8,000 BICYCLISTS TO TRAVEL THROUGH YELM THIS WEEKEND



Great events continue to cycle through our new City Park! We have another great weekend of activities ahead with the Yelm Farmers Market and Annual Seattle to Portland bike ride this weekend! WSDOT expects more than 8,000 cyclists to travel through Yelm July 13–14, so please be patient and allow extra travel time.

For the third consecutive year, the Yelm City Park and Community Center will serve as an official 'mini stop' at mile marker 73, sponsored by KIND Snacks, in partnership with Cascade Bicycle Club, Yelm Community Schools Sports Medicine and FFA Alumni, and the S. E. Thurston Fire Authority.

Yelm High School sports medicine students will be on hand to treat minor abrasions, strains and blisters, while the Fire Authority will be there to provide backup for more serious injuries. Locally grown fruit, vegetables, and handmade products can be found at the Farmers Market on McKenzie Street, in front of the Public Safety Building.

The City of Yelm Police Department and Public Works Department will be directing cyclists as they travel from Yelm Avenue through 3rd Street, Mossman Avenue, 2nd Street, and across 507 to the Yelm-Tenino Trail. Second Street will be closed from Mossman to Washington for the Farmer's Market.

Thank you to all of our residents for your patience and caution of the cyclists traversing the region this weekend. YELM WATER TOWER RESTORATION PLANNED TO BEGIN THIS SUMMER



Among the many improvements being made in our City this summer, the Yelm water tower restoration project is anticipated to begin this summer, thanks to the advocacy of our local residents and business owners.

Before long, the iconic tower will be a community art piece in the heart of town with fresh paint and outfitted with LED lighting with an impressive arrangement of different features and colors to coincide with the holidays and other special events. The project will also include new fencing, landscaping and an interpretive kiosk to tell the story.

The decommissioned tower was put on the state Department of Archaeology & Historic Preservation in 2017 and is maintained by "Save the Historic Yelm Water Tower," which was founded by local business owner Steve Craig. Craig advocated for the nearly \$500,000 allocated to the nonprofit to complete this project and anticipates the preparation, sanding, and painting will be finished before the end of summer with the lighting expected to be complete by the end of the year.

The 125-foot, 500,000 gallon water tower was built in 1946 by the Chicago Bridge & Iron Company to replace the two 1,000 gallon pressurized tanks when Yelm was added to the Thurston County Fire District No. 2 in 1946. The tower was placed on the Washington Department of Archeology and Historic Preservation historic register in June 2017. The tower is maintained by the nonprofit, whose members include Craig, Margaret Clapp, Barrie Wilcox, EJ Curry, and Beverly Vines Haines.

The tower is a big part of our history and served as the foundation that allowed us to grow into the community that we are today and continues to serve



as a reminder of our past and a familiar welcome sign when coming into town. We are appreciative of the efforts by the nonprofit to save the tower and look forward to seeing the 125-foot structure come back to life as a community art piece that we can all be proud of!

2018 WATER QUALITY REPORT SHOWS CLEAN, HEALTHY SUPPLY




One of our top priorities is to provide residents with safe, dependable drinking water and to protect our water resources.

COUNCIL ADOPTS UPDATED SIX-YEAR TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PLAN



City Council on Tuesday, approved the updated six-year Transportation Improvement Plan that will include many street and sidewalk improvement projects to increase pedestrian safety and reduce traffic in Yelm.

This year, we have already completed the Fort Stevens Sidewalk project, eliminated more than 400 trip hazards on existing sidewalks throughout the City, and adopted the downtown corridor plan. In the updated plan, we look forward to the completion of the Bypass, extending Mossman Avenue through to Longmire, and adding multiple sidewalks to make our City more walkable.

According to the downtown corridor study conducted by SCJ Alliance, The Yelm Bypass, formally known as the Yelm Loop will reduce the amount of regional and truck traffic through town, while "miniloops, including extending Mossman to Longmire Street will further reduce traffic by offering route alternatives both north and south of Yelm Avenue. With the additional traffic flow on Longmire with the extension of Mossman, the transportation plan includes a street light at Longmire and Yelm Avenue.

Along with street improvements, the transportation Improvement Plan accounts for many pedestrian improvements, including the addition of sidewalks on Mill Road connecting dozens of residential houses to Mill Pond Elementary and Ridgeline Middle School, 2nd Street sidewalk improvements to better connect the City parks and services. The plan also includes the connection of the Yelm-Tenino Trail to the Rail Trail which will connect to Roy.

We look forward to improving traffic flow, enhancing pedestrian safety and enhancing downtown vitality by better connecting residents to services. This plan will act as a guiding document in prioritizing projects for the betterment of Yelm.
