RECOMMENDATION:

That the Yuba County Board of Supervisors approve a five (5) year Lease Agreement with the Olivehurst Linda Little League for the use of their field in support of our Parks Master Pidn in exchange for our assistance with critical facility improvements.

BACKGROUND:

In FY 2012 – 2013, the Community Development and Services Agency budgeted \$10,000 in improvements for the Olivehurst Linda Little League complex on Pasado Road. A component of this project is also the execution of a five (5) year lease which would allow the County free access for functions pursuant to its ongoing recreation program.

The scheduled improvements will include minor improvements into the facility and basic baseball field rehabilitation.

DISCUSSION:

The attached lease agreement with the Olivehurst Linda Little League will give the County free, unobstructed access to the facility when not otherwise occupied for Little League games for the purpose of expanding outdoor recreational programming into the Olivehurst and Linda areas as demand increases.

COMMITTEE ACTION:

On October 9, 2012, the Land Use and Public Works Committee recommended approval by your full Board.

FISCAL IMPACT:

LEASE AGREEMENT

THIS SUBLEASE is made and entered into this _____ day of ______ 2012, by and between OLIVEHURST LINDA LITTLE LEAGUE, a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation (herein referenced as "Sublessor"), and the COUNTY OF YUBA, a political subdivision of the State of California (hereinafter called "Sublessee"):

RECITALS:

1. Sublessor is the Lessee of the real property commonly known as OLIVEHURST LINDA LITTLE LEAGUE PARK COMPLEX (hereafter "the Park"), owned in fee simple by the Marysville Joint Unified School District, and as further illustrated attached hereto as Exhibit A.

2. The purpose of this lease is to permit and encourage the development of recreational facilities as identified by the Yuba County Parks Master Plan for the general Linda and Olivehurst area of Yuba County, State of California. The portion of the property illustrated in Exhibit A, excluding the "snack bar" facility, is hereby incorporated as the subject of this lease (hereafter "the Leased Premises").

AGREEMENTS:

It is mutually agreed by the parties hereto as follows:

1. <u>Lease of Property</u> – Sublessor, in consideration of the rent provided herein and the performance of all covenants of this agreement, leases to the Sublessee the Leased Premises, illustrated in Exhibit A, attached hereto. 2. <u>Rent</u> – County of Yuba will pay rent to Olivehurst Linda Little League in the total amount of \$1.00 to be paid upon the commencement of this Lease.

3. <u>Term</u> – The term of this lease shall be five (5) years. The term will commence upon the execution of this lease and end on the _____ day of _____, 2017. Upon the termination of this lease there shall be an option to extend this Agreement for an additional 5 years.

4. <u>Site Administration</u> – All Site Administration of the facilities described in this Agreement shall be solely conducted and paid for by the Sublessor, unless otherwise agreed upon by both parties as an amendment to this Agreement.

5. <u>Maintenance</u> – All maintenance of the facilities described in this Agreement shall be solely conducted and paid for by the Sublessor, unless otherwise agreed upon by both parties as an amendment to this Agreement.

6. <u>Use of Premises</u> – Sublessee agrees that the Leased Premises and the improvements thereon shall be made reasonably available for the use and furtherance of general recreational activities and services for the benefit of the public, so as to not conflict with normal Little League functions. No other improvements may be erected, constructed or emplaced on the Leased Premises by the Sublessee, whether they are temporary or permanent, without the prior express written consent of the Sublessor.

7. <u>Public Access</u> – The property and/or improvements described in this Agreement in general shall be made available to the public through Yuba County Recreation Program classes when not in use for Little League functions.

8. <u>Indemnity</u> - The Sublessor shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify the Sublessee, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims of any third party

arising from Sublessor's ownership, operation or maintenance of the Park, including the Leased Premises, except and to the extent such claims arise from the negligent acts or omissions of Sublessee.

The Sublessee shall hold harmless and indemnify the Sublessor, its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims arising from Sublessee's exercise of the rights granted herein, including Sublessee's exercise of Site Control in accordance with Paragraph 4, except and to the extent such claims arise from the negligent acts or omissions of Sublessor.

9. <u>Modification</u> – Modification of the terms of this lease may be made by mutual agreement in writing of the parties without further consideration.

10. <u>Notice</u> – All notices provided to be given herein shall be addressed to Sublessor:



RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board authorize staff to apply for grant funds made available by First Five Yuba to prolong the successful Recreation Coordinator Program by funding the popular scholarship program for two additional years.

BACKGROUND:

The First Five Yuba Commission is currently soliciting proposals for programs supporting their strategic plan initiatives. It is staff's intent to submit a proposal to support the recreational scholarship program for 0-5 year olds, and their families, for two additional years.

DISCUSSION:

Having expired June 30, 2012, the First Five Yuba grant, which helped conceive the Yuba County Recreation Program, demonstrated that through collaboration seemingly insurmountable challenges can be overcome. True to its original intent, in four short years the grant was used to seed what has now become a self-sustained recreation program. Through partnerships, the County is able to offer programming to the community without subsidy from the general fund

If awarded an additional round of First Five Yuba funds, we will have the means to provide a foundation of programming for another generation of Yuba County children by offering scholarships to income dependent families. To measure the impact of this program, and the effect it has had on our community, staff has gleaned the following total attendance statistics from the past year of programming facilitated by Yuba County Recreation:

SUBJECT: RATIFY CONTRACT AWARD WITH TAYLOR EXCAVATING FOR MARYSVILLE ROAD SLIDE STABILIZATION

RECOMMENDATION:

The Public Works Department recommends that the Board of Supervisors ratify the emergency contract with Taylor Excavating for the Marysville Road slide stabilization.

BACKGROUND:

During winter storms a slide was discovered along a section of Marysville Road constructed in 1970 located between Bullards Bar Dam and Moonshine Road. The slide was located in a fill section on the downhill side of the roadway which left a vertical drop-off adjacent to the roadway shoulder ranging between 10 and 20 feet in height. The slide area consisted of slumped and rotated material approximately 250 feet wide by 180 feet long. Public Works conducted a site inspection and a review of the as-built plans and determined that a 36"-inch metal culvert and an 8-inch perforated metal pipe had separated and were running water directly into the embankment material.

DISCUSSION:

As an emergency measure a contractor was hired to stabilize the roadway and keep it open for traffic. The contractor excavated along the disrupted pipes to provide a path for the water saturating the embankment to drain out, fallen vegetation was removed to allow access, and the site was stabilized with embankment material brought in to prevent the slide from encroaching into the roadway. The existing pipes were replaced from the points of separation to the outlets. The project was constructed on a time and material basis as an emergency contract because it was necessary to stabilize the roadway and ensure a catastrophic failure did not occur. The site was monitored and the emergency contract was left open through this fall, in case additional work was required.

COMMITTEE ACTION:

The Land Use & Public Works Committee was bypassed as the services for this project are complete and the contract is being ratified.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The contractor's work for the emergency stabilization was completed on a time and materials basis for \$205,000. The work was funded by the Road Fund.

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AGREEMENT FOR EMERGENCY PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT for construction services ("Agreement") is made as of the Agreement Date set forth below by and between the County of Yuba, a political subdivision of the State of California ("the COUNTY"), and

Taylor Excavating "CONTRACTOR"

In consideration of the Services to be rendered, the sums to be paid, and each and every covenant and condition contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

OPERATIVE PROVISIONS

1. SERVICES.

The CONTRACTOR shall provide those services described in Attachment "A", Provision A-1. CONTRACTOR shall provide said services at the time, place and in the manner specified in Attachment "A", Provisions A-2 through A-3.

2. TERM.

Commencement Date: May 1, 2011

Termination Date: September 30, 2012 December 3, 2011 BT $10^{-B^{-12}}$

Notwithstanding the term set forth above, and unless this contract is terminated by either party prior to its termination date, the term of the Agreement may be automatically extended up to ninety (90) days. Any Notice of Termination during this automatic extension period shall be effective upon a ten (10) day written notice to the other party. The purpose of this automatic extension is to allow for continuation of services, and to allow County time in which to complete a novation or renewal contract for CONTRACTOR AND COUNTY approval.

CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that there is no representation, implication, or understanding that the services provided by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement will be purchased by COUNTY under a new agreement following expiration or termination of this Agreement, and CONTRACTOR waives all rights or claims to notice or hearing respecting any failure to continue purchase of all or any such services from CONTRACTOR.

3. PAYMENT.

COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR for services rendered pursuant to this Agreement at the time and in the amount set forth in Attachment "B". The payment specified in Attachment "B" shall be the only payment made to CONTRACTOR for services rendered pursuant to this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall submit all billings for said services to COUNTY in the manner specified in Attachment "B".

4. FACILITIES, EQUIPMENT AND OTHER MATERIALS AND OBLIGATIONS OF COUNTY.

CONTRACTOR shall, at its sole cost and expense, furnish all facilities, equipment, and other materials which may be required for furnishing services pursuant to this Agreement, unless an exception to this requirement is provided in Attachment "A", Provision A-4.

5. ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS.

Those additional provisions unique to this Agreement are set forth in Attachment "C".

6. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

The general provisions set forth in Attachment "D" are part of this Agreement. Any inconsistency between said general provisions and any other terms or conditions of this Agreement shall be controlled by the other term or condition insofar as it is inconsistent with the general provisions.

7. DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVES.

<u>The Director of Public Works</u>, is the representative of the COUNTY and will administer this Agreement for the COUNTY. <u>Barry Taylor</u> is the authorized representative for CONTRACTOR. Changes in designated representatives shall occur only by advance written notice to the other party.

8. ATTACHMENTS.

All attachments referred to herein are attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein. Attachments include:

PAYMENT

COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR as follows:

B.1 BASE CONTRACT FEE. COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR a contract fee not to exceed **Two Hundred Five Thousand Dollars** (\$ 205,000); CONTRACTOR shall submit requests for payment after completion of services or no later than the tenth (10th) day of the month following provision of services. In no event shall total compensation paid to CONTRACTOR under this Provision B.1 exceed Two Hundred Five Thousand dollars (\$ 205,000) without a formal written amendment to this Agreement approved by the COUNTY.

B.2 TRAVEL COSTS. COUNTY shall not pay CONTRACTOR for meals, lodging or other travel costs not included in this Agreement unless said costs are approved in advance by the COUNTY representative (Operative Provision 7) and then COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR per diem rates in effect on the date of invoice upon presentation of invoices.

B.3 AUTHORIZATION REQUIRED. Services performed by CONTRACTOR and not authorized in this Agreement shall not be paid for by COUNTY. Payment for additional services shall be made to CONTRACTOR by COUNTY if, and only if, this Agreement is amended by both parties in advance of performing additional services.

D.1.1 All acts of CONTRACTOR shall be performed as an independent Contractor and not as an agent, officer or employee of COUNTY. It is understood by both CONTRACTOR and COUNTY that this Agreement is by and between two independent parties and is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture or association.

D.1.2 CONTRACTOR shall have no claim against COUNTY for employee rights or benefits, including, but not limited to, seniority, vacation time, vacation pay, sick leave, personal time off, overtime, medical, dental or hospital benefits, civil service protection, disability retirement benefits, paid holidays or other paid leaves of absence.

D.1.3 CONTRACTOR is solely obligated to pay all applicable taxes, deductions and other obligations, including, but not limited to, federal and state income taxes, withholding and Social Security taxes, unemployment and disability insurance and Workers' Compensation and Medi-Care payments.

D.1.4 As an independent Contractor, CONTRACTOR is not subject to the direction and control of COUNTY except as to the final result contracted for under this Agreement. COUNTY may not require CONTRACTOR to change its manner of doing business, but may require it to redirect its efforts to accomplish what it has agreed to do.

D.1.5 CONTRACTOR may provide services to others during the same period service is provided to COUNTY under this Agreement.

D.1.6 If in the performance of this Agreement any third persons are employed by CONTRACTOR, such persons shall be entirely and exclusively under the direction, supervision and control of CONTRACTOR. All terms of employment including hours, wages, working conditions, discipline, hiring and discharging or any other term of employment or requirements of law shall be determined by the CONTRACTOR.

D.1.7 As an independent Contractor, CONTRACTOR hereby indemnifies and holds COUNTY harmless from any and all claims that may be made against COUNTY based on any contention by any third party that an employer-employee relationship exists by reason of this Agreement.

D.2 LICENSES, PERMITS, ETC. CONTRACTOR represents and warrants to COUNTY that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications, and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for CONTRACTOR to practice its profession. CONTRACTOR represents and warrants to COUNTY that CONTRACTOR shall, at its sole cost and expense, keep in effect or obtain at all times during the term of this Agreement, any licenses, permits, and approvals which are legally required for CONTRACTOR to practice its profession at the time the services are performed. Failure of the CONTRACTOR to comply with this provision shall authorize the COUNTY to immediately terminate this agreement notwithstanding any other provision in this agreement to the contrary.

D.3 TIME. CONTRACTOR shall devote such time to the performance of services pursuant to this Agreement as may be reasonably necessary for the satisfactory performance of CONTRACTOR's obligations pursuant to this Agreement. Neither party shall be considered in default of this Agreement to the extent performance is prevented or delayed by any cause, present or future, which is beyond the reasonable control of the party.

D.4 INDEMNITY. CONTRACTOR shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless COUNTY, its elected and appointed councils, boards, commissions, officers, agents, and employees from any liability for damage or claims for damage for personal injury, including death, as well as for property damage, which may arise from the intentional or negligent acts or omissions of CONTRACTOR in the performance of services rendered under this Agreement by CONTRACTOR, or any of CONTRACTOR's officers, agents, employees, contractors, or subcontractors.

D.5 CONTRACTOR NOT AGENT. Except as COUNTY may specify in writing, CONTRACTOR shall have no authority, express or implied, to act on behalf of COUNTY in any capacity whatsoever as an agent. CONTRACTOR shall have no authority, express or implied, pursuant to this Agreement to bind COUNTY to any obligation whatsoever.

D.6 ASSIGNMENT PROHIBITED. CONTRACTOR may not assign any right or obligation pursuant to this Agreement. Any attempted or purported assignment of any right or obligation pursuant to this Agreement shall be void and of no legal effect.

D.7 PERSONNEL. CONTRACTOR shall assign only competent personnel to perform services pursuant to this Agreement. In the event that COUNTY, in its sole discretion, at any time during the term of this Agreement, desires the removal of any person or persons assigned by CONTRACTOR to perform services pursuant to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall remove any such person immediately upon receiving written notice from COUNTY of its desire for

removal of such person or persons.

D.8 STANDARD OF PERFORMANCE. CONTRACTOR shall perform all services required pursuant to this Agreement in the manner and according to the standards observed by a competent practitioner of the profession in which CONTRACTOR is engaged. All products of whatsoever nature which CONTRACTOR delivers to COUNTY pursuant to this Agreement shall be prepared in a first class and workmanlike manner and shall conform to the standards or quality normally observed by a person practicing in CONTRACTOR's profession.

D.9 POSSESSORY INTEREST. The parties to this Agreement recognize that certain rights to property may create a "possessory interest", as those words are used in the California Revenue and Taxation Code, §107. For all purposes of compliance by COUNTY with Section 107.6 of the California Revenue and Taxation Code, this recital shall be deemed full compliance by the COUNTY. All questions of initial determination of possessory interest and valuation of such interest, if any, shall be the responsibility of the County Assessor and the contracting parties hereto. A taxable possessory interest may be created by this contract; and if created, the party in whom such an interest is vested will be subject to the payment of property taxes levied on such an interest.

D.10 TAXES. CONTRACTOR hereby grants to the COUNTY the authority to deduct from any payments to CONTRACTOR any COUNTY imposed taxes, fines, penalties and related charges which are delinquent at the time such payments under this Agreement are due to CONTRACTOR.

D.11 TERMINATION. Upon termination of this Agreement as otherwise provided herein, CONTRACTOR shall immediately cease rendering service upon the termination date and the following shall apply:

D.11.1 CONTRACTOR shall deliver copies of all writings prepared by it pursuant to this Agreement. The term "writings" shall be construed to mean and include: handwriting, typewriting, printing, photostating, photographing, and every other means of recording upon any tangible thing and form of communication or representation, including letters, words, pictures, sounds, or symbols, or combinations thereof.

D.11.2 COUNTY shall have full ownership and control of all such writings or other communications delivered by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement.

D.11.3 COUNTY shall pay CONTRACTOR the reasonable value of services rendered by CONTRACTOR to the date of termination pursuant to this Agreement not to exceed the amount documented by CONTRACTOR and approved by COUNTY as work accomplished to date; provided, however, COUNTY shall not in any manner be liable for lost profits which might have been made by CONTRACTOR had CONTRACTOR

completed the services required by this Agreement. In this regard, CONTRACTOR shall furnish to COUNTY such financial information as in the judgment of the COUNTY is necessary to determine the reasonable value of the services rendered by CONTRACTOR. In the event of a dispute as to the reasonable value of the services rendered by CONTRACTOR, the decision of the COUNTY shall be final. The foregoing is cumulative and does not affect any right or remedy which COUNTY may have in law or equity.

CONTRACTOR may terminate its services under this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the COUNTY, without liability for damages, if CONTRACTOR is not compensated according to the provisions of the Agreement or upon any other material breach of the Agreement by COUNTY.

D.12 NON-DISCRIMINATION. Throughout the duration of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall not unlawfully discriminate against any employee of the CONTRACTOR or of the COUNTY or applicant for employment or for services or any member of the public because of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, physical or mental disability, medical condition, marital status, age, sex or sexual orientation. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that in the provision of services under this Agreement, its employees and applicants for employment and any member of the public are free from such discrimination. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code Section 12900, et seq.). The applicable regulations of the Fair Employment Housing Commission implementing Government Code Section 12900, set forth in Chapter 5, Division 4 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations are incorporated into this Agreement by reference and made a part hereof as if set forth in full. CONTRACTOR shall also abide by the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 and all amendments thereto, and all administrative rules and regulations issued pursuant to said Act. CONTRACTOR shall give written notice of its obligations under this clause to any labor agreement. CONTRACTOR shall include the non-discrimination and compliance provision of this paragraph in all subcontracts to perform work under this Agreement.

D.13 REHABILITATION ACT OF 1973/AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT OF

1990. In addition to application of the non-discrimination provision of this Agreement, above, CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with all provisions of section 504 et seq. of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and with all provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, and all amendments thereto, and all administrative rules and regulations issued pursuant to said Acts, pertaining to the prohibition of discrimination against qualified handicapped and disabled persons, in all programs or activities, as to employees or recipients of services.

D.14 OWNERSHIP OF INFORMATION. All professional and technical information developed under this Agreement and all work sheets, reports, and related data shall become the property of COUNTY, and CONTRACTOR agrees to deliver reproducible copies of such documents to COUNTY on completion of the services hereunder. The COUNTY agrees to indemnify and hold CONTRACTOR harmless from any claim arising out of reuse of the information for other than this project.

D.15 WAIVER. A waiver by any party of any breach of any term, covenant or condition herein contained or a waiver of any right or remedy of such party available hereunder at law or in equity shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant or condition herein contained or of any continued or subsequent right to the same right or remedy. No party shall be deemed to have made any such waiver unless it is in writing and signed by the party so waiving.

D.16 COMPLETENESS OF INSTRUMENT. This Agreement, together with its specific references and attachments, constitutes all of the agreements, understandings, representations, conditions, warranties and covenants made by and between the parties hereto. Unless set forth herein, neither party shall be liable for any representations made express or implied.

D.17 SUPERSEDES PRIOR AGREEMENTS. It is the intention of the parties hereto that this Agreement shall supersede any prior agreements, discussions, commitments, representations, or agreements, written or oral, between the parties hereto.

D.18 CAPTIONS. The captions of this Agreement are for convenience in reference only and the words contained therein shall in no way be held to explain, modify, amplify or aid in the interpretation, construction or meaning of the provisions of this Agreement.

D.19 DEFINITIONS. Unless otherwise provided in this Agreement, or unless the context otherwise requires, the following definitions and rules of construction shall apply herein.

D.19.1 NUMBER AND GENDER. In this Agreement, the neuter gender includes the feminine and masculine, and the singular includes the plural, the word "person" includes corporations, partnerships, firms or associations, wherever the context so requires.

D.19.2 MANDATORY AND PERMISSIVE. "Shall" and "will" and "agrees" are mandatory. "May" is permissive.

D.20 TERM INCLUDES EXTENSIONS. All references to the term of this Agreement or the Agreement Term shall include any extensions of such term.

D.21 SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS. All representations, covenants and warranties specifically set forth in this Agreement, by or on behalf of, or for the benefit of any or all of the parties hereto, shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of such party, its successors and assigns.

D.22 MODIFICATION. No modification or waiver of any provision of this Agreement or its attachments shall be effective unless such waiver or modification shall be in writing, signed by all parties, and then shall be effective only for the period and on the condition, and for the specific instance for which given.

D.23 COUNTERPARTS. This Agreement may be executed simultaneously and in several counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

D.24 OTHER DOCUMENTS. The parties agree that they shall cooperate in good faith to accomplish the object of this Agreement and to that end, agree to execute and deliver such other and further instruments and documents as may be necessary and convenient to the fulfillment of these purposes.

D.25 PARTIAL INVALIDITY. If any term, covenant, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remainder of the provision and/or provisions shall remain in full force and effect and shall in no way be affected, impaired or invalidated.

D.26 JURISDICTION. It is agreed by the parties hereto that unless otherwise expressly waived by them, any action brought to enforce any of the provisions hereof or for declaratory relief hereunder shall be filed and remain in a Court of competent jurisdiction in the County of Yuba, State of California.

D.27 CONTROLLING LAW. The validity, interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be controlled by and construed under the laws of the State of California.

D.28 TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE. Time is of the essence of this Agreement and each covenant and term a condition herein.

D.29 AUTHORITY. All parties to this Agreement warrant and represent that they have the power and authority to enter into this Agreement in the names, titles and capacities herein stated and on behalf of any entities, persons, estates or firms represented or purported to be represented by such entity(s), person(s), estate(s) or firm(s) and that all formal requirements necessary or required by any state and/or federal law in order to enter into this Agreement have been fully complied with. Further, by entering into this Agreement, neither party hereto shall have breached the terms or conditions of any other contract or agreement to which such party is obligated, which such breach would have a material effect hereon.

D.30 CONFLICT OF INTEREST. Neither a COUNTY employee whose position in COUNTY enables such employee to influence the award of this Agreement or any competing Agreement, nor a spouse or economic dependent of such employee, shall be employed in any capacity by CONTRACTOR herein, or have any other direct or indirect financial interest in this Agreement.

CONTRACTOR may be subject to the disclosure requirements of the COUNTY conflict of interest code if in a position to make decisions or influence decisions that could have an effect on

the CONTRACTOR's financial interest. The County Administrator shall determine in writing if CONTRACTOR has been hired to perform a range of duties that is limited in scope and thus is not required to fully comply with the disclosure requirements described in the Yuba County Conflict of Interest Code.

ATTACHMENT E

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

E.1 MINIMUM SCOPE OF INSURANCE. CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder and the results of that work by the CONTRACTOR, his agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors. If CONTRACTOR fails to maintain the Insurance provided herein, COUNTY may secure such insurance and deduct the cost thereof from any funds owing to CONTRACTOR.

E.1.1 Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- a. Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability coverage (occurrence Form CG 00 01).
- b. Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 00 01 covering Automobile Liability, code 1 (any auto).
- c. Worker's Compensation insurance as required by the State of California and Employer's Liability Insurance.
- **E.1.2 Minimum Limits of Insurance.** CONTRACTOR shall maintain limits no less than:

1. General Liability: (including operations, products and completed operations.)	\$ <u>1,000,000</u>	Per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage. If Commercial General Liability insurance or other form with a general aggregate limit is used, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
2. Automobile Liability:	<u>\$1,000,000</u>	Per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
3. Workers' Compensation:	As required by	the State of California.
4. Employer's Liability:	<u>\$1,000,000</u>	Each accident, \$1,000,000 policy limit bodily injury by disease, \$1,000,000 each employee bodily injury by disease.

E.1.3 Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions. Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the COUNTY. At the option of the COUNTY, either: the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions as respects the COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers; or the CONTRACTOR shall provide a financial guarantee satisfactory to the COUNTY guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses.

E.1.4 Other Insurance Provisions. The general liability and automobile liability policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

(a) The COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as insureds with respect to liability arising out of automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by or on behalf of the CONTRACTOR; and with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the CONTRACTOR including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General Liability coverage shall be provided in the form of an Additional Insured endorsement (CG 20 10 11 85 or equivalent) to the CONTRACTOR's insurance policy, or as a separate owner's policy.

(b) For any claims related to this project, the CONTRACTOR's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the County, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of the CONTRACTOR's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

(c) Each insurance policy required by this clause shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be canceled by either party, except after thirty (30) day's prior written notice has been provided to the COUNTY.

E.2 Waiver of Subrogation. CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to waive subrogation which any insurer of CONTRACTOR may acquire from CONTRACTOR by virtue of the payment of any loss. CONTRACTOR agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to effect this waiver of subrogation.

The Workers' Compensation policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the COUNTY for all worked performed by the CONTRACTOR, its employees, agents and subcontractors.

E.3 Acceptability of Insurers. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating if no less then A: VII unless otherwise acceptable to the COUNTY.

E.4. Verification of Coverage. CONTRACTOR shall furnish the COUNTY with original certificates and endorsements effecting coverage required by this clause. The endorsements

should be forms provided by the COUNTY or on other than the COUNTY's forms, provided those endorsements or policies conform to the requirements. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the COUNTY before work commences. However, failure to do so shall not operate as a waiver of these insurance requirements. The COUNTY reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements affecting the coverage required by these specifications at any time.

E.6 Sub-contractors. CONTRACTOR shall require and verify that all sub-contractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL OF FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT VARIANCE FOR AGRICULTURAL STORAGE BUILDING AT 7388 DOC ADAMS ROAD

RECOMMENDATION:

The Floodplain Manager recommends that the Board of Supervisors approve the application of a floodplain development variance for the agricultural storage building planned at 7388 Doc Adams Road, APN 018-340-017.

BACKGROUND:

The owners of 7388 Doc Adams Road, located west of SR 70, in District 10 are proposing to construct a concrete and steel agricultural building to support an existing farming operation. The new building will consist of a 650sf enclosed structure with a 500sf overhang. The building will be used to store tractors, hay and feed.

DISCUSSION:

Floodplain management regulations cannot be written to anticipate every imaginable situation. Yuba County Ordinance 10.30.090 "Variance Procedure" was adopted as a way to seek permission to vary from the letter of the rules because of a special situation. It is the Floodplain Manager's opinion that this is such a situation. The structure is for the storage and processing of agricultural equipment and products. Requesting a variance for wet flood-proofing this type of agricultural structure is one of the most common. It is specifically listed as allowable in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).

COMMITTEE ACTION:

The Land Use & Public Works Committee reviewed this application on October 9, 2012 and recommend approval.








Authorize Chair to execute Medical Malpractice Program Extended Participation Agreement.

Background:

The County's medical malpractice insurance is provided by CSAC-EIA with Lexington Insurance Company as its reinsurance partner. The Medical Malpractice Committee has asked Yuba County to provide a commitment to remain in the Program for the twoyear period from 10/1/12 to 10/1/14, in exchange for a premium reduction. As an incentive for making such a commitment by 1/1/13, those members who do so will receive a premium reduction as long as we also achieve commitments from members comprising at least 75% of the premium base.

Discussion:

The current coverage through Lexington expires on 10/1/13. The estimated cost savings from the one year extension is \$193. The overall costs of the medical malpractice program are less than it would cost the County to purchase coverage on its own. In fact, occurrence-based coverage is likely not available outside of the EIA's program.

CSAC Excess Insurance Authority Medical Malpractice Program Extended Participation Agreement

This Extended Participation Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between the CSAC-EIA ("EIA") and the participating members of the Medical Malpractice Program ("Program"), consisting of counties and other public entities ("Public Entity").

WHEREAS, on September 26, 2012, the EIA's Medical Malpractice Committee ("Committee") approved an extended participation requirement for participating members covering the period from October 1, 2012 to October 1, 2014 (two-years); and

WHEREAS, the Program's excess carrier, Lexington Insurance, has agreed to extend their coverage commitment to October 1, 2014 and have agreed to provide a discount in their premium to the Program if a minimum number of participating members individually commit to not withdraw from the Program for two years; and

WHEREAS, the Committee has approved a plan in which participating members will be given the choice of executing this Agreement in exchange for a premium reduction. If a participating member fails to execute this Agreement the participating member will not receive this reduction.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements made herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. **Premium Discount**. Participating members who execute this Agreement shall receive a discount in premium as approved by the Committee, subject to paragraph 3.
- 2. **Term of Agreement**. The term of this Agreement is two years beginning October 1, 2012 until October 1, 2014 and each participating member hereby agrees not to withdraw from this Agreement prior to October 1, 2014.
- 3. **Minimum Participation**. In order for the Program to receive the agreed discount a certain minimum number of participating members has been agreed to by the Committee and Lexington Insurance. If an insufficient number of participating members fail to execute this Agreement as set forth in paragraph 4, the Program will not receive the agreed discount. If the minimum participation is not met, individual participating members that executed this Agreement will not receive the agreed discount and will be released from the terms of this Agreement.
- 4. **Time for Execution of Agreement**. Participating members shall have until December 1, 2012, to execute this Agreement.

- 5. **Future Commitments**. Participating members agree that the Committee may consider such two-year commitments in the future.
- 6. **Agreement and Amendment.** This Agreement contains the entire understanding and agreement of the parties and there have been no promises, representations or agreements by any of the parties, either oral or written, of any character or nature hereafter binding except as set forth herein. This Agreement may be altered, amended or modified only by an instrument in writing, executed by the parties to this Agreement and by no other means.



A first step would be to appoint someone to represent the Board of Supervisors on the board of the Yuba County Museum of History. The representative need not be a member of the Board of Supervisors but someone who is interested in the history of Yuba County who would keep the Board informed of what is going on with the museum. Subject: Approve the Five-Year Report for the County Capital Facilities Fees

RECOMMENDATION:

Recommend the Board of Supervisors approve the attached Five-Year Report detailing the status of Yuba County's development impact fees pursuant to Government Code Section 66000.

BACKGROUND:

Government Code Section 66000 et. seq., also known as AB1600, requires local agencies to submit annual and 5-year reports detailing the status of their development impact fees. Pursuant to Government Code Section 66000, for the fifth fiscal year following the first deposit into the account or fund, and every 5 years after, the local agency is required to make specific findings with respect to the portion of the account or fund remaining unexpended, whether committed or uncommitted. The information in this report is presented to comply with the 5-year reporting requirements described above for the development impact fees, or commonly referred to in Yuba County as our County Capital Facilities Fees.

Development impact fees are a form of exaction imposed by local government on new development. Development impact fees are established to require development to pay its proportionate share of infrastructure and public facility costs. Generally speaking, development impacts fees are established to protect the health and safety of the public by providing adequate infrastructure and public facilities. Impact fees must be set based on an established relationship (i.e., nexus) between the impact of new development on public infrastructure and the cost of providing that infrastructure.

The June 16, 1992, Development Impact Fee Report, by David M. Griffith and Associates, LTD, originally established Yuba County's Capital Facilities Fee Program. Subsequently, the Capital Facilities Fee Program was updated in 2004 by MAXIMUS, Inc. (Yuba County Impact Fee Update Report). The updated report recalculated the impact fees by using the existing level of service standard-based and plan-based impact fee calculation method.

DISCUSSION:

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The County's Capital Facilities Fee Program funds certain capital improvements associated with general government, criminal justice, health and human services, libraries, law enforcement, park improvements, road improvements, and drainage. The Five-Year Report contains information from July 1, 2005, to June 30, 2012, and is presented to comply with the 5-year reporting requirements contained in Government Code section 66000 et. seq. The Report is not a budget document; rather, it is compiled to meet reporting requirements. The Report concludes that the funds collected were accounted for and utilized appropriately and that there is a need for the remaining funds.

COMMITTEE ACTION:

This matter involves a routine reporting action and is being presented to the full Board.

Subject: Loan to Road Fund from Plumas Lake Specific Plan Road Impact Fees (Trust 713)

Recommended Action:

Approve a loan of up to \$2 million from the Plumas Lake Specific Plan Road Impact Fee trust fund (Trust 713) to provide funding for temporary cash flow needs for Road Fund capital projects.

Discussion:

In order to maintain the active construction schedule for capital projects by Public Works, the Road Fund needs a funding source to pay vendors for work performed while awaiting reimbursement from the State. Staff recommends borrowing from Trust 713 on a temporary basis to cover cash shortfalls from the capital project construction program during the next six months. The loan amount would not exceed \$2 million and would be repaid, with interest, within the fiscal year after receiving reimbursement from the State.

The reimbursement wait times can range from six to twelve weeks. Consequently, timely payment for completed construction work is an important concern to keep projects moving forward. Providing a temporary cash flow relief to the Road Fund will ensure timely payment to our local contractors for construction work and keep our aggressive construction program on track.

Committee Action:

Due to time constraints this item was not taken to committee for action.

Fiscal Impact:

Plumas Lake Specific Plan Road Impact Fee trust fund (Trust 713) balance would be reduced during the borrowing period. The Trust 713 fund balance is currently approximately \$13.5 million and no capital projects requiring significant expenditures from Trust 713 are anticipated over the next

six months. Moving funds from Trust 713 to the Road Fund will be timed to coincide with payments to vendors. Upon reimbursement by the State, funds would be reimbursed to the Plumas Lake Specific Plan Road Impact Fee trust fund, with interest, as soon as possible.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: Receive report providing informational overview of General Election ballot initiatives. Take action, if desired.

Background & Discussion: Eleven initiatives are slated for the November 6 General Election ballot, including two proposed tax increases and three criminal justice proposals. The remaining six initiatives address local government, contributions to political candidates, auto insurance discounts, genetically engineered food, taxes for multi-state businesses and giving voters a say in Senate redistricting.

The attached information is intended to provide Board members with an overview of each initiative for the purpose of information. Extra attention is given to the two tax initiatives – Propositions 30 and 38 – in order to provide clarifications on the differences between the two.

Fiscal Impact: None

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OVERVIEW OF PROPOSITIONS 30-40

Eleven initiatives slated for the November 6, 2012 ballot cover a variety of issues. A summary of the initiatives follows:

PROPOSITIONS 30 and 38

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Proposition 30 is the tax proposal initiative put forward by Gov. Brown in a move to close an estimated \$6 billion shortfall in the State's budget, seeking to balance the state budget through 2018-19. The measure would temporarily increase the state sales tax rate by one-quarter cent for all taxpayers and the personal income tax (PIT) for upper-income taxpayers. Here are the details:

Increases sales tax by one-quarter cent for every dollar for four years

PIT on upper income taxpayers would remain in place for seven years

1% marginal tax rate for incomes \$500,000 to \$600,000

2% marginal tax rate for incomes \$600,000 to \$1 million

3% marginal tax rate for incomes above \$1 million

The States 2012-13 budget – already approved by the Legislature and signed by the Governor – assumes Prop 30 will pass. In the event the initiative is rejected by the votes, the budget contains trigger cuts. The largest hit would be to Schools and community colleges, which would see a cut of more than \$5.3 billion in the amounts currently budgeted. Another \$500 million would be cut from the UC and State University systems, with the remaining \$100 million coming from Department of Developmental Services, police department grants, CalFire, DWR, Fish and Game, Parks and Recreation, DOJ.

CSAC has endorsed Proposition 30, while RCRC has taken a neutral position.

Proposition 38 seeks to raise personal income taxes for most California taxpayers (all but the lowest income bracket) from 2013 through 2024, with the funds going to public schools, child care, preschool programs and state debt payment. The proposed additional marginal tax rate would start with 0.4% for joint filers with a taxable income of \$14,632-\$34,692 graduating along income ranges up to 2.2% increases for taxable incomes over \$5 million.

This initiative would provide 60 percent of funds for public schools, another 10 percent for early care and education, and the remaining 30 percent for debt service.

<u>Votes on Competing Initiatives</u> – Both Propositions 30 and 38 contain language that would allow the initiative garnishing the most yes votes to prevail, which is in line with provisions in the State Constitution.

Attached is the California Budget Project analysis of these two tax initiatives, providing a side-by-side comparisons.

PROPOSITION 31

This initiative would establish a constitutional amendment and create a statute relating to local government, the Legislature and the Governor, while also adjusting state and local government operations.

Prop 31 would authorize and fund local government plans, including transfers from state revenues to counties in which local governments implement plans to coordinate their public services. Local governments would be allowed to develop their own procedures for administering state-funded programs, while allowing them to transfer local property taxes among themselves.

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The initiative also restricts the Legislatures ability to pass bills that increase state costs or decrease revenues. Plus, any bills that do move forward must provide the public with at least three days to review the legislative language.

In certain situations the Governor would be given the ability to reduce state spending during declared fiscal emergencies. Prop 31 would change the budget span into a two year process, plus it would require state and local governments to evaluate the effectiveness of programs and describe how their budgets meet various objectives.

The proposition was drafted by California Forward after years of meeting with community groups and local agency representatives.

CSAC had a motion to support Proposition 31 but it did not receive a sufficient super-majority vote to grant CSAC's backing. RCRC has endorsed Proposition 31.

PROPOSITION 32

This is the initiative that would prohibit political contributions by payroll deductions. It is estimated that currently 2.5 million Californians are represented by labor unions, and many of the unions use some of the funds from payroll deductions to support activities not directly related to the collective bargaining process. These may include political contributions and independent expenditures, as well as spending to espouse political views to union members.

Prop 32 would change state campaign finance laws to restrict spending by public and private labor unions, corporations and government contractors. Essentially, money deducted from employee paychecks could not be used for "political purposes." That is, such funds could not be used for making political contributions to candidates, communicating to members or trying to influence voters. Political spending in federal campaigns would not be impacted by this measure.

Also, government contractors (including public sector labor unions with collective bargaining contracts) would be prohibited from contributing to elected officials who play a role in awarding their contracts.

PROPOSITION 33

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This initiative seeks to change California law in order to allow auto insurance companies to set prices based on a driver's history of insurance coverage. Basically, promoters of this proposition want to allow insurance companies to offer a "continuous coverage" discount to new customers who switch to their coverage from another insurer. Consumers would also be allowed this discount if they have a gap in their coverage that is not more than 90 days in the past five years or no more than 18 months if the gap was due to loss of employment. Active military service is also an allowable reason for having a gap in insurance coverage.

PROPOPSITION 34

Simply put: this measure seeks to repeal California's death penalty.

The initiative would repeal the current death penalty statute, generally require murderers to work while in prison, and it would provide new state funding for local law enforcement on a limited-term basis.

Prop 34 is expected to reduce some state and county costs with murder cases that would otherwise have been eligible for the death penalty under current law. The savings would be realized from shortened trials and also from the reduced need for attorneys that specialize in death penalty cases. Because of anticipated shorter murder trials, county jail costs would be reduced. Additional savings are expected in the reduced need for appellate litigation and lower prison costs.

PROPOSITION 35

This measure deals with penalties for human trafficking and sex offender registration. It would expand the definition of human trafficking and increase the punishment in such cases, while imposing fines that would be used to fund services for victims of this crime. In addition, it would change how some evidence can be used against victims and require law enforcement to receive additional training.

The definition of human trafficking, under Prop 35, would apply to those who create and distribute obscene materials depicting minors. Prison terms for labor trafficking would be bumped to a maximum 12 years per offense and sex trafficking up to 20 years per offense. Sex trafficking of minors that involve force or fraud could go up to life terms in prison.

PROPOSITION 36

This initiative seeks to make changes to California's Three Strikes Law by reducing related prison sentences by certain third strikers whose current (new) offenses are considered non-serious or non-violent felonies. Under this measure, resentencing of certain third strikers would be allowed for those currently serving life sentences for those specified felonies.

Rather than a minimum sentence of 25-years-to-life that is currently required, a third strike offense that falls under the "non-serious, non-violent" definition of Prop 36 would require a prison sentence that is twice the usual term for the new offence. There are some exceptions written into the initiative. Offenders whose current or prior offences that include some felonies related to drug, sex, and guns would still be subject to a life sentence.

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PROPOSITION 37

Genetically engineered (GE) food is the subject of this measure. There are three explicit state law changes that would result from this proposition:

- 1. GE foods sold would have to be properly labeled, including placing the words "Genetically Engineered" on the front of the package or label. Retailers would be required to make sure their food products are properly labeled.
- 2. The Department of Public Health would be required to regulate the labeling
- 3. Individuals would be allowed to sue food manufacturers who violate the labeling requirements. The LAO said this part of the initiative could result in additional costs to handle such cases both on the state and local levels.

PROPOSITION 39

This initiative came about in response to current state law that allows businesses operating in both California and other states (multi-state businesses) to pick one of two methods to determine the amount of their income would be taxable by the state. Of course, businesses would choose the method most advantageous to them. Prop 39 would eliminate the ability of the businesses to choose how taxable income is determined.

This measure also contains a mechanism for clean energy and energy efficiency funding by establishing a new state fund called the "Clean Energy Job Creation Fund." The fund could be used to support energy efficiency retrofits and alternative energy projects, as well has job training and workforce development programs relating to such projects. Revenues for this fund would come from monies raised through the new tax restrictions on multi-state businesses.

PROPOSITION 40

This measure would allow voters to approve or reject Senate district boundaries certified by Citizen Redistricting Commission. This initiative would not impact district boundaries established for the Assembly, Board of Equalization, and Congressional districts.



How Do Propositions 30 and 38 Compare?

The California Budget Project (CBP) recently released analyses of Proposition 30 and Proposition 38, two revenue measures that will appear on the November 6, 2012 statewide ballot. The table below provides a brief side-by-side comparison of key components of Propositions 30 and 38. The CBP has endorsed Proposition 30 and neither supports nor opposes Proposition 38.

A more in-depth examination of both measures can be found in two CBP reports that are the basis for this side-by-side analysis: *What Would Proposition 30 Mean for California*? and *What Would Proposition 38 Mean for California*?, available on the CBP's website (www.cbp.org). Also available there are prior CBP publications on two key policies that are referenced briefly in this table: the Proposition 98 school funding guarantee and the recent state-to-county "realignment" of public safety and health and human services programs (see *School Finance in California and the Proposition 98 Guarantee* and *Finishing the Job: Moving Realignment Toward Completion in 2012*).

RECOMMENDATION:

Consider the formation of an Underground Utility District along Olivehurst Avenue between McGowan Parkway and 8th Avenue, and recommend that the Board of Supervisors approve the Resolution to form Underground Utility District 2012-1.

BACKGROUND:

Pacific Gas & Electric (PG&E) annually allocates funds for the conversion of overhead utilities to underground facilities. The funds are allocated under the company's Rule 20, Section A (Rule 20A) which is based on the number of overhead service meters within the community. The funds are carried over to following years until the County commits to the conversion of overhead utilities to underground facilities. If the money is not committed to a project within 5 years of its allocation, then other governmental agencies with committed projects may claim portions of the funds for their projects.

Olivehurst Avenue is classified as an urban minor arterial and is the main corridor bisecting the community of Olivehurst. Significant improvements are slated for this segment of Olivehurst Avenue in the near future, including road widening, bike lanes, curbs, gutters, sidewalks, drainage improvements, and transit stops. To accommodate the proposed improvements, the existing power poles will need to be relocated. If the utilities are kept on poles, significant right of way impacts would occur, whereas undergrounding the utilities can be accommodated within the existing road right of way. Additionally, the aesthetic value of eliminating overhead powerlines helps showcase the proposed complete street project.

DISCUSSION:

Section 11.30.020 of the Yuba County Ordinance states that the Board of Supervisors may call for a public hearing to discuss the conversion of overhead utilities to underground facilities. After the public hearing, the Board of Supervisors may adopt a Resolution to designate an area an Underground Utility District.

We are requesting PG&E and other utility companies to underground their facilities prior to our proposed road improvements. The passage of a Resolution to create an Underground Utility District is the first step in the process to use Rule 20A funds. The Resolution forming an Underground Utility District needs to be adopted prior to PG&E performing any design work to underground its facilities.

The Rule 20A funds would also be used to fund trenching on the first 100 feet of private property and to fund the conversion of electrical panels on dwellings up to a maximum amount of \$1,500 each. This amount will cover the cost to convert the electrical panels in most cases. The typical cost for electrical panel conversion is \$1500 for residential and \$3000 for commercial.

The attached Resolution delineates the proposed boundary limits of the Underground Utility District. The Resolution also sets a timeline for conversion to underground facilities and for when utility poles are to be removed.

The Public Works Department recommends that a public hearing be held for discussion pertaining to the formation of the proposed Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District.

COMMITTEE ACTION:

The Land Use and Public Works Committee on October 4, 2012 recommended approval of the Resolution to form Underground Utility District No. 2012-01.

FISCAL IMPACT:

None. PG&E has approximately \$5,290,000 in reserve in Yuba County's Rule 20A account for overhead utility conversion to underground facilities.

WHEREAS, the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) has authorized electric and telecommunication utilities to convert overhead utility lines and facilities to underground pursuant to Electric Rule 20 and Telecommunication Rule 32; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to certain criteria, CPUC rules allow participating cities and counties to establish legislation authorizing the creation of underground utility districts within which existing overhead electric distribution and telecommunication distribution and service facilities will be converted to underground; and

WHEREAS, the County of Yuba, has adopted an ordinance authorizing the Board of Supervisors to designate areas within which all existing overhead poles, overhead wires and overhead equipment associated with the distribution of electric power, telecommunication services and cable television should be removed and replaced with underground wires and facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Works for the County of Yuba has consulted with the affected public utilities and such utilities have agreed that the proposed underground conversion district, designated the Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District and more particularly described in Exhibit 1 attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, meets the criteria established by the rules of the CPUC, to wit,

that such undergrounding will avoid or eliminate an unusually heavy concentration of overhead electric facilities; and

that the road right-of-way is extensively used by the general public and carries a heavy volume of pedestrian or vehicular traffic; and that the street or road or right-of-way is considered an arterial street or major collector as defined in the Governor's Office of Planning and Research General Plan Guidelines; and

WHEREAS, each year the County of Yuba is notified by PG&E regarding the allocation of work credits for conversion of overhead electric distribution lines and facilities to underground, known as Rule 20A allocations; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Works for the County of Yuba has consulted with PG&E and determined that the County has accumulated Rule 20A work credits to complete the proposed overhead to underground conversion project, and

WHEREAS, the County of Yuba and the affected utilities have agreed by letter that each utility shall complete the engineering of their respective portion of the Olivehurst Avenue Overhead to Underground Utility Conversion Project; and

WHEREAS, the County of Yuba and the affected utilities have agreed by letter that PG&E shall be responsible for preparation of the trench profile and composite drawings and that the County shall be designated as "trench lead" to manage trenching, installation of substructures, and pavement restoration and such other work; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Works of the County of Yuba and the affected utilities have agreed on a work schedule which meets their respective capabilities and further agreed to waive any administrative fees, permit fees, costs or special street restoration requirements for purposes of this project; and

WHEREAS, to the extent required, the County of Yuba has agreed to provide easements or rights of way on private property as may be necessary for installation of utility facilities in a form satisfactory to the affected utilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Yuba has now received the report from the Director of Public Works recommending that the area identified in Exhibit 1 should be designated as an underground utility district within which all existing overhead poles, overhead wires and overhead equipment associated with the distribution of electric power, telecommunication services and cable television should be removed and replaced with underground wires and facilities; and

WHEREAS, upon the recommendation of the Director of Planning, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Yuba has determined that the proposed Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District is categorically exempt from environmental review pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act; and WHEREAS, the County of Yuba has notified all affected property owners within the proposed Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District and inviting same to attend a public hearing to discuss formation of the proposed district, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Yuba held public hearings at which time the Board of Supervisors did receive and consider the recommendation of the Director of Public Works and did hear any and all objections or protests that were raised by the owners of property within the above described district pertaining to designating this area an underground utility district;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Yuba that:

Section 1. The public necessity, safety, and welfare requires the removal of all existing utility poles, excepting those poles supporting streetlights, traffic signals or trolley lines, and including overhead wires and associated overhead structures and installation of underground wires and facilities for supplying electric power, communication, or similar associated services within the areas as shown in Exhibit 1, attached hereto, with such area being designated as the Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District; and

Section 2. Within ten days of the passage of this resolution, notice pursuant to Yuba County Ordinance Code section 11.30.070 will be sent to all affected property owners.

Section 3. That the utility companies, cable television services and other affected services shall commence work on installation of underground facility installation in the Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District and that as each phase of the project is complete and ready for conversion from overhead to underground utility facilities, all fronting property owners shall be notified pursuant to Yuba County Code of Ordinances, Chapter 11.30, of the schedule for conversion of all utility service lines; and

Section 4. The electric utility shall use the underground conversion allocation computed pursuant to decisions of the California Public Utilities Commission for the purpose of providing to each premises in Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District requiring it, a maximum of one hundred feet of individual electric service trenching and conductor (as well as backfill, paving and conduit, if required) and each other serving utility shall provide service trenching and conductor in accordance with its rules and tariffs on file with the California Public Utilities Commission or as required by its Franchise Agreement with the County of Yuba; and

Section 5. The electric utility shall use said underground conversion allowance allocation, up to a maximum amount of \$1500 per service entrance excluding permit fees, for the conversion

of electric service panels to accept underground service in the Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District, and each property owner shall be financially responsible for any and all costs not covered by the electric utility for the installation and maintenance of the conduit and termination box located on, under or within any structure on the premises served; and

Section 6. That upon notification as specified in Section 3, all property owners in Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District shall have underground electrical entrance facilities installed and inspected pursuant to the 2010 California Electrical Code within thirty (30) days from said notification and that should any property owner fail to install satisfactory underground electrical entrance facilities by the date specified in the notice, pursuant to Yuba County Ordinance Section 11.30.090, the Chief Building Inspector will provide such required underground facilities, in which case the cost and expense thereof will be assessed against the property benefited and become a lien upon such property. If upon the expiration of the 30-day period, the said required underground facilities have not been provided, the Chief Building Inspector shall forthwith proceed to do the work provided, however, if such premises are unoccupied and no electric or communication services are being furnished thereto, the Chief Building Inspector shall in lieu of providing the required underground facilities, have the authority to order the disconnection and removal of any and all overhead service wires and associated facilities supplying utility service to said property. Upon completion of the work by the Chief Building Inspector, he or she shall file a written report with the Board of Supervisors setting forth the fact that the required underground facilities have been provided and the cost thereof, together with a legal description of the property against which such cost is to be assessed. The Board of Supervisors shall thereupon fix a time and place for hearing protests against the assessment of the cost of such work upon such premises, which said time shall not be less than ten days thereafter.; and

Section 7. That once all services have been converted from overhead to underground, the utility companies, cable television services and other affected services shall remove all poles (except as specified above) and associated overhead facilities in Olivehurst Avenue Underground Utility District, within three (3) years from the adoption of this resolution, thus completing the conversion.

To Whom It May Concern:

My name is Stacy Wurm. My Husband Joseph and I live with our three boys in Hallwood. My husband was born and raised in Hallwood and his family has been in the Hallwood area for four generations. My husband's father and two uncles farmed this land we won for Joe's late Grandmother for sixty years before we purchased the property and built a home here in 2005. An agreement with the federal government was made with the family that our property should remain in the family. Now Yuba County wants to take part of our land to build a "multi-use" trail. I am writing this letter to tell you we do not want this trail on our property.

This trail I am referring to is the trail on the SACOG map that runs from the Marysville Levee across the highway at Recology and continues up the river. I have heard the trail will end at our property. I have also heard that it will continue to run along the river up to Sycamore Ranch which will affect a lot more lives.

What is a "multi-use" trail? That term "multi-use" means to me that all sorts of off road vehicles will be able to use this trail. There are several reasons why that would be unacceptable. We have gates and fences to keep our property private. We have had issues with theft with people just floating down the river. Why would we want them to be able to walk or drive by at anytime? This access will give people the opportunity to steal.

Another issue is littering. Who is going to remove the garbage? People will throw waste of any kind along this trail. This would include the possible dumping of unwanted household appliances. We have all seen this happen.

We have a producing walnut orchard. We have to use chemicals to maintain a healthy, producing orchard. If this trail is built, we will not be able to spray our orchard. We also have expensive equipment that may be vandalized. And I cannot imagine the cost of the stolen or damaged nuts that we will incur. This is our livelihood and a livelihood that we want to pass on to our future generations.

Homeless people are a concern. There is already a tent city along the river. This will just create another opportunity for more homeless to move in. They will bring garbage and other waste. There could be a fire concern. These people could be in danger if the water rises in the wet season. It would just add more cost to the county taxpayers.

Will people be able to hunt on this trail? Like I said, we have children. We also have pets. This trail puts their lives in danger. It also put s a strain on an already small population of deer and other wild animals.

What about the cost of something like this? The county cannot even afford to pay for repairs on the roads we already have. Parks have been shut down because there is no funding to maintain them. This could cost millions of dollars.

We are not completely against bike trails or multi-use trails. Biking is a great way to exercise and be healthy. It would also be a great way to spend time with family. We just do not think that private property should be taken away for these paths to be built. Use the existing roads or levees to have bike and multi-use trails. Maybe even consider putting this trail on the other side of the river where there are no homes and properties to be affected.

Please consider all of these issues when you begin planning this trail. Traffic, theft, garbage dumping, and vandalism are only a few of the issues that concern us and our family. We just want to continue to live in peace. That is why we live in this small community. Along with this letter I am also circulating a petition through the community to let you know just how unacceptable this trail would be.

Thank you for your time and I hope you will reconsider putting this plan in place.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that, pursuant to the provisions of Section 2073.3 of the Fish and Game Code, the California Fish and Game Commission, on September 25, 2012 received a petition from the Center for Biological Diversity to list the Clear Lake Hitch (*Lavinia exilicauda chi*) as threatened or endangered under the California Endangered Species Act.

Clear Lake Hitch have specific requirements to complete their life-cycle, including access for unimpeded migration up tributary streams to suitable spawning habitat during the spring, and the ability for adults and young to return downstream to Clear Lake before tributary streams run dry or reduced flows and water depth result in migration barriers.

Pursuant to Section 2073 of the Fish and Game Code, on September 26, 2012 the Commission transmitted the petition to the Department of Fish and Game for review pursuant to Section 2073.5 of said code. It is anticipated that the Department's evaluation and recommendation relating to the petition will be received by the Commission at its February, 2013 Commission meeting. I would like to hear your thoughts regarding which Plumas National Forest watersheds should be selected as priorities for future work including hazardous fuels reduction, soil & water improvements, fisheries & aquatic habitat improvements, improvement of in-stream flows and abandoned mine restoration. To that end, we will hold a meeting on November 8 from 10:00 am-2:00 pm at the Forest Supervisor's office, 159 Lawrence Street in Quincy.

As background, nationwide, the U.S. Forest Service has begun implementation of a new process for improving the health of watersheds on National Forests and Grasslands. This process is described in the Watershed Condition Framework document, available at <u>http://www.fs.fed.us/publications/watershed/</u>. This new process will facilitate investment in watershed restoration that will provide economic and environmental benefits to local communities.

A key step in the Watershed Condition Framework (Framework) process is the selection of priority watersheds. Each National Forest is to select 2 to 5 watersheds that are a priority for improvement. The Forest then develops an action plan for each of those priority watersheds, which would include a list of essential projects to be completed to maintain or improve watershed condition. These essential projects are to be completed within 5 years of development of the action plan.

Plumas National Forest lands are included in 85 watersheds at the Framework scale, with watersheds ranging in size from 10,000 to 39,000 acres. Two priority watersheds were selected in 2011 and our plans are to select another 2-3 this year.


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US Forest Service: Watershed Condition Framework

A new consistent and comparable process for improving the health of watersheds on all National Forests and Grasslands

The Watershed Condition Framework (WCF) is a comprehensive approach for proactively implementing integrated restoration on priority watersheds on national forests and grasslands.

The WCF proposes to improve the way the Forest Service approaches watershed restoration by targeting the implementation of integrated suites of activities in those watersheds that have been identified as priorities for restoration.

Implementing the Watershed Condition Framework: An Update for Plumas National Forest (PNF) (October 2012)

Step A: PNF staff completed a rating of watershed condition for 85 watersheds, ranging in size from 10,000 to 39,000 acres, in spring 2011. Indicators rated include:

- \geq Water Quality Water Quantity
- \geq **Riparian Vegetation**
- Roads and Trails
- \geq Soils
- Aquatic Habitat Aquatic Biota
- Fire Regime or Wildfire \geq
- \geq Forest Cover
- \triangleright **Rangeland Vegetation**
- Terrestrial Invasive Species \geq
- Forest Health

Step B: The Forest Service Washington Office required that each Forest select at least two priority watersheds by September 30, 2011. After working with Ranger District staffs and local partners, the Plumas National Forest selected the Big Grizzly Creek watershed (surrounding Lake Davis) and the Lower Wolf Creek watershed (surrounding Round Valley Reservoir and the community of Greenville). The Forest plans to select 2-3 additional priority watersheds by September 2012.

- > The number of priority watersheds selected is based upon a 5-year program of work that is reasonable and achievable
- > Input from Forest partners (local, State, tribal, other Federal agencies, and interest groups) is key to the Forest's watershed prioritization process
- Priority watersheds are not necessarily watersheds in the worst condition; equally important may be watersheds that are in better condition but have identified problems that can be fixed before they get worse
- > In selecting priority watersheds, Forests are to consider watershed resource values, including Wild and Scenic River status, municipal watersheds, threatened and endangered species, and watersheds with unique local characteristics
- > In selecting priority watersheds, Forests are also to consider opportunities for partnership and collaboration as well as the social and economic impacts of improving watershed condition

Step C: A watershed restoration action plan is developed for each selected priority watershed. The Action Plan identifies essential projects necessary to maintain or improve watershed condition and establishes an implementation timeline. Typical project activities include soil and water improvements, fisheries and aquatic habitat improvements, road drainage improvements, abandoned mine restoration, improvements of in-stream flows, and hazardous fuel reduction to prevent wildfire. Recreation use in the watershed would be included in planning activities.

RECOMMENDATION: Approval by the Board of Supervisors of the Certificates of Compliance for the California Department of Veterans Affairs (CDVA) County Subvention Program and the Medi-Cal Cost Avoidance Program for Fiscal Year 2012-2013 is recommended.

BACKGROUND: Per Military and Veteran Code Section 972, all California County Boards of Supervisors are required to certify that their respective county is in compliance with state code. In completing the attached certificate, Yuba County will be eligible to receive CDVA funding for the County Veteran Services Office. A renewal of this certificate is required on an annual basis.

DISCUSSION: State funding is a major revenue source for the Yuba-Sutter County Veteran Services Office. By completing the attached Certificates, the Board of Supervisors will ensure that Yuba County is eligible for available state funding. In validating and signing these certificates, this funding will be secured and vital public service will continue. The services provided by the Veteran Services Office are critical in obtaining benefits for all county Veterans and their families.

FISCAL IMPACT: Failure to complete the certificates for FY 2012-2013 would reduce the Yuba-Sutter County Veteran Services Office funding by approximately \$80,251, and would require an increase in expenditure of Yuba and Sutter Counties General Funds or a reduction in office staff/services.
