WHEREAS, the contract assignment request meets with the approval of the Walla Walla County Superior Court Judges and Walla Walla County; and

WHEREAS, an Assignment of Contract for Indigent Legal Services 2014 has been offered to and executed by attorney Jamie Lewellyn; now therefore

IN THE MATTER OF CONSIDERING DECLARING CERTAIN COUNTY PROPERTY AS SURPLUS AND DISPOSING OF SAME AND SETTING A PUBLIC HEARING (PURSUANT TO RCW 36.34)

RESOLUTION NO.

WHEREAS, Washington State requires all counties to provide E911 services throughout their jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, RCW Chapter 39.34 authorizes local governmental units to enter into Interlocal Agreements; and

WHEREAS, pursuant an Amendment Agreement for the Establishment and Operation of an E911 Public Safety Answering Point executed in 2004, the City of Walla Walla has been providing E911 and dispatching services for Walla Walla; and

WHEREAS, the above agreement provides that the City shall purchase and retain custody of equipment and other items related to E911 services, but that title shall remain with the County; and

WHEREAS, said agreement also provides that the County shall make available to the City all other funds received by the County for any source which are to be dedicated to emergency dispatching services; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a letter dated February 4, 2014 with attachments, the Board of County Commissioners of Walla Walla County has received from the Walla Walla City-County Dispatch (aka Walla Walla Emergency Services Communication Center or WESCOM), a City of Walla Walla department under the supervision of Chief of Police Scott Bieber and Public Safety Communications Manager Steve Ruley, a listing of equipment deemed surplus to E911 service needs; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to RCW 36.34.020, the County is not required to hold a public hearing when selling property to another government agency; and

WHEREAS, Chief Bieber has advised that, pursuant to RCW 36.34.130, other governmental agencies as follows: Oregon State Department of Transportation, Wireless Communication Section; Benton County, Washington; Franklin County, Washington; and Walla Walla County Emergency Management Department wish to acquire certain of the surplus equipment; and

WHEREAS, based on the recommendation of Chief Bieber, the prices to be paid for the items on Exhibit A, B, and C represent fair market value; now therefore

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by this Board of County Commissioners that the City of Walla Walla, through the auspices of WESCOM and as outlined in the letter of February 4, 2014, be authorized to proceed with the disposal of items to the above-referenced governmental agencies as listed on the attached exhibits (Letter from Oregon Department of Transportation, Wireless Communication Section, letter dated February 3, 2014 with attachment – Exhibit A; Trade to Benton County – Exhibit B; Trade to Franklin County – Exhibit C; and To Walla Walla County Emergency Management Department – Exhibit D), which are by this reference made a part hereof.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that proceeds from the disposal of the items listed on Exhibits A, B, and C shall be made available to WESCOM, through the special revenue fund maintained by the City for the receipt of all monies related to the E911 Public Safety Answering Point (City-County Dispatch) operation, as provided for in the above-referenced governing agreement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by this Board of Walla Walla County Commissioners, as the county legislative authority, that they shall approve the transfer of items listed on Exhibit D to Walla Walla County Emergency Management Department (EMD) without cost, in recognition of the mutual benefits of the use of those items for emergency operations purposes to each EMD member jurisdiction and all citizens of the county.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that regarding the remaining items proposed for surplus declaration, pursuant to RCW 36.34, the Board of County Commissioners is required to set a date of public hearing to consider testimony for and against disposing of any County property; now therefore

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by this Board of Walla Walla County Commissioners that the date of Monday, March 3, 2014, at the hour of 9:30 a.m. or as close thereto as possible, be set for a public hearing to consider declaring said remaining property as surplus and disposing of same, said hearing to be held in the County Commissioners' meeting room, Walla Walla County Public Health and Legislative Building, 314 West Main, Walla Walla, Washington.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the Board of Walla Walla County Commissioners shall give notice of said hearing in the manner prescribed by law.

Intent – Application to obtain BOCC approval to waive late payment fee for food facility permit

Topic - Late payment fee for Andre's Kitchen

Summary

All public food facilities are required to permit with the Health Department on an annual basis. We send our first notice to the facilities in the first week in November and a second notice the first week in December for those facilities who have not yet paid. If we have not received payment by the last week in December we call; each facility and inform them if they have not paid by Dec 31 were will be a late fee of 25% attached to their renewal. We send a letter to each unpaid permitted facility the second week in January informing them If they have not renewed by Jan 31st we will issue a Health Officer order requiring them close until their permit is paid.

This year we had four facilities that had not paid their permit fees by January 31: one fixed site restaurant and three mobile units, one of which was Andre's Kitchen.

The letters sent to Andre's Kitchen in November and December were returned to us unopened. When we made our call to Andre's Kitchen in December the voice mail box was full and not excepting anymore calls.

The January 13, 2014 Certified Letter to Andre's Kitchen returned to us on January 29 and later hand delivered on February 3, 2014.

For the past two years we have been sending mail to Andre's Kitchen at the same address. After talking with Andre, he informed me that his address had changed back in 2011. After looking back in our records he never informed us that he had changed his address and, on a side note, last year someone signed the renewal notice with his old address on it but never changed it on the form or told us.

Andre's Kitchen's owner contacted me on February 6, 2014 and asked me to waive the late fee because we had not notified him of the need for his permit nor contacted him after the fee was due. He agreed to pay his permit and will pay the late fee if the BOCC does not waive it.

Cost

Andre's normal permit fee is \$1050.00 (\$750 restaurant fee, \$300 mobile unit fee) + 262.50(late fees \$187 + \$5) = \$1312.50

Funding

Required to be paid by facility being permitted.

Alternatives Considered

- 1. Waive the late fee
- 2. Require Andre's Kitchen to pay late fee.

- Waiving the fee sets a precedence that put the entire burden on the County for making sure that individuals requiring a permit are promptly notified and pay before the penalty fee required by ordinance is added to the permit fee and condones late payment of fees. It is unfair to others that have already paid their late fees.
- 2. Requiring payment increasing the burden of fees on what already is a low margin industry.

Benefits

1. Recognizes that our staff should have been more proactive in contacting Andre's Kitchen when the two earlier notifications were returned.

2. Compensates the County for the extra work required to process the permit when owners fail to pay their permit fees on time.

Conclusion/Recommendation

There is "blame to share" here. We did not aggressively seek out why we were receiving returned mail from Andre's Kitchen until our registered letter informing them of the late fee; Andre's Kitchen never informed us of a change of address (contrary to their assertion).

Recommend the Walla Walla County Board of County Commissioners not waive the late fees for Andre's Kitchen.

Re: Initiative 502 Proposed Work Plan and Process

After review of Ordinance 415 and of documents related to Initiative 502 and after discussions with Jesse Nolte, Jesse and I are recommending the attached work plan to review the effect of licensing the production, processing, and retail sale of recreational marijuana.

The documents described in the work plan would be prepared by us with assistance from the Walla Walla Joint Community Development Agency as needed. The planning commission would review the materials and recommend a course of action to the commissioners following the process for public participation, workshops, and a public hearing contained in WWCC Section 14.15 for amendments to development regulations. The goal is to complete the planning commission process no later than July 15th.

To guide the work of the planning commission, we are recommending that the commissioners establish project principles that would apply to the regulation of recreational marijuana. By January 23rd we would submit a draft of project principles for consideration by the commissioners. Additionally, we would prepare a summary of the content and status of recreational marijuana development regulations approved by selected jurisdictions.

Jesse and I are available to discuss the proposed work plan and process.

- Determine if existing policies address issues related to the production, processing, and retail sale of recreational marijuana. Propose modified or new policies if necessary
- Review the land use designations and propose those appropriate for the production, processing, and retail sale of recreational marijuana
- Review the zoning districts and propose those appropriate for the production, processing, and retail sale of recreational marijuana
- Determine if existing development regulations other than zoning address issues related to the production, processing, and retail sale of recreational marijuana. Propose modified or new regulations if necessary

LEGAL

- Review how the production, processing, and retail sale of recreational marijuana conflicts with federal law (it does) and recommend measures to ensure that the County is addressing the Federal Priorities set forth by the August 2013 Department of Justice memo.
- Research and recommend strong and effective regulatory and enforcement systems that have been demonstrated to be effective in practice;
- Review any Federal law enforcement responses to I-502
- Prepare a summary of any Court decisions dealing with I-502.

MISCELLANEOUS

Re: Revised Principles for Recreational Marijuana Regulations

Attached are revised principles for the planning commission's work on the regulation of recreational marijuana based on the discussion at the Board's meeting this week.

Attachment Principles for Recreational Marijuana Regulations

The following project principles apply only to the land use regulation of recreational marijuana as permitted under the rules promulgated by the WSLCB in WAC 314-55. The planning commission shall provide a recommendation to the Board of County Commissioners that addresses the regulation of the production, processing, and retail sale of recreational marijuana and that meets all of the following principles. The recommendation should be consistent with the policies in the County Comprehensive Plan. The recommendation should also recognize that recreational marijuana facilities are a new, untested land use in the county and state, with uncertain potential impacts.

After reviewing the following principles, the Planning Commission should make a recommendation as to:

- 1. What zones recreational marijuana uses should be located in.
- 2. Whether additional regulations are necessary for recreational marijuana uses (i.e. Conditional Use Permits, use specific regulations, similar to the County's winery standards, etc), .

After receiving the Planning Commission's recommendation, the Board will review it, and also consider whether an outright ban, or prohibition on recreational marijuana land uses until the uses are allowed by Federal Law, is a preferred option to the options set forth above.

Rural and Resource Areas are Protected

Agricultural and rural uses define the character of Walla Walla County. Recreational marijuana production and processing facilities, if allowed, should not jeopardize the continuation of uses already allowed in agricultural and rural areas or the character of those areas. Retail sales facilities should not be allowed.

Rural Activity Centers are Protected

Rural activity centers are important small communities in the county. While limited in size, they contain a mix of residential, commercial, and industrial uses thereby providing a variety of functions for area residents that should be protected. Recreational marijuana facilities, if allowed, should not adversely impact the character of rural activity centers.

Residential Urban Growth Areas are Protected

Residential urban growth areas are zoned for urban-density residential uses to accommodate the planned population growth of the cities. Ensuring that these areas remain available for future urban residential uses is a requirement of both the comprehensive plan and the growth management Act. Recreational marijuana facilities are inconsistent with residential uses and should not be allowed in residential urban growth areas.

Adjacent City, State and County Uses are Protected

County, State and City lands that adjoin Walla Walla County lands contain a wide variety of uses. Recreational marijuana facilities, if allowed, should not adversely impact the continuation of existing uses on county or city lands adjacent to Walla Walla County lands.

Security Measures are Required

Security measures to protect both a property owner's investment and the general public should be required. Measures to prevent theft or the destruction of recreational marijuana facilities should be required.

Regulations are Specific

Recommended regulations should be specific enough that applicants, owners and the general public clearly understand what is expected for a production, processing, or retail sale facility to be allowed. Conditions, if imposed, should be easily understood and specific.

Administration and Law Enforcement Should Not be Negatively Impacted

Recommended regulations should be capable of being administered and enforced within the existing resources of the county. Public spending priorities for County services, including law enforcement, within

rural areas are to maintain or upgrade services at rural level standards to existing, not new, development. Recreational marijuana facilities should not cause unmitigated impacts or otherwise encumber public services.

The Process should meet County Code Requirements and Include Public Participation

The process should be consistent with county code requirements for amendments to the comprehensive plan and development regulations, as applicable, and provide ample opportunity for public review and comment.

Recommendations Conform to Applicable Laws and Federal Law Enforcement Priorities

Recommendations must comply with WAC 314-55 and the following Federal law enforcement priorities in the August 29, 2013 U.S. Attorney memo:

- Preventing the distribution of marijuana to minors;
- Preventing revenue from the sale of marijuana from going to criminal enterprises, gangs and cartels;
- Preventing the diversion of marijuana from states where it is legal under state law in some form to other states:
- Preventing state-authorized marijuana activity from being used as a cover or pretext for the trafficking of other illegal drugs or other illegal activity;
- Preventing violence and the use of firearms in the cultivation and distribution of marijuana;
- Preventing drugged driving and the exacerbation of other adverse public health consequences associated with marijuana use:
- Preventing the growing of marijuana on public lands and the attendant public safety and environmental dangers posed by marijuana production on public lands; and
- Preventing marijuana possession or use on federal property
