"Glamping " At Kennedy Park

"Glamping" is defined as "a form of camping involving accommodation and facilities more luxurious than those associated with traditional camping. The term combines "glamour" and "camping."

Webster County has recently joined the growing national "glamping" trend by offering two full-service yurts. The yurts were identified as a potential revenue-producing project during the development of the Kennedy Park Master Plan.

The yurts offer a unique stay at Kennedy Park for people that may have an interest in camping , but don't want to invest in a camper or give up their "comforts of home."

Each yurt offers a kitchen, bathroom, bulk beds, soft-sleeper, airconditioning, deck, fire pit and grill. They rent for \$100 per night and can be reserved at www.mycountyparks.com.

The project was made possible through the generous support of the Webster County Board of Supervisors and work by area contractors Klein Construction, Bergman Plumbing, Baker Electric, Bemrich Electric, Gudmonson Services and the talented Webster County Conservation Staff.

WCCB Area Spotlight

Badger Lake Trail Bridge

If you are one of the hundreds of trail users at Kennedy Park looking for "social distancing" activities close to home, you have probably noticed the newest attraction recently added to the trail system. A 180-foot pedestrian bridge has been placed across the north-finger of the lake, connecting the Children's Forest/Veteran's Memorial Park to the dog training area located on the north-side of Badger Lake.

The bridge replaces a wooden bridge that was removed over five years ago due to safety concerns. The new bridge is located closer to the main lake, providing an opportunity to improve the trail-user and fishing experiences.

In addition to the 180-foot bridge, a 30-foot bridge was

also installed across the lake's spillway. The existing bridge was nearing the end of it's life and was too narrow to allow the department's mowers and utility vehicles to maintain the trail system.

The bridge projects were completed by Custom Manufacturing Co. from Wisconsin. The \$130,000 project was made possible through the generous support of the Webster County Board of Supervisors.

The bridges have been a popular attraction for trail-users and fishermen.

- 5 Stand Up Paddle Boards must be used on Badger Lake and rented on a 2 hour basis
- Must be at least 18 years old to rent

What you need to bring

- Cash or check—must be paid in full at time of rental!
- Photo ID and/or Current Driver's License
- Proof of completion of safe paddling course
