830s, and on the National Register of Historic Places, this beautiful brick home surrounded by rolling hills and wooded acres provides visitors with a glimpse of what it was like to belong to the wealthy planter class.

With all of the sightseeing and walking, guests are sure to get hungry, so a Southern-style, hot lunch will be availa-

ble, courtesy of Milloff's Catering. Ticketholders will be invited to eat lunch at *Trinity Episcopal Church* and then tour the historic church and picturesque cemetery. As the culmination to a fun-filled and informative tour, in the afternoon, ticketholders will be treated to a reception at *Darnall's Chance*, complete with wine from the nearby Romano Winery and cheeses from the P.A. Bowen Farmstead.

For citizens interested in touring sites in other counties, the Maryland House and Garden Pilgrimage runs tours through May, and includes stops in Baltimore, Talbot, Calvert, and Kent counties. Tickets for all Pilgrimage tour destinations are available through the Town's Historic Committee at a discounted rate of \$30 per ticket, but only if purchased before 31 March.

## The Birth of a Centenarian

n March 9, 1914, Town resident Anna W. Buck was born Anna Mae Wayson to Daisy Belle Ward and Robert Alan Wayson. She wed Daniel Thomas Buck of Upper Marlboro in 1931, and in 1936 they built a house in The Town of Upper Marlboro for \$500, where Anna lives to this day. Needless to say, her upcoming 100th birthday is a proud milestone for her entire family and the Town.

While a stay-at-home mom raising four children, she not only helped her husband run a logging & trucking business out of their home, she also found time to serve her community, volunteering as treasurer for the local PTA and many women's groups at Trinity Episcopal

PTA and many women's groups at Trinity Episcopal Church. She was also a Chief Election Judge for the County Board of Elections for over fifty years, and in the mid-1940s, she served as one of the first women jurors in Prince George's County.

In 1961, Anna went on to work for the 5<sup>th</sup> District Circuit Court, until her retirement in 1996. A commemorative brick has been placed in the walkway between and the Courthouse and County Administration Building in honor of all her years of service.
