## Meet the new Commissioners:



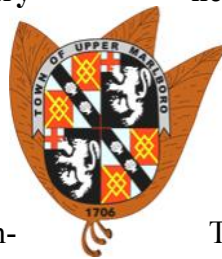

On Monday January 4, 2016, three Town resident candidates (out of 4) were elected to serve as the new Board of Town Commissioners for the next two years. Voter turnout for local elections state-wide has historically lagged behind state and federal races, but, turn-out in our Town was the best it's been in 6 years with a total number of ballots cast at 94 out of 462 registered voters. That's about 20.5 percent.

Vote counts in descending order: Linda Pennoyer—71; James Storey—67; Nancy Clagett—64; and, George Leonnig—44. Which elected Commissioners will assume the Board positions of President and Treasurer will be announced at the 8:00 p.m. Town Meeting on MONDAY, January 11, 2016.

## Town Receives Second Community Legacy Grant Award for Façade Improvements on Main Street

We are pleased to announce that The Town of Upper Marlboro has been awarded **\$35,000** by the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development's Community Legacy Program this year. The Town has been working with M-NCPPC Community Planning Division to revitalize the downtown area through facade improvements, pedestrian safety improvements, and several other projects and these funds will enable us to continue this program. The total allocation from the State to projects within



Prince Georges County was \$1.28 million, including the Town's award amount.

According to the State website "The Community Legacy program provides local governments and community development organizations with re-

sources for essential projects aimed at strengthening communities through activities such as business retention and attraction, encouraging homeownership and commercial revitalization. Fifty-five projects in 19 counties and Baltimore City received a total of \$6 million in Community Legacy grants in fiscal year 2016."

## Interested in a Town CERT Team?

The Town of Upper Marlboro is working with the County's Department of Homeland Security to host an Upper Marlboro area CERT team.



## What is CERT?

CERT or a Community Emergency Response Team is a group of people organized as a neighborhood-based team that receives special training to enhance their ability to recognize, respond to, and recover from a major emergency or disaster situation.

Following a major disaster, first responders who provide fire and medical services will not be able to meet the demands for these services. Factors such as number of victims, communication failures, and road blockages will prevent citizens from accessing emergency services they have come to expect at a moment's notice. Family members, fellow employees, and neighbors will have to rely on one another for assistance in order to meet their immediate lifesaving and life sustaining needs. CERT training will benefit any citizen who participates in the course. The CERT trained individual will be better prepared to respond and cope with the aftermath of a disaster.

# Snow Business:

**W**hen vehicles are left on the street, it not only slows down our snow removal process, it also prevents us from plowing curb to curb (which enables two-way traffic and better access for emergency equipment, mail delivery, etc.)

If you leave your car on the street, we have no alternative but to push the snow up close to it, which means you'll have more shoveling to do. Also, being parked on the street before and during winter storms, your car will get sprayed with salt, and you run the risk of other vehicles hitting your car. If you truly have no more room in your driveway, we ask that you park your car on the **ODD**-numbered side of the street until the even-numbered side is cleared—then re-park across the street. **NOTE:** Our crews come through 2 or 3



times before they finish plowing and treating.

As a community, and for the common good, let's just agree **NOT** to park on the street when snow is predicted. If we cannot accomplish this goal, then the only alternative will be the Big Brother approach, which means enacting new laws, ticketing, towing and overall increased costs for everyone. We hope that you will discuss this issue with your neighbors who may not be signed up to receive our monthly town newsletter. This is not just a notice about safety or a suggestion for the convenience of others, but rather, a quality of life issue that every one of our residents should be concerned about.

## Be prepared!

If there is a forecast for snow, follow these guidelines:

- Please move all vehicles off Town streets to allow the plows (and emergency vehicles) better access.
- Ensure you have enough food & water in case you get stuck.
- Check on you're neighbors! Volunteer to shovel out an elderly or disabled neighbor's driveway for them.
